WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question:

What happens to a consecrated host if it accidentally falls to the ground?

Answer:

This a very practical question because, as we all know, accidents happen, even during the most careful celebration of the liturgy. The short answer to this question is that nothing happens to the consecrated host. The Real Presence of Jesus remains in the consecrated host or any consecrated wine that might accidentally be spilled.

Another question we might ask is: How should the minsters respond if the Eucharist is dropped or spilled? If this happens, the priest, deacon, or extraordinary minister of holy Communion should immediately pick up the dropped host and consume it. If it is a case of the Precious Blood being spilled, the minister would use the purificator (and additional purificators if needed) to clean the spill and then the area should be reverently washed as soon as the Mass is over and the water poured into the sacrarium (a special sink that is located in church sacristies for reverently disposing of holy water, the water used to clean sacred vessels, etc.).

LITURGICAL LIFE OUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

First Reading:

The prophet Isaiah foresaw a time of great joy for Israel when nations and kings would come to Israel praising the Lord. How do you show gratitude to the Lord for the great joys of your life?

Second Reading:

It was revealed to Paul that God intended to save all people (Jews and Gentiles) through his Son, Jesus Christ. Paul tried to convey the significance of this revelation to the Ephesians by using the language of "coheirs" and "copartners." What does this language signal to you?

Gospel Reading:

The visit of the magi is one of the most well-known stories from the Gospel infancy narratives. It was an event that manifested God's revelation of His newborn Son to the world. It also foreshadowed the threat that some would experience because of Jesus. How does Jesus challenge the status quo even today?

From the Desk of Stuart Wicke, Director of Music

The Epiphany of the Lord is one of the oldest celebrations in the Catholic church, going as far back as the 4th century. In many places, the United States being one of them, the Epiphany can be celebrated on the second Sunday after Christmas; but historically it has had a fixed date of January 6. January 6 in the early church became a very important holiday – the Nativity of the Lord, what we now call Christmas, was far less celebrated than the Epiphany, and many of the Christmas traditions we carry on today began as celebrations of "Old Christmas", often called Twelfth Night because it was the twelfth and final day of the Christmas season.

Christmas carols were traditionally sung door-to-door on the eve of January 6, not December 25. Many of the traditional carols we still sing today have roots in Twelfth Night traditions. Some, like "The First Nowell" or "God Rest Ye Merry, Gentlemen" had tens of verses which told the full story of Christmas, from Jesus's birth to the arrival of the Magi. Others had absolutely nothing to do with Jesus, Christmas, or anything remotely sacred – songs like "We Wish You a Merry Christmas" or "Here We Come A-Wassailing" were sung in the hopes that whoever opened the door would invite the singers in to partake in the festivities of Twelfth Night.

Even the food and drink we traditionally make at Christmastime have their roots in old Twelfth Night traditions – spices, especially cloves, nutmeg, and cinnamon, have been used in seasonal cooking for centuries to represent the three gifts of the Magi at the Epiphany. King cake, which here in the U.S. is most often associated with Mardi Gras in New Orleans, began as a French and Spanish tradition on the Feast of the Epiphany (Three Kings' Cake) – a figurine of the baby Jesus was baked into a cake, and whoever found it would host the celebration on Candlemas in February.

Next week we will celebrate the Feast of the Baptism of the Lord; but for most of church history, Jesus's baptism was recognized on January 6 as well, and so was his sign at the Marriage of Cana. Along with the adoration of the Magi, these three events represented the moments in which Jesus's divinity was revealed to people on earth.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton

The patron saint of Catholic schools, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton (August 28, 1774 – January 4, 1821) was born in New York City to a prominent family of the Episcopal faith. When she turned 19, she married a wealthy businessman with whom she had five children.He later died of tuberculosis in 1803.

leaving her a young widow. After discovering the Catholic faith in Italy, where her husband had died, she returned to New York and converted to Catholicism in 1805.

After several years struggling as a single mother, Elizabeth moved in 1809 to Emmitsburg, Maryland, where she founded the Sisters of Charity of St. Joseph, the first community for religious women established in the United States. She also began St. Joseph's Academy and Free School, which started a chain reaction of Catholic-based education in the United States that continues today.

St. Elizabeth Ann Seton was canonized September 14, 1975 in St. Peter's Square by Pope Paul VI and was the first citizen born in the United States to be given the title of "saint."


