This past year brought out a lot of feelings for us. Sad, confused, joyful, grateful are feelings that surface regularly. In the midst of these feelings, we have a place to go - God's word. God's word has the power to sustain us through life's ups and downs. October 9-10, 16-17, 23-24

We will celebrate the liturgical Season of Creation in worship using portions of the Earthkeeping Liturgy created for Luther College by the musicians Dakota Road. Many Christian churches and denominations in the United States and around the world now mark this season. It is a time to renew our relationship with our creator and with all creation. We celebrate God's creativity and abundance, we repent of the harm we cause to creation, and we commit to better care for the earth and all living things. In addition to the emphasis in worship, several Adult Forums on October 17 and 24 will also on the theme of caring for creation.

Reformation Weekend

October 30-31

During the sixteenth century, some German Lutheran churches celebrated an annual thanksgiving day for the Reformation. In 1667 the festival was set for October 31 or the Sunday prior, since by then it was popularly believed that on this date in 1517 Martin Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses on the Wittenberg church door, in anticipation of people coming to worship on November 1, All Saints Day. The main purpose of this festival for us today is both to remind us of the ongoing need for renewal in all churches, and to celebrate, as we do every Sunday, the freedom we receive in Christ, through God's grace.

Did You Know?

1987 – McCleskey V Kemp – racial profiling constitutional

1989 - Graham v Connor - "The 'reasonableness' of a particular use of force by police must be judged from the perspective of a reasonable officer on the scene, rather than with the 20/20 vision of hindsight."

- 1957 Black folks killed by police between 2013 and 2019. 164 have been killed in the first 8 months of 2020. "Living While Black" – walking through campus, hiking, taking a nap, picnicking in public park, driving home from church, selling lemonade, buying food at Wendy's.
- 6,500 Black folks were lynched between the beginning of Reconstruction and 1950. There were eleven documented lynchings since 1950.

"Those who fail to learn from history are doomed to repeat it" - George Santayana

Come join the conversation as we trace the history of American Exceptionalism and the laws passed and systems created to protect that Exceptionalism and its Anglo-Saxon origins.

We will study a timeline that traces the historic roots of American Exceptionalism

- the historic justification for slavery beginning with Aristotle in 348 BCE
- the historic roots of the superiority of Anglo-Saxon blood and institutions beginning with Tacitus in 99 CE,
- the influence of the Christian Doctrine of Discovery beginning in the 1100's CE.

We will examine the evolution of American Exceptionalism and the laws passed to protect the dominance of Anglo-Saxon institutions and blood. While there are many stories and histories that could be examined, these conversations will focus on those systems and structures that have resulted in wealth disparities, mass incarceration, and the unchecked killing of Black People.

Join Us for another Dane Sanctuary Coalition Big Read

The Immigration Action Team invites you to read and reflect on this year's Big Read selection Separated- Inside an American Tragedy, by Jacob Soboroff. Soboroff is an NBC News reporter who investigated the Trump administration's policy of separating migrant children from their parents as the families tried to enter the United States. The book details the roles of several U.S. leaders, their administrations, and the government agency workers who participated in the policy known as "zero tolerance", and its sequelae.

We will hold the book study by Zoom in the interest of safety. Discussions will take place weekly each Sunday evening at 6:30 starting on October 17 and finishing on November 21. Dane Sanctuary Coalition (DSC) congregations hosting book studies will be posting their study particulars on the DSC website so if these times don't work for you but another church's study does, you can join in another study group. We will order a limited number of books to start, please let us know if you plan to obtain a book from the library or if you need a church copy. There is a suggested donation of \$15 for each book. We hope to have a big group discussing this compelling book, so please join us!

October 3 - Engaging policymakers with Dr. Karen Bogenschneider

Karen Bogenschneider, Rothermel-Bascom Professor Emeritus at the University of Wisconsin-Madison, will discuss best practices for engaging policymakers from those who study it and do it. For 25 years, Karen directed the Wisconsin Family Impact Seminars, a series of presentations, briefing reports, and discussion sessions that communicated rigorous, nonpartisan research to state policymakers on topics they identified.

October 10 - Are Lutherans Evangelical? – Pastor Ken Smith

Today the term evangelical is used to describe conservative Christianity often supporting right wing political causes. But in the founding years of the reformation, the term was used to describe the emerging protestant movement emphasis on the believer hearing the good news of God's love and forgiveness. Many older Lutheran congregations still have the word "Evangelical" in their name. Between the Reformation and the current understanding of the term, the word evangelical referred to a missionary movement focused on spreading the gospel to the far corners of the world and evangelizing indigenous people. We will look at the word, and consider if and how we might recover the term as we describe ourselves in today's religious context.

October 17 - Wisconsin's Freshwater is Getting Salty with Hillary Dugan

Road salt is often thought of as an 'environmentally safe' chemical. However, at high concentrations, chloride can alter aquatic ecosystems by stressing freshwater species, and deteriorate drinking water sources. For 70+ years, we have applied road salt to paved surfaces, without any regard for the environmental consequences. This talk will focus on long-term chloride trends and the state our lakes in Wisconsin with regard to chloride contamination. I will identify what lakes are at risk, and what is currently being done locally in Wisconsin to curtail further environmental damage. October 24 - How can we help reduce Chlorides in the environment? Madison Metropolitan Sanitary District

Each day, the Madison Metropolitan Sewerage District's Nine Springs Wastewater Treatment plant receives more salt than this pile dissolved in wastewater. The plant isn't designed to remove salt, so it passes through into our streams. At high levels, the chloride can threaten freshwater plants and animals. It's easy to add salt to water, but costly and energy-intensive to remove it. To reduce chlorides would cost over \$400 million -- meaning higher fees. Fortunately, there is another way, we can reduce chloride at the source. MMSD staff member will discuss steps we can take to reduce the amount of salt put into water.

October 31 - An Asylum Seeker's Journey

Midvale members Ngwa Augustine and Mark and Toni Swandby will give an overview of the steps an asylum seeker in the United States takes to gaining asylum or to ultimately being deported. These steps include entering our country, asking for asylum, entering and leaving detention, finding a place to live, seeking employment, legal representation, and the immigration court experience. How can we as people of faith accompany asylum seekers on their arduous journey? Please join us to find out.

November 7 – The many roles of the State Patrol - Superintendent Burrell

The State Patrol is charged to perform several duties and as such requires expertise in a wide range of fields and capabilities. Superintendent Burrell will share the many charges of his agency as well as some of the history of Wisconsin State Patrol. Superintendent Burrell began his career as a trooper in St. Croix County. In 2006 he was promoted to sergeant, lieutenant in 2012, and named captain of the State Patrol's 11-county Northeast Region in March of 2015. That year he was awarded the Medal of Valor - the State Patrol's highest decoration for bravery. In December of 2016, Burrell was promoted to major and deputy director of the State Patrol's Bureau of Field Operations.

Forward Together with Gratitude - Stewardship and 2022 Giving

Thanks be to God for sustaining us in the past year and a half! Despite the challenges, our church and our ministry have remained vital. This would not have been possible without God's Spirit leading us and without your prayers, commitment, and financial support. Thank you!

So that our church can continue to be a source of encouragement, comfort and inspiration in the year ahead, you are invited to make a financial commitment for 2022. By making a financial commitment, you deepen your relationship with Jesus and you experience the joy and satisfaction of giving to God's mission and ministry. Your offerings are the only financial support our congregation receives. Please prayerfully consider what commitment you can make. One way to determine your financial commitment is to use the Biblical model of percentage giving. The Bible invites God's people to tithe, or give 10% of their income to God. If 10% is daunting for you, start with a smaller percentage - even 1% or 2% if you have never done so before. In uncertain times, using a percentage plan for giving allows you to give less if your income decreases, and give more if your income increases.

In October, all members will receive a giving packet in the mail from our Stewardship Committee. Please read it carefully and pray about how God is inviting you to respond. You can indicate your commitment by filling out an automatic withdrawal form or by returning the commitment cards. Regular stewardship giving supports our daily ministry. The Building Fund is used to make monthly mortgage payments and pay down the principal. Whatever commitment you make can be changed during the year if your financial circumstances change. Everyone is asked to return their financial commitments by November 7.
