

# **DEATH OF THE GOOD SHEPHERD**

Holy week, which begins today, is the greatest week in the Church year. It is made holy by the death of Christ, the Good Shepherd who died for his flock. He died because of sin. Since we are all sinners, each of us can truthfully say that we had a hand in his death.

But Christ died so that we might die to sin and rise to a new life of holiness and grace.

Lord Jesus, you are the sinless one, who suffered the shame and agony of the cross for us sinners. Lord, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, you died so that we might die to sin and live to holiness. Christ, have mercy.

Lord Jesus, you underwent death so that you might open for us the gates to eternal life. Lord, have mercy.

**GOSPEL FOR PROCESSION** (Matthew 21:1-11). Jesus enters Jerusalem for the last time. He comes, not as an all-conquering warrior, but as a gentle, humble bearer of Good News.

**1st READING** (Isaiah 50:4-7). The prophet suffers in carrying out his mission. But he is sustained by the firm belief that God will not abandon him.

**2nd READING** (Philippians 2:6-11). Because Jesus took on himself our human condition, and accepted death on a cross, the Father has raised him up and made him Lord of heaven and earth.

**GOSPEL** (Matthew 26:14-27:66). St. Matthew shows the passion as fulfilling the prophecies of Scripture, and portrays Jesus, because of his foreknowledge and free decision, as being in complete control of the situation.

# The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass (10) <u>"Let Us Pray!"</u>

An important point to remember as we make our way through the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, is that the sacred liturgy can only be celebrated by a validly ordained priest. And what is a priest? A priest is a man who has been admitted to Holy Orders by the laying on of hands, and by virtue of his ordination, is conformed to Jesus Christ the High Priest. As priest, he stands in the headship of Jesus Christ Himself, offering sacrifice to the Father on behalf of fallen man. In other words, a priest is one that stands in the breech between God and Man, instructing man on behalf of God, and offering atonement for sins on behalf of man. Think about Moses in the desert, when the chosen people offend God by committing idolatry in worshiping the golden calf. Moses, as priest, pleaded with God to forgive their offense, offered



sacrifice, and reconciled the people to God.

Likewise, as the

priest begins Holy Mass, he stands in the person of Jesus Christ, as head of the body, addressing God on behalf of all present. In this, comes the need for what is called the *Collect*, or opening prayer. The word *collect* comes from the Latin word *colligere* which means to bring together what was initially separate. In this action, the priest is collecting or gathering all of the faithful present, along with their needs and desires, as well as the intention of the Mass, and presenting it to God. This brings up an important, but hardly known fact about the participation of the lay faithful in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass. And that is, in addition to the actual intention of the Mass, each person present, makes his or her own intention and unites it to the Mass itself. In other words,



sick family member, world peace, a financial concern, or any other intention of good will.

So as the priest says, "Let us pray!", he remains silent for a few moments before speaking the words of the *collect*, allowing all present, to unite their intentions to his, and then as he begins praying, he is collecting all of the intentions present, and lifting them up to God! This is one of the many reasons why it is so important to be to Mass on time, as this is the moment when all of our intentions are lifted up to the Father on behalf of the priest, who stands in the person of the Son.

Of course, this should not be confused with the actual offering of the Mass; it is still necessary to have Masses formally offered for our loved ones and their intentions, as the actual intention of the Mass, becomes the formal action and intention of the Universal Church, and thereby the whole Church, through the action of the priest, is now presenting the particular intention to God. So please don't forget to have Masses offered—they are the most powerful prayer on earth!
