



#### LIVE THE LITURGY

#### Inspiration for the week

"Stand up straight and don't slouch!" Many a child has heard these words bellowed from their mother's lips. We need the perspective of others to help us understand when we are not walking as straight as we could be. God sends us the Holy Spirit to correct and guide us so that our paths through life can be straight. Without this assistance, how we see and understand ourselves and the world around us is incomplete. We will also lack the virtue of fortitude. It takes courage to listen to the Holy Spirit and devote ourselves to the task of discipleship. We have to put aside things that the world says are necessary and follow a path placed before us by Jesus Christ. Jesus is asking us to follow him. We must consider what we have to do to be free enough to do so. God needs us to show the world a complete picture of what life is meant to be, correct its vision and tell it to stand up straight!



#### SAINT OF THE WEEK

Born in Catalonia Spain in 1580, Saint Peter Claver studied at first at the University of Barcelona and then joined the Jesuits. He became friends with fellow brother Saint Alphonsus Rodriguez who encouraged him to be a missionary in the New World. Accordingly, Saint Peter went to Cartagena, a city in present-day Columbia where he was ordained in in 1615.

Cartagena was a center for the slave trade, and the young missionary knew where he could best serve God. He proclaimed himself, "the slave of the Negroes forever." As ships would arrive with their human cargo, Saint Peter and a group of interpreters would rush into the hold with food and medicines. When the slaves were moved to pens to await sale, the saint continued to work among them, communicating God's love with acts of generosity and teaching the Catholic faith.

He also led missions in the interior, refusing the hospitality of plantation owners and preferring to stay in the slave quarters. He organized charitable societies and is said to have baptized and catechized more than 300,000 enslaved persons.

Saint Peter Claver died on September 8, 1654. He was canonized with his friend Saint Alphonsus Rodriguez in 1888, by Pope Leo XIII. He is the worldwide patron saint of African Americans and of enslaved peoples.

My college chaplain used to say, "Take care of order, and order will take

3. Take Advantage of Structured Routine

care of you." Keeping a routine is tough to do, but it can work wonders for our spiritual lives. Just look at priests and religious, whose lives are shaped around the daily recitation of the Divine Office. Their commitment breeds discipline and deepens their love for the Lord. Even though you may not live in a religious community, take advantage of your schedule. Whether you're a high schooler or college student, your day-to-day is pretty set in stone. Use this routine to incorporate regular prayer: before school, after practice, during free period, after your lunch break, etc. Set out a specific time each day you want to commit to prayer, and think about how and where you are going to

make it happen; write it in your planner, set a reminder on your phone, whatever it takes to make sure you don't forget.

If you commit to that time of prayer, it will eventually become a necessary part of your day. That habit will help make speaking with the Lord second nature. And the best part? The more you pray, the deeper your capacity to pray. Instead of wasting time or exhausting your efforts, regular prayer frees you to give more of yourself, more frequently. A holy 15 minutes can soon become a holy hour, and a brief conversation with Christ can transform into a running dialogue that lasts all day. Time spent in prayer is never wasted, so keep that in mind as you set aside a regular time to pray.

4. Pick a Patron

Saints are awesome. Their witness and courage gives a great example for us to follow. It's funny how God often puts just the right saints in our hearts just when we need them. So, as you go into this school year, be attentive for a saint who has been speaking to you recently. How do you relate to them? What can you learn from their life?

Pick a patron to motivate your goals this year. It's not a binding contract or anything, but just something to help remind you of who you are trying to become: a saint. Here are some ideas, along with a few phrases to remember them by:

St. John Paul the Great: "Totus Tuus," JP2's papal motto, is a great motto to live by. It means "totally yours," and points us to total gift of self to Jesus Christ through Mary, who gave her whole body and will to the Lord.

*Bl. Pier Giorgio Frassati*: "Verso l'alto." Frassati, a student himself, always sought the heights of God's Kingdom, especially through his outreach to the poor and sick. He was a fun-loving, normal Christian who wasn't afraid to give up comfort for those in need.

*St. Joan of Arc:* "I am not afraid; I was born to do this." This saint was a bold witness of courage and trust in the Lord. Like her, we can venture forward with confidence in God's guiding hand, no matter what difficulties we face.

St. Dominic: "To contemplate, and to share with others the fruits of our contemplation." This is the motto of the Dominican order, which can really resonate with students seeking a higher purpose to their studies. Like St. Dominic, we can let our intellect lead us deeper into God's love. The Blessed Virgin: "Let it be done unto me according to Thy Word." Her fiat changes everything. Following her example, we can forget ourselves and let God act through us to accomplish His will.

Reading about a saint, or asking for his/her intercession, can work wonders to strengthen your resolve on the quest for holiness.

5). Make Disciples

We are not called to keep the Good News to ourselves. If you find your prayer plan is changing you and you're growing closer to Jesus through it (and if it's not, maybe it's time for some revision), then don't stop there! Keep being letting Jesus be poured into you until you find yourself full enough to pour Him out to others. Share the fruits of your prayer and commitment. Help a friend commit to more prayer, or intercede for them in your prayers.

The Mystical Body of Christ is united in our struggles and in our successes. So know that, as you prepare to fix your eyes on Christ this school year, you're not alone. I am praying for you, as is the cloud of witnesses in heaven and on earth!



#### **Encourage Deeper Understanding of Scripture**

What virtue is the cornerstone of discipleship? Love. Jesus preached about it, lived it, and summarized his greatest commandment featuring it. Love is in our DNA. To follow Jesus, then, is to follow the path of love. While this may appear to be an attractive and easy option, it most assuredly is not. Authentic love always comes with sacrifice. It is the complete giving of oneself to another. The sacrificial character of love always requires that we leave something aside and pursue something else. This is at the heart of self-denial. Love asks us to make choices that are often difficult.

There is a reason Jesus asks that the love of God come first. "Charity is the right attitude of mind which prefers nothing to the knowledge of God. If a man possesses any strong attachment to the things of this earth, he cannot possess true charity (St. Maximus the Confessor)." "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple." A devoted disciple must be single-minded in her quest for God. She cannot allow anyone or anything to have more power over her soul than God. When any earthly attachments become more important than Love, we can get ourselves into trouble.

The Gospel calls us to walk boldly into the darkness, confusion, and emptiness of the world clothed in the mantle of love. We are asked to walk with others on their journey, offering a supportive, healing, challenging, and faithful presence. Ours is not to judge. To walk this sacrificial journey means that I must put myself aside and focus on the needs of others. "A sacrifice to be real must cost, must hurt and must empty ourselves (St. Teresa of Calcutta)." Love helps us walk straight and focus to see things more clearly and help others to do so as well. Many folks struggle to find joy and meaning in life. People may simply need someone with the freedom to sit with them in their pain, so they don't feel so alone. Through acts of kindness, gestures of acceptance, and words of compassion, burdens can be lightened. Believe in God's love and seek it above all other things!

#### Where's the Sacrifice?

"It's not that I want you to do it. It's that I want you to want to do it."

If you're married or in a relationship, your partner has probably either said something like this to you or you have said it to them. If one of you hasn't said it, you have probably wanted to, and it's likely that a big argument or two was had where you dance around the sentiment, these exact words flashing in your mind like an old-time movie marquee.

The "it" never really matters much. Taking out the trash, painting the bedroom, traveling to your in-laws' for Christmas — whatever the subject matter of the disagreement is, it's all just so much set dressing. The heart of the matter is the sacrifice and desire. That's what it all hangs on. Am I with a person who will sacrifice for me?

When Paul writes to Philemon that he is sending Onesimus to him, he says exactly this. He tells Philemon that he would prefer to keep Onesimus with him, but that he does not want to deprive Philemon both of Onesimus and the opportunity to make a sacrifice worthy in the sight of the Lord.


The point is not who gets to hang out with Onesimus. The point is, as it says in the Gospel, who is willing to carry his cross? Who is willing to renounce his possessions? Who is willing to do the good deed for the sake of the other?

God doesn't care that much about what we have to offer. He cares much more that we have the strength to offer whatever we have.

## WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

#### Question:

Why do Catholics light candles in church?

#### Answer:

Candles have been part of the Church's worship from the earliest times. In the days before electricity, candles and oil lamps were the ways that people lighted buildings. Even today, we often still depend on candles during power outages, relying on their flickering flames to bring light into the dark.

Like our ancestors, we also light candles on special occasions. Think about a festive family meal or a romantic dinner for two — there will often be candles on the table, special objects for a special event. We light candles on birthday cakes and carry them in processions. We also place candles at makeshift memorials that appear when there has been an accident or act of violence. In these moments, their light casts aside a different kind of darkness — the darkness of grief, fear, and death.

The custom of the early Christians lighting candles and lamps at the tombs of the martyrs gave way to the practice of having candles at Mass, honoring the sacredness of the celebration.

As Christians decorated their worship spaces with statues and icons, they would burn candles in front of sacred images and the relics of the saints, basically "shining a light" on what they held to be sacred. When pilgrims would visit these shrines, they would often bring candles to light before the image or relic. These candles came to be a symbol of the person, and their prayer and the burning these candles came to be understood as an extension and continuation of the prayer that was offered. What began as a practical way to provide light has come to be a symbol of the hopes, desires, loves, losses, fears, and faith of everyday Christians offering their prayers to God and his saints.



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
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
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
