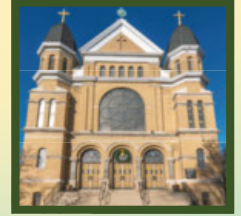

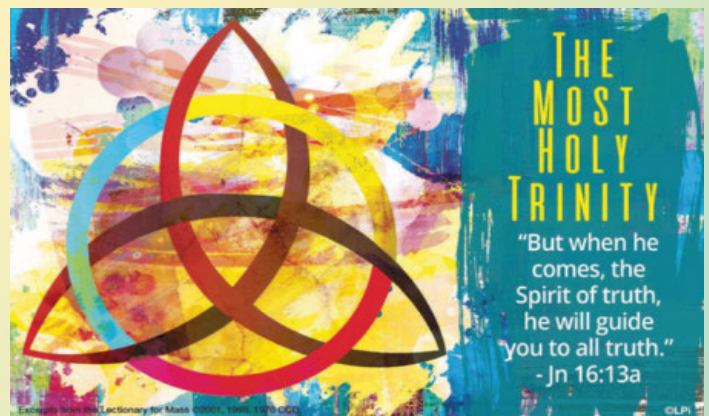

From the Pastor's Desk~

Comic Book Superheroes are big business and are in the Big Time of the movie industry. Christopher Reeve's portrayal of Superman got the ball rolling in 1979 with a total of four blockbuster movies in nine years, grossing \$500,400,000. The Batman movies did a little better, earning \$700 million in box office receipts. That is a lot of money for two comic book heroes!

Recent years have seen tremendous growth in the Comic Book genre in motion pictures. Over 400 comic book Super Hero movies have been made in the past 30 years- each one either breaking even or making a profit. Today, Batman and Superman are no longer King of the Hill. They compete with Captain America, Wonder Woman, X-Men, and other superheroes. DC Comics and Marvel are head and shoulders above everyone else. Together they banked over \$28 billion. If they were a country, they would rank 104 out of 211 in GDP, settling in between Iceland and El Salvador!

Many newer "heroes" do not come from a different universe or secret world (Superman, Wonder Woman, Thor). They are products of freak accidents or horrendous events in a dystopian world and manage to do good while struggling with their new identity. Spiderman and The Hulk are victims of radioactive exposure. The X-Men's powers are linked to mutations, while others from failed scientific experiments. Like all genres of art and literature, the Comics speak to and address issues that mirror those in our "non-superhero" ordinary lives. Their popularity is evidence of that. Many people see their struggles represented on the pages of comic books or the Superheroes portrayed on the silver screen.

This is nothing new. The earliest tales of the oldest civilizations and societies have heroes, arch enemies, and damsels in distress. The ancient Greeks and Romans have their pantheon of gods. Vikings tell their tales of Odin. Lord Rama, General Yue Fei, "Pogumk and Pook-Jin-Skwess" point to the brave, loyal, and fearless heroes of India, China, and the North American Indigenous. In modern times, the stories of Simba and Mulan are regularly told by parents to their children. Our need for heroes will be with us for a long time. We commemorate and honor our heroes, The Saints, in our Catholic Christian faith. In the Canon of Saints of the Catholic Church, there are over 10,000 names on the official list. The vast majority of our Saints are known to history and were real people. Despite a few whose provenance is a bit sketchy, their stories are well documented. But even their dubious accounts can teach and inspire us today. St. John Paul II often encouraged young people to emulate the Saints and strive to become saints themselves.

Saints and heroes are important. We need examples of how to live in trying times. Whether they come from the annals of history or the pens of creative writers, the stories of Saints and heroes give us hope. They can open our minds to discover ways to engage with the challenges that beset our society today. Our Saints, in particular, remind us that we share the same faith and possess the same gifts of the Holy Spirit that they relied on during difficulty in their age. Their example and intercession can inspire us to trust in Jesus and take responsibility for our lives and the world.

During our Summer Sunday Evening Mass in our parish garden chapel, I will share some thoughts on an essay recently shared by Pope Francis. On May 8th, Good Shepherd Sunday, he gave a talk titled "**Called to Build the Human Family**", containing five topics, or invitations, for the Church to reflect upon and pray. The first topic is entitled "*Called to be Protagonists Together of the Church's Mission.*" He rightly states that God believes in us, His children, and has endowed each of us with gifts and talents needed in today's changing world. Protagonists are heroes who do not shy away from adversity. Through the Holy Spirit, they are led by Christ himself to become "*missionary disciples and agents for evangelization.*"

I hope that many of you will be able to celebrate Sunday Mass with us in our garden chapel this evening, beginning at 6 pm. I'll see you then. *Peace. Fr. Peter*

Los superhéroes de los cómics son un gran negocio y se encuentran en el Big Time de la industria cinematográfica. La interpretación de Christopher Reeve de Superman dio el pistoletazo de salida en 1979 con un total de cuatro películas de éxito en nueve años, recaudando 500.400.000 dólares. A las películas de Batman les fue un poco mejor, ya que recaudaron 700 millones de dólares en taquilla. Es mucho dinero para dos héroes de cómic.



En los últimos años se ha producido un enorme crecimiento del género del cómic en el cine. En los últimos 30 años se han realizado más de 400 películas de superhéroes de cómic, todas ellas con beneficios o sin ellos. Hoy en día, Batman y Superman ya no son el rey de la colina. Compiten con el Capitán América, la Mujer Maravilla, los X-Men y otros superhéroes. DC Comics y Marvel están por encima de todos los demás. Juntos han recaudado más de 28.000 millones de dólares. Si fueran un país, ocuparían el puesto 104 de 211 en el PIB, situándose entre Islandia y El Salvador. Muchos de los nuevos "héroes" no proceden de un universo diferente o de un mundo secreto (Superman, Wonder Woman, Thor). Son producto de accidentes extraños o acontecimientos horrendos en un mundo distópico y se las arreglan para hacer el bien mientras luchan con su nueva identidad. Spiderman y Hulk son víctimas de una exposición radiactiva. Los poderes de los X-Men están ligados a mutaciones, mientras que los de otros son fruto de experimentos científicos fallidos. Como todos los géneros artísticos y literarios, los cómics hablan y abordan temas que reflejan los de nuestras vidas ordinarias "no superheroicas". Su popularidad es una prueba de ello. Muchas personas ven sus luchas representadas en las páginas de los cómics o en los Superhéroes representados en la gran pantalla.

Esto no es nada nuevo. Los primeros relatos de las civilizaciones y sociedades más antiguas tienen héroes, archienemigos y damiselas en apuros. Los antiguos griegos y romanos tienen su panteón de dioses. Los vikingos cuentan sus historias de Odín. El Señor Rama, el General Yue Fei, "Pogumk y Pook-Jin-Skwess" señalan a los valientes, leales e intrépidos héroes de la India, China y los indígenas norteamericanos. En los tiempos modernos, las historias de Simba y Mulán son contadas regularmente por los padres a sus hijos. Nuestra necesidad de héroes nos acompañará durante mucho tiempo.

En nuestra fe cristiana católica conmemoramos y honramos a nuestros héroes, los santos. En el Canon de los Santos de la Iglesia Católica, hay más de 10.000 nombres en la lista oficial. La gran mayoría de nuestros santos son conocidos por la historia y fueron personas reales. A pesar de unos pocos cuya procedencia es un poco imprecisa, sus historias están bien documentadas. Pero incluso sus dudosos relatos pueden enseñarnos e inspirarnos hoy. San Juan Pablo II animaba a menudo a los jóvenes a emular a los santos y a esforzarse por convertirse ellos mismos en santos.

Los santos y los héroes son importantes. Necesitamos ejemplos de cómo vivir en tiempos difíciles. Ya sea que provengan de los anales de la historia o de la pluma de escritores creativos, las historias de santos y héroes nos dan esperanza. Pueden abrir nuestras mentes para descubrir formas de enfrentarse a los retos que acosan a nuestra sociedad actual. Nuestros santos, en particular, nos recuerdan que compartimos la misma fe y poseemos los mismos dones del Espíritu Santo en los que ellos se apoyaron durante las dificultades de su época. Su ejemplo e intercesión pueden inspirarnos a confiar en Jesús y a asumir la responsabilidad de nuestras vidas y del mundo.

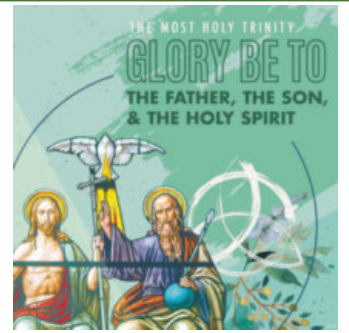

rece. El primer tema se titula "Llamados a ser protagonistas juntos de la misión de la Iglesia". Afirma, con razón, que Dios cree en nosotros, sus hijos, y nos ha dotado a cada uno de dones y talentos necesarios en el cambiante mundo actual. Los protagonistas son héroes que no rehúyen la adversidad. A través del Espíritu Santo, son guiados por el propio Cristo para convertirse en "discípulos misioneros y agentes de evangelización".

The Most Holy Trinity



In creative celebration of the Most Holy Trinity, pray a rosary with creation. Find a quiet place outside or sit near a window. Contemplate the amazing Divine Gift that is before you. Admire it. Study it. Become one with it. Ask for the guidance of Brother St. Francis as you pray: "You, Holy Father, are King of heaven and earth. You are three in one, God above all gods. You are good, all good, and supreme good, Lord God, living and true. You are love. You are beauty. You are gentleness. You are joy. You are hope and happiness." Admire the wonder and majesty of God in all that is around you. Ask for wisdom and understanding.

Begin each decade with the Our Father and conclude with the Glory Be.

Decade one: Contemplate God the Father. As you pray each bead with a Hail Mary, get lost in the grandeur of all that you see. Imagine the thousands and thousands of years of history that is before you. Envision a time when nothing existed. What is nothing? Lift your eyes, heart, and soul to the power and magnificence of the universe, its expanse and its endlessness. You are one with it all. God's creative power.

Decade two: Contemplate God the Son. Behold the squirrels, birds, and critters all conducting life's business. They have heartbeats just like yours. Praying each bead, become one with the incarnate divine life that flows through you and flows with the smallest of creatures. It is holy innocence and blessed life. Tenderness. Compassion, Mercy. Reverence. All want to be held, have a home, and be loved. God in all things. Emmanuel.

Decade three: Contemplate God the Holy Spirit. The changing of times and seasons happens often without notice. It is all within God's care and guided. We all belong. Behold the living, dying, and rising to new life. You are one with all time from beginning into eternity.

Decade Four: Contemplate God as One.

Decade Five: Contemplate God as three. All different while remaining one. The divine dance is being danced before you. Rest in what you see. Become what you see. We are all connected: God of the Holy Trinity, creation, our brothers and sisters, the animals, and the plants.

The rosary you have prayed celebrates the circle of connectedness and the intimate relationship we share with all things: a glimpse of the Trinity.

Recognize God In Your Ordinary Moments

Up to the Job

Have you ever had a job for which you didn't feel qualified? I think we all have, whether it was a paying gig or not. A lot of us parents often feel in awe of the magnitude of that role and lose sleep worrying that we made the wrong decision in one situation or a bad call in another. Some of us feel intimidated by what our communities need from us, on the parish level or in our personal relationships. Or maybe we are simply dreading a task that seems too big, too overwhelming — that necessary basement cleanout, or the weekly organization of family schedules.

When we don't feel qualified, we don't want to do the work. We get stuck in our own fear. That's the birthplace of procrastination, self-doubt and bitterness. When we look inward at our own abilities, we can only see all the traits that aren't there. The intelligence, the dexterity, the ambition — whatever it is we lack, we get stuck on it.

I've got good news and bad news. I'll start with the bad news: none of us are qualified for the call of discipleship. We simply aren't. We don't have the love or grace or strength to get the job done.

Now I'll give you the good news: God knows this, and He doesn't care. Stewardship does not insist that we possess every good quality — no, as a way of life, stewardship recognizes that we lack *so many* qualities. But it shows us where to find the love and grace and strength we need. Stewardship does not demand that we know every answer; it merely reminds us who to ask when we don't.

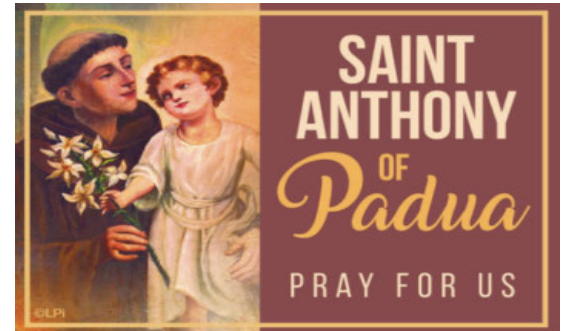

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Saint Germaine Cousin | June 15

Saint Germaine was born in Pibrac, France in 1579 to poor parents. Her story is a heart wrenching one. She was born with a deformed right arm and hand, and her mother died when she was an infant. Her father remarried, but her stepmother brutally abused and neglected her.

As a child Germaine suffered from scrofula, a disfiguring form of tuberculosis which causes swelling and lesions on the side of the neck. Already sick, abused, and starving, she was forced to sleep in barn with sheep she tended.

Despite everything, Germaine lived each day tending her flock with joy and in prayer. Mary and Jesus became her friends. She shared what little she had and taught the children of the village about God’s love. A rosary made of string knots was her constant companion. She attended Mass every day, leaving her sheep in care of guardian angels. Her flock was never attacked by wolves and never wandered. Some claimed to see the waters of the flooded river part so she could get to Mass.

She is often portrayed with an apron full of flowers because one winter day her stepmother accused her of stealing bread from the house and hiding it her apron. But when she was seized and forced to open the apron an abundance of spring flowers tumbled forth. It was this incident that compelled the villagers and even her parents to recognize her holiness.

Germaine died at 22, her poor body was found by her father, in the barn where she slept. She was buried in the village church. More than forty years later, her body was accidentally exhumed and found to be incorrupt. She was canonized by Pope Pius IX in 1867 and inscribed into the canon of virgins. ©LPi

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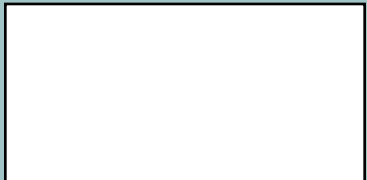
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
