

From the Pastor's Desk~

On this Fourth Sunday of Easter, the tone and presentation of the Gospel open wide, broadening our perspective. The first three Sundays of the Easter Season have three well-known people as focal points of some post-Resurrection events; Mary of Magdala, Doubting Thomas, and St. Peter. Today and the remaining Sundays before we celebrate the Ascension and Pentecost, we return to some essential teachings of Jesus, which he shared with his disciples and the larger community of his public ministry. Although brief and concise, the upcoming Sunday Gospels are packed full of Easter truths that feed and challenge our souls.

Jesus speaks sixty words in today's Gospel. He uses imagery not familiar to most of us but was crystal clear to those who first heard them; that of a shepherd and his sheep. The societal and cultural life of Jesus' time was defined mainly by agriculture and herding, the two dominant industries of first-century Palestine. From the Book of Genesis, we remember how Cain was to work the land while his younger brother, Abel, tended to the sheep and other livestock. No one in Jesus' time would misunderstand the imagery our Lord used in our scripture this morning, *"My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me."* (Jn 10:27)

We've all seen paintings of Jesus, The Good Shepherd. He is youthful, robust, and fully grown. More European looking than Middle Eastern, Jesus rests a lamb upon his shoulders, steadying it with one hand while the other hand carries the wooden staff of the shepherd's trade. Far from being a religious icon, this image doesn't do much to convey the intimate love and care Jesus has for all of us. In a recent article, Fr John Foley, SJ suggests we moderns might use a different human/animal relationship to understand this spiritual metaphor better. Dogs and their human minders.

Like Fr Foley, I want to clearly state that I have nothing but the highest regard for cats and other domesticated friends, but dogs work best in this case. Here's a little of what he wrote. His observations can be used in your personal meditation and prayer.

"Today, Jesus said sadly that the people looked like sheep without a shepherd. Let us take this opportunity to reflect on animals and their humans.....Look at the endearing way domestic beasts recognize their owners. Dogs collapse into a frenzy of delight when you come home, even if you have been gone only for an hour.


Hysterics are the least they can do.

Did Jesus notice such things? He watched life around him carefully, judging from his stories. He certainly watched the relationship between shepherds and their flocks. So what does he mean by his brief remarks about his sheep this Sunday?

In the Jerusalem of Jesus' day various flocks of sheep would arrive with their respective shepherds, only to be turned into the same sheepfold together. This made for a rather large gang of sheep, and there wasn't any practice of branding or marking to tell which was which. You can see the practical problem right away. Sheep, unlike dogs, do not rejoice themselves into knots when their shepherd shows up. Then how does each shepherd get his own sheep back? Two ways. One, the shepherd knows all his own sheep by heart. He has a special name for each character in the flock. And second, the sheep themselves know their master's voice unmistakably. When he calls out, they simply get up and come to him. They follow him out through the sheep gate. No mistake about it.

And that is Jesus' reference in Sunday's short Gospel. "My sheep hear my voice; I know them, and they follow me," he says. You and I are the sheep he is talking about. He says we "shall never perish, because he holds us in his own hands. In fact, it was the Father

who gave us to Jesus, and no one can ever take us out of the Father's hands. Think about it. Have you ever longed for someone who could make things alright, who could help lift the responsibility from your shoulders? Someone who knows you by name and cares about you? Maybe you do recognize Jesus' voice when you hear it. It might be in the Gospel at Mass. Or when you receive the bread of everlasting life and the cup of salvation—not as a stranger might, but as a member of the well-fed and greatly cared for the flock.



This Sunday, what about trying to notice how your spirit automatically inclines to Jesus? How you settle into his grasp for petting. How your soul seeks him. And finds him." Peace. Fr Peter

En este cuarto domingo de Pascua, el tono y la presentación del Evangelio se abren de par en par, ampliando nuestra perspectiva. Los tres primeros domingos del Tiempo de Pascua tienen a tres personajes conocidos como puntos centrales de algunos acontecimientos posteriores a la Resurrección: María de Magdala, Tomás el Dudososo y San Pedro. Hoy y los restantes domingos antes de celebrar la Ascensión y Pentecostés, volvemos a algunas enseñanzas esenciales de Jesús, que compartió con sus discípulos y con la comunidad más amplia de su ministerio público. Aunque breves y concisos, los Evangelios de los próximos domingos están repletos de verdades pascuales que alimentan y desafían nuestras almas.

Jesús pronuncia sesenta palabras en el Evangelio de hoy. Utiliza imágenes que no nos resultan familiares a la mayoría de nosotros, pero que fueron muy claras para quienes las escucharon por primera vez: la de un pastor y sus ovejas. La vida social y cultural de la época de Jesús se definía principalmente por la agricultura y el pastoreo, las dos industrias dominantes de la Palestina del siglo I. En el libro del Génesis, recordamos cómo Caín debía trabajar la tierra mientras su hermano menor, Abel, cuidaba las ovejas y el resto del ganado. Nadie en la época de Jesús entendería mal la imagen que nuestro Señor utilizó en nuestra escritura de esta mañana: *"Mis ovejas oyen mi voz; yo las conozco y me siguen". (Jn 10,27)*

Todos hemos visto cuadros de Jesús, el Buen Pastor. Es joven, robusto y completamente crecido. Con un aspecto más europeo que de Oriente Medio, Jesús descansa un cordero sobre sus hombros, sosteniéndolo con una mano mientras la otra lleva el bastón de madera del oficio de pastor. Lejos de ser un ícono religioso, esta imagen no hace mucho por transmitir el íntimo amor y cuidado que Jesús tiene por todos nosotros. En un artículo reciente, el P. John Foley, SJ sugiere que los modernos podríamos utilizar una relación humana/animal diferente para entender mejor esta metáfora espiritual. Los perros y sus cuidadores humanos.

Al igual que el padre Foley, quiero dejar claro que no tengo más que la más alta consideración por los gatos y otros amigos domésticos, pero los perros son los que mejor funcionan en este caso. He aquí un poco de lo que escribió. Sus observaciones pueden ser utilizadas en tu meditación y oración personal.

"Hoy, Jesús dijo con tristeza que la gente parecía ovejas sin pastor. Aprovechamos esta oportunidad para reflexionar sobre los animales y sus seres humanos..... Fíjate en la forma entrañable en que las bestias domésticas reconocen a sus dueños. Los perros se derrumban en un frenesí de alegría cuando llegas a casa, aunque sólo lleves una hora fuera. El histerismo es lo menos que pueden hacer

¿Se dio cuenta Jesús de estas cosas? A juzgar por sus relatos, observaba atentamente la vida a su alrededor. Sin duda, observaba la relación entre los pastores y sus rebaños. Entonces, ¿qué quiere decir con sus breves comentarios sobre sus ovejas este domingo?

En la Jerusalén de la época de Jesús, varios rebaños de ovejas llegaban con sus respectivos pastores, para entrar juntos en el mismo redil. Esto hacía que el grupo de ovejas fuera bastante numeroso, y no existía la práctica de marcarlas para saber cuál era cada una. El problema práctico se ve enseguida. Las ovejas, a diferencia de los perros, no se reúnen en nudos cuando aparece su pastor. Entonces, ¿cómo hace cada pastor para recuperar su propia oveja?

De dos maneras. Una, el pastor conoce a todas sus ovejas de memoria. Tiene un nombre especial para cada personaje del rebaño. Y segundo, las propias ovejas conocen la voz de su amo de forma inequívoca. Cuando las llama, simplemente se levantan y vienen hacia él. Le siguen por la puerta de las ovejas. No hay duda de ello.

Y esa es la referencia de Jesús en el breve Evangelio del domingo. "Mis ovejas oyen mi voz; yo las conozco y me siguen", dice. Tú y yo somos las ovejas de las que habla. Dice que "no pereceremos jamás", porque nos tiene en sus manos. De hecho, fue el Padre quien nos entregó a Jesús, y nadie podrá jamás quitarnos de las manos del Padre. Piensa en ello. ¿Has anhelado alguna vez a alguien que pueda arreglar las cosas, que te ayude a quitarte la responsabilidad de encima? ¿Alguien que te conozca por tu nombre y se preocupe por ti?

Tal vez reconozcas la voz de Jesús cuando la oigas. Puede ser en el Evangelio de la Misa. O cuando recibes el pan de la vida eterna y la copa de la salvación, no como un extraño, sino como un miembro del rebaño bien alimentado y cuidado.

Este domingo, ¿qué tal si intentas notar cómo tu espíritu se inclina automáticamente hacia Jesús? Cómo se acomoda a su alcance para ser acariciado. Cómo tu alma lo busca. Y lo encuentra". Paz. P. Pedro




SOCIETY OF OUR LADY CAMPAIGN

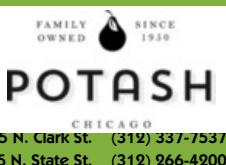


