From Our Rabbi

One of the children's stories I tell talks of the difference between that toy with which we play at Hanukkah and that toy with which we play at Purim. The story boils down to the lesson we can learn from that difference between a dreidel and a graegger. I delight in telling the story, especially with the use of appropriate props. But that difference is meant to be profound and best understood by looking at our festival calendar, as I learned with one of my teachers.


Our year begins with Pesach--when God redeemed us out of bondage, out of the land of Egypt. We are born, the Sea of Reeds our birth canal. While Rosh Hashanah is the universal new year, Pesach is the Jewish new year, in the spring.

Then Shavuot, that moment at Sinai when God gave us Torah. Yet we descend to the golden calf. Such leads to 17th of Tammuz which begins the threeweek period of sadness leading to Tisha b'Av---the saddest time in Jewish year.

Then we begin to ascend again. For during the month of Elul, we reconcile with God as we seek forgiveness from our sins. We understand that Moses is atop Sinai for 40 days encountering with God from 1 Elul to Yom Kippur. The second set of tablets and we are reconciled with God.

Then, with Sukkot, we rejoice but know that winter approaches. Finally Hanukkah and Purim. Yes, Tu b'Shevat slips in there beginning growth again. But it is inat Hanukkah and Purim, those late additions to our festival calendar, that I wish to look. As the rabbis came to understand Hanukkah, a great miracle happened there in the land of Israel. Picture the dreidel—which way does its handle point? The handle points up reflecting the miracle, that help came from God.

And we then come to Purim, our last festival of the year. So now picture the graegger. Which way does its handle point? It is the opposite of Hanukkah for the handle now faces down. In other words, God is now behind the scenes, not even mentioned in Megillat Esther, in the book of Esther. In a sense, the handle now points at us. The miracle will not come from above; we have to bring about it ourselves. Pesach showed us that redemption is possible; on Purim, we must, with our own hands as our festival year comes to an end, make it happen.

As we watch the horrors in Ukrainehow we wish we could do more. Yes, much now is in the hands of our country's leadership and in the hands of the countries of NATO. What is in our hands is the ability to give and give generously—to all those suffering from the terrors of the Russian onslaught, to the three and a half million plus people who are now refugees, to our Jewish siblings numbering anywhere between 40,000 and 200,000 including some 10,000 Holocaust survivors. Give to the many organizations and charities stepping in to be of assistance. We have directed contributions to our Sol Dorf Tzedakah Box to the Ukraine Crisis Fund of the World Union for Progressive Judaism. Give to HIAS, give to Jewish Federations of North America's Ukraine Emergency Relief Fund. Be prepared to stretch out our hands to welcome more refugees to our shores. As we concluded the haftarah from the prophet Jeremiah on the Shabbat after Purim, "For I the Eternal act with kindness, justice, and equity in the world; for in these I delight." May we do God's work.

Director of Lifelong Learning

"You shall not oppress a stranger, as you yourself know the feelings of a stranger, for you also were strangers in

the land of Egypt." - Exodus 23:9

Exodus 23:9 can also be translated as "for you know the heart of a stranger." In my opinion, that is such a gorgeous translation. It is also the definition of empathy. Psychologists often define empathy as knowing the heart of a stranger. With our theme this year being, "If I am not for myself, who will be for me? If I am only for myself, what am I? If not now, when?" one of the big questions is how do we increase our empathy towards one another and towards those we do not even know?

I would suggest as Jews we begin with our sources. No fewer than 36 times throughout Torah do we read how we must treat the stranger because of our experience in Egypt. Our haggadot, which we will soon be opening for our Passover seders, will remind us that because we were strangers in the land of Egypt, we therefore must welcome strangers to our own seder. We will recite, "Let all who are hungry come and eat. Let all who are in distress come and celebrate Passover with us."

Both Torah study and the celebration of the Passover seder therefore has the potential to build empathy, to be relevant and meaningful, to connect us to one another in deep and fulfilling ways, and to have fun while doing so. If you are interested in how to make empathy be a focus of your seder experience, please join me for Schmoozin' with Susan on Sunday, April 3, at 10:20 am. We will also discuss several other foci as well. On Sunday, April 10, at 1:00 pm if you want to celebrate the intersection of Judaism and feminism, please join Lifelong Learning and Women of Emanu-El for our Women's Seder. We will explore giving voices to many who haven't had a voice over the ages including now.

This entire year at Romemu empathy

has been one of the many values we have been exploring. On Sunday, April 24, we invite the entire CEEBJ community to join us as we celebrate some of the learning that has taken place this year; we honor our Learning Guides, Madrichim, and Support Staff; and introduce the Lifelong Learning theme for 5783 (2022-2023).

In addition to our biblical holidays being a source of empathy, our modern holidays also can teach us to be an upstander instead of a bystander, especially Yom Ha-Shoah. We believe this so strongly that on Wednesday night, April 27 our seventh, eighth, and ninth graders will participate in the Yom Ha-Shoah service at CEEBJ.

In addition to learning our own story and texts, to expand our empathy we must be open to learning the stories of others. When I was getting my California Clear Credential for teaching preschool through eighth grade, we were required to take a class in multicultural education. One part of the course required us to read books by authors of different cultural backgrounds, see plays/movies by writers of different cultural backgrounds, and visit significant historical sights and cultural events. One of the books I read was Farewell to Manzanar by James D. Houston and Jeanne Wakatsuki Houston. I had not learned about Manzanar specifically prior to that book, though I had known that Japanese Americans had been forced to live in interment camps during WWII. Shortly after reading the book, I realized I passed Manzanar each summer driving from the Palm Springs area, where I was living, to Lake Tahoe, if I took my favorite route. So that summer I took my children to the Manzanar National Historic Site. They were so little so I am sure they don't remember. I, on the other hand, will never forget the impact both the book and the National Historic Site had on me. When I visited it, there was not much there except the cemetery as it had only recently become a National Historic Site. Now, there are reconstructed barracks, a visitor center with a film, rock gardens, and more. It is high desert in the middle of nowhere. It is surrounded by the Sierra Mountains. It was so silent and still as if the entire history was erased, except for the marker

that was there. I share this story because I hope you will join me on Wednesday, April 20, at 7:00 pm when Molly Dubin of the Jewish Museum Milwaukee will give us a virtual tour of *Then They Came for Me: Incarceration of Japanese Americans During World War II and the Demise of Civil Liberties.* For more information, please see page 7.

This tour takes place during Passover when we focus on remembering our story of being slaves in a strange land. This tour takes place one week prior to Yom Ha-Shoah and shortly before Asian Pacific American Heritage Month. Registrations are due by Monday, April 11. Molly Dubin has a Master's Degree in Art History and Museum Studies from the University of Denver and has worked in the field of Jewish art, culture and education for over 25 years. She has curated exhibitions and created programs addressing diverse topics for regional and national organizations and served in a range of positions in the Southwest and Midwest. For the past 11 years she has developed exhibits and programs as Curator of the Jewish Museum Milwaukee.

Jewish Museum Milwaukee's new exhibit, *Then They Came For Me: Incarceration of Japanese Americans During World War II and the Demise of Civil Liberties,* reflects on a dark chapter of U.S. history. Through powerful large-scale images commissioned by the government's War Relocation Authority and taken by some of the most renowned photographers of the 20th century including Dorothea Lange, Clem Albers, Ansel Adams, and others, along with artifacts and family stories, "Then They Came for Me" tells the story of the forced removal of 120,000 Japanese Americans from their homes during World War II without due process or the constitutional protections to which they were entitled. Loss, fear, and uncertainty are palpably apparent in the visual documentation of mass evacuation and incarceration based solely on ethnicity and used as a tool of propaganda in shaping a false narrative rooted in racism with multi-generational consequences. This SPARK program will explore history, photography, social justice, local connections, and parallels to contemporary issues and events.

From Our President

Over the years I have heard people say there is a little Irish in all of

us. As I investigated this, I thought about spring awakening and noted similarities between the Jews and the Irish and Passover and St. Patrick's Day. I found an article from 2010 in the <u>Jerusalem Post</u> which states "At first glance, the Irish and Jewish peoples seem radically different. But scratch the surface and they begin to look like twins separated at birth. The stories of these two wandering tribes share many extraordinary parallels."

One thing that was pointed out was that "Others have a nationality. The Irish and the Jews have a psychosis." That may be putting matters a little harshly, but the author was onto something, these two ancient peoples were destined to wander the world as outsiders, knowing suspicion and derision wherever they went. There are other similarities but through it all, both maintained tight and close bonds with their own kin, even in the farthest comers of the earth. Other similarities include small, sacred, and contested homelands, a disproportionate number of Nobel laureates, just to name a few.

Today when we think of Passover and the traditional seder meal we often include gefilte fish, matzah ball soup, brisket or roast chicken, potato kugel and tzimmes, and sometimes include potatoes or sweet potatoes. The Irish celebrate St. Patrick's Day around the same time as Passover, with comed beef, potatoes, carrots and cabbage. Maybe this year on one of the nights of Passover you will cook a comed beef for your dinner also.

I want to thank Roberta Bloch for her and Ann Klein's co-chairing the Knitting Circle. This group has been meeting for many, many years. Women of Emanu-El held a "Make Your Own Afghan" event. The video will be posted for all to learn at your own pace.

In March we had our Annual AFS Shabbat. Thank you to the Committee for making this a reality especially during Covid-19.

Summer Camp Scholarships Awarded From Dygola and Fefferman Campership Funds

Rabbi Dudley Weinberg Library

When I was a child, my whole family got together for the seder at my house. I remember my father sitting at the head of the table, wearing his father's tall satin kippah and conducting the service in Hebrew. Even the youngest children had copies of the wine-stained, matzahcrumbed Maxwell House haggadah. I remember, too, the Mogen David wine that tasted a lot like the cough syrup I choked down when I was sick.

I also remember misbehaving, along with my sisters and cousins. After sitting politely at the table, we grew bored and then restless. We fidgeted in our chairs, made faces and delivered swift kicks to one another under the table. A quick, stem look from dad put only a temporary halt to our behavior.

The children's roles in the seder were limited and consisted of someone asking the Four Questions, someone opening the door for Elijah and all of us scrambling to find the Afikomen. The adults had little to do as well. Occasionally when the Maxwell House editors indicated a response was required from participants, the grown-ups complied. Very little was spontaneous except for occasional asides from someone wondering when we could eat.

When my husband and I starting hosting our own seders, we remembered with warmth and love the seders of our childhood. But we wanted our children and guests to be fully involved in the ritual. We didn't know how to go about doing that but we knew where we'd find out - The Rabbi Dudley Weinberg Library!

It was a treasure trove for us. The books we consulted gave us fresh ideas on how to engage everyone at the table. We could use props and "magic tricks" to help tell the story of Passover. We could enrich the haggadah by including discussions of current events and the meaning of freedom. We could employ children's books, poetry and writings from ancient and modern sources. We could even write a haggadah or one especially for the children.

We found cookbooks for every palate, from many countries and for many types of diets and tastes, including Yemenite recipes, vegetarian recipes, low-fat and gourmet kosher recipes. There are cookbooks with recipes that children can make, either supervised or by themselves. And there are cookbooks devoted to Passover desserts.

If you want to examine Passover in depth, you can do that at the library. You will find books with information on traditions and observances, customs and the history of Passover through the ages and in any part of the world where Jews existed.

The library has an extensive collection of haggadot, from the gorgeous facsimiles

of ancient haggadot and the Sarajevo Haggadah to the Agam Haggada, a vegetarian haggadah, a women's haggadah, a humanist haggadah, the Union Haggadah and haggadot for children.

You will discover Passover stories by famous authors, like Sholom Aleichem and David Mamet, and clever, colorful stories for children of all ages. Two of my favorite books for middle grade readers are *The Devil's Arithmetic* by Jane Yolen and *The Yankee at the Seder* by Elka Weber. I have always enjoyed reading *Only Nine Chairs* by Deborah Miller and *The Magician's Visit* by Barbara Goldin to the younger children. And there are Passover books, including *Sammy Spider*, for the nursery school set.

Log on to the library catalog and see for yourself what fascinating information is available. I suggest using the following key words to help in your search: PASSOVER, HAGGADAH, COOKBOOKS and PASSOVER STORIES. You can print any section of the catalog to refer to when you visit the library. 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
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
