A NOTE FROM OUR PASTOR

Dear Parish Family,

Beginning Sunday, September 11th, Confessions will be heard from 5:00 until 5:45 pm, before the 6pm Sunday evening Mass. These added times will be in addition to our Saturday Confessions at 3pm. Since August 1st Father Tomy has been at home in

India visiting his family and his religious community of Carmelites. He is home, briefly, this weekend and begins his new assignment at Saint Phillip the Apostle Parish in Addison. Father will continue to visit the sick and administer the Sacraments to those in our area hospitals, especially at Elmhurst Hospital. Earlier this summer the Bishop asked Father to consider the move in his residence so that he can live with an older priest with some health issues. Father Tomy graciously acquiesced to the Bishop's request and will be living in the Rectory at Addison to provide companionship to a pastor, currently living alone. I want to thank Father for all he has done for Visitation Parish. I'm sure all you know, and have experienced his kindness, gentle manner, and priestly ministry in many ways. Thank you Father Tomy... God bless you in your new assignment.

Monday, September 5th is Labor Day. A day we set aside to honor those who labor, who work diligently and faithfully to not only provide for their own sustenance and that of their families, but through their concerted effort contribute to the over-all economic stability and vitality of America. This Nation is made great by the labor of so many people, a legacy that spans centuries. For that, we should be grateful to the Lord for the blessings He has given us. The Importance of Work *Pope Francis I*

Human labor is an important aspect of the dignity of the person. Likewise, there is a need for creativity and solidarity to face the economic crisis that faces our world.



Employment is necessary for society, for families and for individuals. Its primary value is the

good of the human person, as it allows the individual to be fully realized as such, with his or her attitudes and intellectual, creative and manual capacities. Therefore, it follows that work has not only the economic objective of profit, but above all a purpose that regards man and his dignity. And if there is no work, this dignity is wounded! Indeed, the unemployed and underemployed risk being relegated to the margins of society, becoming victims of social exclusion.

What can we say, when faced with the very serious problem of unemployment that affects various nations? It is the consequence of an economic system that is no longer able to create work, because it has placed at its center the idol of money. Therefore, the various political, social and economic actors are called upon to promote a different approach, based on justice and solidarity, to ensure the possibility of dignified work for all. Work is an asset for all, and must be available to all. Phases of serious difficulties and unemployment must be faced with the tools of creativity and solidarity. The creativity of courageous businesspeople and craftspeople, who look to the future with trust and hope. And solidarity between all the elements of society, who all give something up, adopting a more sober lifestyle, to help those in need.

This great challenge requires the involvement of the Christian community as a whole. The first challenge is to revive the roots of faith and of our adhesion to Jesus Christ. This is the inspiring principle in the choices of a Christian: faith. Faith moves mountains! Christian faith is able to enrich society through the concrete element of brotherhood it embodies. Never cease to hope for a better future. Do not let yourselves be trapped in the vortex of pessimism! If everyone does his part, if we all put the human person and his dignity at the center, and if we consolidate an attitude of solidarity and fraternal sharing, inspired by the Gospel, we can emerge from the swamp of this difficult and burdensome period of economic turmoil.

Attending Weddings

It's an all too familiar scenario: A 25-year-old relative is getting married to their cohabitating intendant. One, or both of the parties are baptized Catholic, but have wandered far from the Lord and no longer practice the Faith. Sometimes, the ceremony is a "Christian" wedding outside the Catholic Church. With the couple not seeking the permission of the



Church to marry in a non-Catholic ceremony. More often, it is a purely civil, secular ceremony at a particular venue. Is it appropriate (or allowed) for a Catholic to attend a fallen-away Catholic wedding outside the Church. This, often, will cause issues in families.

Opinions will differ. Many family members will attend to *"show support,"* but many don't consider attendance as something on which they can compromise. In truth, the decision to not attend is commendable and appropriate, especially when you're not in the position to influence or *"speak"* to the situation. The complexities involved is exactly the reason why the Church does not have an absolute norm when it comes to these awkward marriage situations.

The general norm is that Catholics should not attend the weddings of Catholics held outside of the Church or weddings that are invalid due to other factors, such as a same-sex "wedding" or a "wedding" where one or both of the spouses has been married before and do not have a decree of nullity. The reason for this general norm is that to attend a wedding ceremony is to indicate one is celebrating the union that is to take place. But in some circumstances, Catholics cannot celebrate what is being done. Hence, they should not attend.

There are, however, some situations where refusing to attend a wedding may so poison family relationships that a prudential judgment can be made to attend. Since the overall goal is to witness to the Catholic faith and to seek conversion and a return to the sacraments for fallen-away Catholics, one may prudently determine that a better course is to attend but resolve to seek to explain, at a later time, the need to validate the marriage to the couple and others. So, while the general norm is not to attend for the reasons stated, it is not an absolute norm. There may, in fact, be other circumstances at work. For example, perhaps your attendance is to help another family member for reasons of charity or medical need to offer assistance to an elderly friend of relative. All sorts of dynamics and circumstances come into play with the rather "complicated" situations that exist in all families. Charity, witness to the faith, and the goal of inviting/calling the errant back to the devout practice of our Catholic Faith should be your motivation.

The Gift of Confession

As Catholics we have been given a great aid to forgiveness in the *Sacrament of Penance*. Confession serves several important aspects.

First, although we can and should ask those whom we have offended to forgive us, there is a corporate aspect to sin that must be addressed. No sin exists in isolation. Its effects ripple out like waves to distant lands. The Sacra-



ment of Reconciliation allows us to ask for, and be granted, forgive-ness from those we have harmed that we might not even realize have been effected by our actions. In short, it allows us to be "reconciled" to the entire Body of Christ.

Second, while it's hard enough to forgive another, forgiving oneself can be the most difficult of all. Confession gives us the assurance we need that we are, indeed, forgiven our trespasses. The priest extends to us the promise from Jesus that our sins are indeed "loosed on earth," allowing us to do the internal healing work we need.

Third, the Sacrament of Reconciliation can be the means through which we experience forgiveness ourselves and can therefore learn what it means to truly forgive another. By being forgiven, we learn what it truly means to forgive.

Finally, through the sacrament, we are restored to unity with God, which is ultimately our goal of both asking and extending forgiveness. By confessing our sins and accepting the penance assigned, we are able to have a fresh start in our relationship with Our Lord, no matter what we might have done.

Your birth, of Virgin Mother of God announced joy to the whole world, for from you has risen the Son of Justice, Christ, our God!



This coming Thursday, September 8th is celebrated as the *Feast of the Birth of the Blessed Virgin Mary*. It is observed nine months after the Feast of her *Immaculate Conception* on December 8th.

Saint Joachim and Saint Anne are the parents of Mary, the Grandparents of Jesus. Mary's birth announced great joy at the coming of our Salvation. Therefore her birth is celebrated by the whole Church with great praise and thanksgiving. Mary came into the world, not like other "children of Adam," that is, stained with the contagion of sin. But rather, she was conceived in the womb of her mother holy, beautiful, and glorious. Because Mary was to be the mother of Jesus — the Mother of God — she was Immaculately Conceived. She was conceived in the womb of Her mother, Saint Anne, without the stain of original sin. This is the feast we celebrate on December 8th. She remained sinless throughout Her life. This singular honor, this singular grace was given to Her by God because of the special role she would have in bringing about our salvation. Through Mary, Salvation – Jesus– entered the world.

Her dignity is expressed in the Gospel of Matthew... that of her was born Jesus who is called the Christ. The dignity of the Mother of God is the highest place, the highest honor to which any created person is capable of being raised. We admire her sanctity, her perpetual virginity, all the graces she was given, and the crown with which she is exalted in Heaven.
