

#### WHY DO WE DO THAT? Catholic Life Explained:

Question: I've heard people call Jesus' conception by the Holy Spirit being "immaculately conceived." Is that what the Immaculate Conception is?

**Answer:** While these two events are often confused, they are not the same thing. We celebrated the conception of Jesus on March 25th, the feast of the Annunciation. While that was surely miraculous, it isn't what we refer to as the "immaculate conception." The Immaculate Conception is Mary's conception, and we typically celebrate it on December 8th. If the 8th happens to be a Sunday, the Church moves the feast to December 9th. It is a holy day of obligation. Why does the Church consider it so important to celebrate?

Mary's conception is immaculate because she was conceived without original sin. The angel Gabriel acknowledges this when he hails Mary as "full of grace" (Luke 1:28). Scripture scholars identify several theological ideas that confirm this. In the Old Testament, the sacred, pristine Ark of the Covenant held the presence of God. The presence of God is now held within a new "arc" - the womb of Mary. Genesis 3 also prophesies of a woman who would oppose the devil and whose child would crush the devil's head. Christ is the "New Adam." This passage sets up Mary, then, as the "New Eve." Jesus and Mary are the beginnings of a new creation, one we all can participate in through the grace of our baptism. After all, God's love is more "original" than our sin!

#### LITURGICAL LIFE QUESTIONS OF THE WEEK

#### First Reading:

In his call to be a prophet, the Lord informs Jeremiah of both the human resistance and the divine providence that lies ahead for him. When have you felt God's presence in the midst of turmoil in your life?

#### Second Reading:

Paul eloquently defines the spiritual virtue of "love" for the Christians in Corinth. How well do you live by the standards of love as defined by Paul?

#### Gospel Reading:

The people of Nazareth were "filled with fury" at Jesus' words to them. How do you imagine Jesus reacted to being rejected by those in his hometown of Nazareth?



#### From the Desk of Stuart Wicke, Director of Music

This week we celebrate two holy days in the church: on Wednesday, the Presentation of the Lord, often called Candlemas, and on Thursday, the feast of St. Blaise, who is revered as a healer and called a physician of souls. The Presentation, or Candlemas, celebrates the day on which Mary and Joseph arrived in Jerusalem to present Jesus to the temple. In Wednesday's Gospel reading we hear this story, and the canticle of Simeon which is sung at the temple. According to St. Ivo of Chartres, the lighting of candles on this day symbolizes the presentation of Jesus: the flame of a candle represents the light of Christ, enlightening the darkness in our lives. This is very similar to the symbolism of Christmas which lights the darkness of the season of Advent; and in fact, Candlemas, the fortieth day after December 25, historically marked the end of the Christmas season.

One of the traditions of Candlemas was to bring taper candles from home to be blessed at the Mass. At night all of the candles in the house would be burned at the same time. The light of these candles represented not just the light of Christ but also represented the turning of the season – as the midpoint between the start of winter and the start of spring, February 2 was a day to prepare for the end of winter and to look forward to longer days in the spring. We still use February 2 as a day to forecast the end of winter outside of the church a tradition that began in Germany as Badger Day, or here in the U.S., Groundhog Day.

Taper candles would be blessed at Mass for use in the church as well. Some of the candles blessed on February 2 are used to bless the throats of parishioners on February 3, the feast day of St. Blaise. St. Blaise was a bishop and martyr in Sebastia, present-day Armenia, who lived in the third and fourth centuries. In life, he became well-known as a doctor and healer. One of the miracles attributed to him was the saving of a young boy who was choking on a fishbone; this led to his invocation as a protector against illnesses of the throat.

This week as we celebrate these two holy days, here are two prayers we can offer, one for the Presentation of the Lord, and one for the Feast of St. Blaise.

For Presentation: Lord God, you are the source of everlasting light. Your son, our beloved Lord Jesus was presented in the temple 40 days after his birth. He was recognized by Simeon and Anna, and welcomed as the promised Messiah. May we like them, behold the glory of the Lord Jesus. Grant that we may stand before you with hearts cleansed by your forgiving love. May we serve you all our days and make your name known as we worship you as our Lord. So may we come by your grace to eternal life . Amen.

For St. Blaise: O God, deliver us through the intercession of Thy holy bishop and martyr Blaise, from all evil of soul and body, especially from all ills of the throat; and grant us the grace to make a good confession in the confident hope of obtaining Thy pardon, and ever to praise with worthy lips Thy most holy name. Through Christ our Lord. Amen.

#### WATERSTEP - DONATE SHOES-SAVE LIVES

#### St. Blaise



You may be familiar with the annual "blessing of throats" that many parishes in the United States use to commemorate the beloved bishop and martyr. St. Blaise lived in the fourth century in Turkey and Armenia. Due to religious persecution, he was forced to flee and hide in a cave in the back country in order to save his life.

History has it that one day a group of hunters stumbled upon where St. Blaise was living. They found the bishop kneeling in prayer, surrounded by wolves, lions and bears that he had tamed. The legend has it that as the hunters dragged Blaise off to prison, a mother came with her young son who had a fish bone lodged in his throat. At Blaise's command, the child was able to cough up the bone and thus lived.

Today we remember the saint on his feast day by taking two candles, crossing them against the throat, and saying the following prayer: Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from ailments of the throat and from every other evil. In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.
