Toward Jerusalem

Jesus is fierce in Sunday's Gospel. He is on the march and will not be turned back. Sometimes the readings startle us. He "rebukes" the disciples. He shouts "let the dead bury the dead" to a man who wants to bury his father and then follow Jesus. Jesus is moving fast, and his mood is intense. Get ready for it. But what is the reason for this intensity?

Do you remember back when Jesus began his public ministry before Lent and Easter? He came from the desert filled with the Holy Spirit and headed straight to Nazareth, his home town. He wanted to preach his mission. His own townspeople rejected him. They were more than blunt about it: they tried to throw him off a cliff (Luke 4:14ff).

We had been in the "Galilean Ministry" as scholars call it (Luke 3:1 -9:50) (except for the insertion of Lent and Easter). Now a new section of Luke begins. It is called the "Journey to Jerusalem" (Luke 9:51-19:28). This new phase begins with the rejection of Jesus!

He leaves his home town. The people in Samaritan towns turn him away. He had sent messengers ahead to "warm up the audience," so to speak, but the villagers would not let him enter. Of course, Jews and Samaritans were hostile to each other, and surely that is part of the reason for the rejection of him. But Luke says the real reason is that they knew he was "going up to Jerusalem."*

Think about that phrase, "going up to Jerusalem." The "going up" part is literal, since Jerusalem is built upon a hill or rise and you have to climb to get up to it. But Luke wanted the metaphorical sense too. Jesus had set his face to "go up" to the height of the cross. The Greek word Luke uses for "go up" is the same one used in the Second Book of Kings for the prophet Elijah's ascent into heaven (2 Kings 2:11):

"A flaming chariot and flaming horses came ... and Elijah went up to heaven in a whirlwind".

But for Jesus, "going up" will not be in a fiery chariot. His "ascent" will end up in a huge plunge downwards into humiliation and death. The hill of Golgotha was high and barren and his life's ending was low and shameful.

From this point, for the next ten chapters, Luke will skillfully trace Jesus' deeds in his urgent trip to Jerusalem. Maybe we can see now why Jesus was so severe with people in the reading for today. He knew what going up to Jerusalem would mean.

There is a question contained in all this, one we should think about. Do we want to go along with this man on his journey? What if we hear him say, "the Son of Man has nowhere to rest his head." Neither will we. Or, "no one who sets a hand to the plow and looks back is fit for the kingdom of God"? Very harsh. Wouldn't you or I and turn on our heels and run away?

Yes, certainly. But think about it. Jesus is saying that Christianity (and Catholicism) are challenges, not just warm blankets. Jesus values God more than safe sleep, than family funerals, even more than mere courtesy to relations and friends. None of these are evil or bad, they are good. But they receive their worth from love. They are rooted in God-love as was Jesus' life. The primary reason for our existence and our deeds is the mission Jesus so urgently invites us to. Love of God above all. Love of our neighbor as ourselves, no matter what.

Hacia Jerusalén

Jesús es feroz en el Evangelio para este domingo. Está en camino y se niega a darse media vuelta. A veces nos asombran la lecturas. El "reprende" a los discípulos. A un hombre que quiere enterrar

a su padre antes de seguir a Jesús, le grita, "deja que los muertos entierren a sus muertos." Va rápido, y su ánimo es intenso. Prepárate para eso. Pero, ¿cuál es el motivo de su intensidad?

¿Recuerdas el comienzo del ministerio público de Jesús? Oímos de eso antes de la Cuaresma y la Pascua. Regresó del desierto lleno del Espíritu Santo, y se dirigió directamente a su pueblo natal, Nazaret. Quería predicar su misión. Pero su propia gente lo rechazó. Es más, intentaron despeñarlo. (San Lucas 4:14ff).

Antes estábamos en "El ministerio galileo" (San Lucas 3:1-9:50), como le dicen los estudiosos (con la excepción de la Cuaresma y la Pascua). Ahora empieza una nueva sección del Evangelio según San Lucas. Se llama "El viaje a Jerusalén" (San Lucas 9:51-19:28). Esta nueva etapa comienza con un rechazo de Jesús.

Deja su pueblo natal. La gente de Samaría no lo recibe. Había enviado antes a mensajeros para prepararle alojamiento, pero los samaritanos no lo dejaron entrar. Había hostilidad entre los judíos y los samaritanos; sin duda, esa animosidad es parte del motivo de su rechazo. Pero San Lucas dice que la verdadera razón es que sabían que "subía a Jerusalén."*

"Subir a Jerusalén." Considera esa frase. La subida es literal, ya que Jerusalén se ubica sobre un cerro o una cuesta, y uno tiene que subir para llegar. Pero San Lucas quería el sentido metafórico también. Jesús subía también hacia la cruz. La palabra en griego que San Lucas emplea para "subir" es la misma que se encuentra en el segundo libro de Reyes para el ascenso de Elías al cielo. (2 Reyes 2:11)

"Un carro de fuego, con caballos de fuego, separó al uno del otro; y Elías subió al cielo en un torbellino."

Pero Jesús no ascenderá en un carro de fuego. Su "ascensión" terminará en una caída súbita hacia la humillación y la muerte. El monte de Gólgota era alto y yermo, y su muerte era baja y vergonzosa.

Durante los próximos diez capítulos, San Lucas trazará los hechos de Jesús en su viaje urgente hacia Jerusalén. Tal vez ahora podemos ver por qué Jesús habló tan fuertemente con la gente en la lectura para hoy. Sabía lo que significaba subir a Jerusalén. En todo esto, hay una pregunta que debemos tener en cuenta.

¿Queremos acompañar a este hombre en su viaje? ¿Y si le oímos decir, "El Hijo del hombre no tiene donde reclinar la cabeza," [y nosotros tampoco lo tendremos] O, "El que echa mano al arado y sigue mirando atrás no vale para el Reino de Dios." Muy severo. ¿Acaso tú y yo no daríamos la media vuelta?

Sí. Pero piénsalo bien. Jesús dice que el cristianismo (y el catolicismo) son retos; no son mantas abrigadoras. Jesús pone a Dios sobre el sueño seguro, el funeral de un familiar, hasta sobre la deferencia hacia los amigos y los parientes. Ninguno de ellos es malo, todos son buenos. Pero reciben su valor del amor. El amor divino. El motivo principal de nuestras vidas y nuestros hechos es la misión a la que Jesús nos invita con tanta urgencia. Amar a Dios sobre todas las cosas. Amar al prójimo como a ti mismo, pase lo que pase.

SOCIETY OF OUR LADY CAMPAIGN


The success of *The Society of Our Lady Campaign* will help Our Lady of the Holy Family parish meet our Pastoral Year 2021-2022 Budget.

ST. MARIA GORETTI



Have you heard of the patron saint of purity? Born to peasant parents in southern Italy, St. Maria Goretti was a devout girl whose life was marked by difficulty. Her father died when she was nine, leaving her single mother with six mouths to feed. Two neighbors helped on the family farm, including a young man named Alessandro.

He began making crude comments towards Maria. She repeatedly denied him. After several years, Alessandro attacked Maria to force himself

on her. She resisted and, in his anger, Alessandro stabbed her.

Maria died from the wounds' infections, but her last words were "I forgive Alessandro Serenelli, and I want him with me in heaven forever." While he was in prison, Maria appeared to Alessandro with a bouquet of roses, one for each wound he inflicted.

In a true miracle of mercy, Alessandro experienced repentance, became a Franciscan brother after his release, and was later present at Maria's canonization. St. Maria Goretti, pray for us! LPI



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
