From Your Pastor

President George Bush introduced to the larger public the doctrine of pre-emptive war – attacking the enemy before he has the opportunity to inflict harm on the U.S. Well, with the arrival of the annual celebration of Father's Day, the prophet Job gives us some insight into what might be called pre-emptive fatherhood when we read in chapter one, verse 5: "When a period of feasting had run its course, Job would send and have them [his children] purified. Early in the morning he would sacrifice a burnt offering for each of them, thinking, 'Perhaps my children have sinned and cursed God in their hearts.' This was Job's regular custom."

It was Job's regular practice to anticipate the sins of his children, to make sure they attended worship, and to offer up the sacrifice of prayer for his children. This was an ingrained habit for Job. May the LORD grant us, Christian men and fathers, this Fathers' Day an equal measure of such pre-emptive fatherhood. The Church needs fathers who will exercise this sort of biblical masculinity, not giving into the temptation of simply being liked by their children, but who will stand their ground and confess with Joshua, "as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord."


And we should do this because big consequences are at stake. What will it profit your children to gain the world in terms of education and leisure opportunities if they lose their souls?

A beloved hymn from bygone days puts it this way: Oh, blest the parents who give heed Unto their children's foremost need And weary not of care or cost. May none to them and heav'n be lost!" (LSB 862, stanza 2)

Just a few weeks ago 4 of our youth confirmands bound themselves to the Apostles' Creed, and in so doing exhibited virtue, ie manliness. They stepped forward in faith, confessing that the Triune God is the beginning and the end of everything. Christian men and fathers, do not let them become disillusioned because by our habits we confess something different. It is easy to be a martyr – to go out in a blaze of glory. It is significantly more difficult to model pre-emptive fatherhood by daily dying to sin and rising again in faith. As St Paul puts it so well in Romans 12: "I appeal to you therefore, brothers, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship."

Twenty some years ago the Swiss Government published a report on which religious influences contributed the most to the passing on of faith from one generation to another. The conclusion of this report was that the piety of the father – his beliefs and practice of those beliefs – is the overwhelming influence on the transmission of the faith. If a man's children perceive that Church is central to him, they will conclude that Christian faithfulness is part and parcel of what it means to be an adult.

If Tony Dungy of the Indianapolis Colts could identify before the watching world that his Christian faith was more important to him than his ethnicity as the first black coach to win the Super Bowl, then certainly we Christian men can exercise intentional, pre-emptive Biblical masculinity within our families and within the Church by letting our children know by word and deed that faith in Christ trumps everything the world considers important.

Let your children see you praying and praying for them. Let them know that in making decisions about where to live and work, the location of a solid, faithful congregation in which to worship is crucial. Don't just warn your sons against drugs; urge them to treasure godly women as future wives. Likewise, model for your daughters what they should look for in a Christian man. Let them see you fight to preserve a difficult marriage rather than divorcing easily. Let them know that you are strong enough to confess your sins. Give your children fully caffeinated Christianity! You want them to "catch the bug", not get inoculated against it.

Brothers, the time we have to teach and pass on the faith is brief. When that time is up, let Christ find us standing at our post!

EGL member and our former pastor, Rev. Dr. Harold Senkbeil is celebrating his 50th ordination anniversary this year. His work has been a blessing to many.

He received his B.A. from Concordia Senior College, Fort Wayne, Indiana, in 1967, and went on to earn an M.Div.

(1971) and an S.T.M. (1986) from Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Indiana. Rev. Senkbeil served as a parish pastor in the LCMS for 32 years, including at our church from 1987 to 2002. He served as Associate and Adjunct Professor of Pastoral Ministry and Missions at Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Indiana. In 2001 he was recognized by Concordia Seminary, St. Louis, Missouri, in the bestowing of the degree of Doctor of Divinity, *honoris causa*. Dr. Senkbeil is a 1988 recipient of the Servus Ecclesiae Christi Award.

DOXOLOGY, the Lutheran Center for Spiritual Care and Counsel, had its roots here at Elm Grove Lutheran more than 25 years ago in conversation between EGL member, Dr. Beverly Yahnke and Pastor Senkbeil. It is a Recognized Service Organization (RSO) of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod and offers continuing education for pastors and lay leaders in the advanced care of the souls. Since the program was launched in 2008, it has trained more than 800 pastors and the churches and agencies they serve, while also providing seminars and training for LCMS missionaries and indigenous partner churches around the world. Last summer, Pastor Senkbeil concluded his service to DOXOLOGY and Rev. David Fleming was installed as its Executive Director for Spiritual Care.



A 'Pivot' Skype...from a Beijing Police Station?!



New EGL Members Share History & Insights from International Outreach

"I'm in a police station. Please pray for me. It's okay: they don't speak English." We're no longer surprised at where exactly our next international Skype might be coming from. But we're still astonished at what comes with it—an intense, risk-taking hunger for fellowship, teaching and prayer. In this case, the video call was from a forty-ish woman whose professional expertise is much in demand in her highly specialized field. A 'graduate' of our LMC "Worldview Conversations" class several years ago, she had become a believer while she was with us and was now calling from a police station in her country's capital. This dear sister in Christ didn't want to miss our weekly time together completely even though she'd just been in a car accident! (And yes, we were relieved to learn that it was 'only a car accident.')

After we'd finished praying together, as Cheryl and I were signing off, our friend leaned into her iPad from a bench in that police station and exclaimed, "I'll join you next week! I *need* this time, this fellowship!" "No, I replied, "*we* need this fellowship!" Our international friends sometimes can't appreciate how much we volunteers in International Outreach (iO) *also* benefit from our many international Skypes each week, how much we—and those who support us in prayer here at home—gain from these ongoing contacts.

iO has indeed pivoted almost completely to Skype...at least for now. 'Pivot,' of course, is the trendy word bandied about by business consultants during the past year of pandemic. "Find a way to keep doing what you do best," they advised. Well, at our best, we in iO share the Gospel and its defense with internationals, and we've continued to do just that. We praise God every day for the gifts of access and technology, never knowing when *this* window might close as well, but trusting in His plan of salvation for all nations.

Our in-person events—Bible studies, ESL classes, group hospitality gatherings and Worldview Conversations—disappeared almost overnight last spring. In a toxic brew of pandemic fears and realities and heightened international tensions, the pipeline of visiting scholars dried up completely. But, amazingly, a dozen or so of our 'graduates' have sought us out online, asking for Bible studies and mentoring in the faith. And, of course, they still want answers to their pressing questions about how the Bible 'fits' with science, logic and history. They've Skyped us from hospital rooms, business and professional conference trips, vacation getaways and yes, even a police station. But even more astonishing to us is this: *the internationals* have done all the initiating! Every one of the half-dozen or more of these Skypes that Cheryl and I are engaged in each week—some lasting over two hours, some coming from abroad and some from within the U.S.—has been at their request.

And much of this, it turns out, is the sometimes hard and often-messy business of long-term follow-up of earlier outreach. No more, the excitement of meeting a new and interesting person from one of a dozen countries *almost every week*. No more, the thrill of baptisms out of 'impossible' circumstances. Now, it's the gritty stuff of everyday life, living together online with fellow sinner-saints—and that often overlaid with the threat of persecution. Now, in addition to Bible *study*, it's Bible *application*. It's wrestling together through the problems of life—the giving of Christian counsel on marriage, family, parenting, illness, getting along with bosses and colleagues.

The sessions are often difficult—well beyond the usual complaints and constraints of having to conduct business online—and sometimes they are even shocking. Picture two average American Christians working from a condo dining room table to offer support to a woman 7,000 miles away who's experiencing terrifying, disabling flashbacks after a violent and bloody incident in which she was injured at the hands of a loved one suffering from mental illness. By God's grace, our international friends and we have faced every one of these challenges together online in the past twelve months. He has *indeed* "given us everything we need for life and godliness," just as the Apostle Peter promised (2 Peter 1:3).

While many Christians here have lamented our inability to gather freely and hug, and kneel shoulder to shoulder en masse at the Lord's Table, many of our international friends in countries of persecution, of course, have faced

much of this isolation reality for years. A recurring topic in some of our weekly sessions is stark: making the decision about when and where to risk joining an underground church. But most often it's the stuff of everyday life so familiar to us here at home. As I write this, I can hear Cheryl in the other room telling the wife of a former Chinese visiting scholar, "This is hard work, changing your habits to conform to God's Word. It requires practice! It requires that you..." And "No, it's not *pretending*. It's *practicing* the truth even when it doesn't *feel* true. You need to work to ignore your emotions and follow the truth..."


A recurring topic in some of our weekly sessions is stark: making the decision about when and where to risk joining an underground church.

And we've been blessed to learn of continuing 'ripple effects' on both sides of the world as a result of these Skypes. In another room, just a few minutes later, on another laptop, I offered encouragement to our very first Worldview graduate, also back in his home country. As a now-mature Christian, he's giving counsel from Scripture to a professor from another university, an unbeliever who's lonely and angry. This man sought out our friend's underground church in desperation, seeking relief from

the intense, raw pain over being cut off completely from his young son after an ugly divorce.

And Cheryl and I have the great privilege, in yet another weekly Skype, of working our way through the Gospel of Mark with a group that includes three of our international godchildren! They're in very different circumstances, seemingly with little in common: a 30-something man and his wife in one city and a teenaged boy and his family in another, as they come together with us and iO volunteers John and Nancy Wolck. When they were cut off from their churches early in the pandemic, these two families asked for weekly teaching from us. Their hunger for this fellowship and study now continues even as they transition back to in-person worship.

So, iO has pivoted. And while we pray fervently that the pipeline of visiting scholars might flow into Milwaukee once again one day, we ask that you join us in another prayer—that this new, pandemic-triggered connection, this knitting together of the Body would *also* continue. Truly, "the Body is a unit" (1 Cor. 12:12).

The Rev. Dr. John Saleska founded the Concordia Bible Institute (CBI) back in 2000 after retiring from his 23-year faculty position at Concordia Theological Seminary in Fort Wayne, Indiana. In the summer of 2014 he retired a second time, as it were, by becoming the Director Emeritus of CBI, even as he maintained an office on campus and still came to work early every morning with briefcase in hand. Dr. Saleska then received his heavenly inheritance on September 12, 2017.

In honor of his legacy of teaching "Christ in Every Word" among us, CBI has established "The Concordia Bible Institute Saleska Scholarship Endowment," whose purpose is to provide financial assistance to pre-seminary students at Concordia University Wisconsin. In an age of biblical illiteracy, it is hoped that this endowment will help future pastors carry forward Dr. Saleska's life-long conviction of teaching "Christ in Every Word" as they read, mark, learn, and inwardly digest the Scriptures.
