



A note from Fr. Doug...

Dear Parishioners,

What does your bible look like? Is it used but not abused. Years ago, when I helped pass out bibles to one of our classes, I preached that the bible is to be used but not abused. If it looks like new and is still in the box it came in, evidenced by the dust that it has not been touched, that is not good. If it serves as a door stop in your room, abused that is not good. If it looks like a favorite book, that has been read many times, looks used but

not abused, that is great. How is your bible looking?

This Sunday is Word of God Sunday, As Pope Francis points out, we celebrate the Word of God which unites us to our Jewish and Protestant brothers and sisters. Bishop Ricken has suggested the following resource: https://mailchi.mp/7c988adf0bc2/threshold-opportunities-for-2022?e=52e62270cb. I suggest that you have your bible in an visible and useable place in your home. Maybe by your prayer chair, or on your night stand if you read it first in the morning or last at night, or on the coffee table. That it is good for our visitors to not only see that we have a bible but that it looks used and not abused.

What kind of bible to get? First of all, you need to make sure that it is a Catholic bible. Some are clearly marked as such, but to make sure you can always look on the inside page for the "Imprimatur" with a bishop's name next to it, +Most Rev... What is a Catholic imprimatur? imprimatur, (Latin: "let it be printed"), in the Roman Catholic church, a permission, required by contemporary canon law and granted by a bishop, for the publication of any work on Scripture or, in general, any writing containing something of peculiar significance to religion, theology, or morality.

Second, look for a translation that works best for you. Our scripture readings in church are the New American Bible (NAB). I use the "The Catholic Youth Bible: "The Study Bible", or the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV). It depends what I am doing, praying or studying, and which office I am in. I also suggest that if you are reading the bible in a year to use the "Great Adventure bible." For children, there are children bibles as well, with some great pictures in them. There are also large-print bibles. Choose what works best for you, and you need not limit yourself to just one.

Where to buy a bible? You can always go online, but if you want to take a road trip, I suggest if you are looking for a good Catholic bible go to *Greatest Gift* in Two Creeks, *Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help* in Champion. or the *Cathedral Book & Gift Store* in Green Bay. If you do visit them, feel free to say that your pastor suggested you go there. (If you go to the one in Two Creeks it is in the Rush's old general store and in the Lutheran church next door. I remember going to that store when I was a child and can tell you exactly where the freezer with the ice cream was. It is not there anymore. The bibles are in the upper room where the hardware and shoes were. It is nice trip down memory lane.) All good places that have good catholic bibles and will help answer your questions. I encourage you to check out your bible, put it in a place in your house where you will use it, and if you need a new one, get one!

On January 22, 1973, the Supreme Court legalized abortion throughout the United States in its companion decisions *Roe v. Wade* and *Doe v. Bolton*. Since that time, millions of children have lost their lives, and millions of women and families have been wounded by abortion. As Catholics, we are called to respect all life from womb to tomb. As individuals, we are called to observe this day through the penitential practices of prayer, fasting and/or almsgiving. The USCCB also sponsors an annual, nationwide novena called **9 Days for Life**, which encompasses the liturgical observance of the Day of Prayer. Each day for nine days, a different intention is featured, accompanied by a short reflection, suggested actions, and related information as we pray for the respect and protection of every human life. One more way we come together as a community here in Manitowoc is through our donation to the <u>Diaper and Bassinet project</u>, supporting "The Crossing of Manitowoc County" The Crossing of Manitowoc County is a non-profit, Christian-based organization with a mission to provide emotional, educational, material, and spiritual support to clients, empowering them to become strong and resilient families. Their programs are designed to serve both women and men facing pregnancy in the variety of situations presented in our community: teens and twenty-somethings, men and women, married and unmarried. The Crossing offers a variety of services including a medical clinic that provides free limited obstetrical ultrasound examinations. All of the services are free, confidential and non-judgmental. The goal is to help clients make an informed decision by helping them to understand what they are feeling and what their options are. Supporting this organization in our area is a great statement of our stand against abortion. This is a great way for us as Catholic church to team up with local organizations to share in ministry in our area. Thank for you support of life.

Pray for a great respect for all life from womb to tomb.

If you found yourself with half an hour of free time, what would you do during that time?

In the morning, I would pray the rosary. In the afternoon, I would take a nap. In the evening, I would read a good book.

What is your favorite mystery of the rosary?

The Fifth Glorious Mystery — The Coronation of Mary. Our Lady's privileged place as Queen of Heaven is what makes the rosary so powerful, so this mystery gives me a lot of confidence in her.

If someone came to your hometown, what is one thing they would have to do and why?

When friends visit, I always take them to Lambeau Field. The place is simply iconic. Even if people do not like football, they know what an impact Lambeau and the Packers have had on American culture and on the town of Green Bay. Our fan-based ownership of the team is especially inspiring for visitors.

Briefly, how would you explain what happens at Mass to someone? At Mass, the Scriptures and the Bread of Life feed God's people. First, we learn in the Old Testament about God's relationship with the people of Israel, and we pray with the Israelites through the Psalms. Then, in the New Testament we hear about the fulfillment of that relationship and how we ought to live as Christians. This time of reading and reflection nourishes us with hope and a compulsion to draw closer to God. Next, the priest offers Jesus in the Eucharist to the Father, and the Father offers Jesus back to us in holy Communion.

Explain how a priest helped you discern a call to the priesthood.

A very important priest during my college years was Fr. Thomas Saucier, OP. I remember walking into the Newman Center one time and feeling deeply compelled to speak with him about my interest in the priesthood. He was the first person to affirm my vocation, and he also walked with me as I began dating in college. I think Fr. Thomas' biggest impact was his "normalization" of the discernment process. For me and many other men, the choice between marriage and priesthood can become unnecessarily heavy. Fr. Thomas helped me rejoice in the Lord's gifts of life and free will, and his humor never failed to lighten things up.

I still remember when Fr. Thomas introduced me to some Dominican novices at the Newman Center. He pulled me to the front of the congregation before Mass started and pointed at each friar in the pews (as if white-robed men were difficult to spot). I think we all got the point.

How do you view a priest's relationship to the Blessed Mother?

Have you ever seen an older brother care for his younger siblings alongside his mother? He does so with some semblance of autonomy but always as an extension of the care and vision of his mother, who is often the primary caregiver to her children. I think of the relationship between the priest and Our Lady in a similar light. Our Lady's great love for our heavenly Father compels her to care for his spiritual children and, indeed, she accepts them as her own spiritual kids. But God also calls upon priests, his spiritual sons, to share in nurturing the family of God. Thus the two work together, mother and son, keeping the children of God safe and healthy during their pilgrimage toward heaven.

I am also intrigued by Mary's relationship to the tabernacle. As we see in the Old Testament and in our churches today, the tabernacle is a physical place where God's presence manifests in a special way. Our Lady's womb, which carried God incarnate, is not so different; Mary was a tabernacle of our Lord. Might we see the priest, who is a custodian of our Lord, Jesus, in the Blessed Sacrament, as a special servant to this living tabernacle, to the one who first bore the church's greatest treasure? I think this is something worth pondering.



A note from Fr. Ben ...

Hello everyone! Most of you reading this have probably heard how good and even necessary silence is for one's prayer life and spiritual health, and I'd like to speak

more on that. A small disclaimer before moving forward: for some people, achieving physical silence is impossible due to their unique physiology, but this is a very small percentage of the population. And when I encourage silence, I speak more importantly of a silent spirit, "internal silence," which is attainable by everyone, even that small percentage that actually cannot achieve physical silence. But if we can remove as many external sources of noise as possible, that will greatly help in our journey towards internal silence. Having said that disclaimer, this is *Stuff I Learned in Seminary Part 25: True Silence*

One of my old professors taught me to always define my terms. "True Silence," then, is when one has achieved a state of total inner silence and receptivity to God. This disposition of spirit is so important that throughout the history of the Church, contemplative orders sprang up and flourished until recent centuries. Their deep, interior life of prayer provided an invisible but critical support to the whole world. Now that they have shrunken immensely, the world has plunged into chaotic noise, sin, and death—as Pope St. John Paul II described it: a culture of death. It makes sense: True silence means greater communion with the God of life, which in turn leads to a flourishing of life. If that foundation of true silence is undermined, then the ultimate result is a culture of death. Now, I do not say this to make us all depressed! I say it as a rallying cry, to push us all back towards rediscovering and embracing true silence. True silence may not be as easy to find as it once was, centuries ago, when life was still not perfect but certainly simpler and quieter. But it is not totally lost to us! We can still find it, and I would argue we need to find it. So that brings me to "How?"

Entering true silence is a skill that must be acquired and trained. I'm almost out of space this week, so in a future column I will give more tips and suggestions. But for now, something that everyone can do, is the most fundamental thing: **pray for trust in divine providence, and ask for the gift of true silence**. Even if we remove all external noise, our minds will keep running with the hundreds of different things going on in our lives. We must learn to let these thoughts come and go, without fixating or remaining on a single one of them, all for the sake of achieving true silence. There are other tips that I've learned on my journey which I want to share with you, so please stay tuned!







January 22 is the anniversary of the 1973 Supreme Court decisions that legalized abortion throughout our nation. Since then, well over 60 million lives have been lost.

Abortion Statistics - Current United States Data -Total number of abortions in the U.S. 1973-2018: 61.8 million+

- 186 abortions per 1,000 live births (according to the Centers for Disease Control-which is lower than the actual count because high abortion states California and New York do not report numbers to the CDC)
- U.S. Abortions in 2017: ~862,320 (Guttmacher Institute)
- Abortions per day: 2362+ (GI)
- Abortions per hour: 98+ (GI)
- 1 abortion every 37 seconds (GI)
- 13.5 abortions / 1000 women aged 15-44 in 2017 (GI)

These statistics include only surgical and medial contraceptive abortions. Because many measures are abortifacients (drugs that induce or cause abortions), it is important not to overlook the number of children killed by chemical abortions. Since 1965, an average of 11 million women have used abortifacient methods of birth control in the United States at any given time. Using formulas based on the way the birth control pill works, pharmacy experts project that about 14 million chemical abortions occur in the United States each year, providing a projected total of well in excess of 610 million chemical abortions between 1965 2009. (Statistics taken from ALL.org; more facts and information can be found there.)


