

**THE U.S. SENATE VOTED** a couple weeks ago to keep Daylight Savings Time in force year round. The bill was endorsed on a stunningly unanimous voice vote – no partisan divide over what's been dubbed the Sunshine Protection Act – and thus ending the twice-a-year fiddling with clocks.

This wouldn't happen, however, until November 2023, so there is time, as was reported, to consult with airlines and



broadcasters. Which, of course begs the question: Why didn't that happen before the bill was passed? Furthermore, the legislation still awaits a House vote before final consideration by the President.

In the meantime, input from the Church might also be warranted. How we tell time does matter.

To be honest, however, I'm not sure how we'd come down on the matter if legislators did consult bishops, liturgical experts and various religious leaders.

Personally, I like longer days, by which I mean sunshine as far into the late afternoon or early evening as possible. On the other hand, it's a lot easier getting up for 7 a.m. Mass when it looks like morning and not just another hour of night.

From a religious perspective, however, when the sun rises and sets, or vice versa, is significant. For Jews, Muslims and Christians, our holiest days of the







week begin at sundown on Thursday for Muslims, on Friday for Jews and on Saturday for Christians. Similarly, those holy days conclude at sundown the next day. In other words, we tell time and determine the beginnings and endings of days by this reality of created, natural light, not something concocted by mathematicians, retailers or politicians. Ideally.

I say "ideally" because we clearly fudge on this - a lot. The allowance for celebrating Lord's Day (Sunday) Mass on Saturday afternoon comes from this ancient, liturgical understanding of time. When the sun sets on Saturday it is, by our Christian determination, already Sunday. Common practice has distorted that a bit in that we celebrate Mass on Saturday afternoon long before the sun sets in the summer, and after the sun sets on Sunday nights in the winter. For better or worse, we are clearly not stick-

When the sun sets is of greater concern in regard to the Easter Vigil in that it must begin after dark. Sundown on Holy Saturday will be at 7:45 this year, so there will be lingering light when we bless the Easter fire at 8 p.m. That's not ideal, but, I'll confess, practical. The date of Easter in relation to the start of Daylight Savings Time has occasionally determined the Vigil's start time. Easter coming before or after a time change could be the difference between a Vigil starting at 7:30 or 8, or maybe even 8:30 or 9.

All of which may seem piddly and insignificant, but I appreciate that we're guided by something beyond human whim in making such determinations - something as dramatic and powerful as the sun. Or, as regards the date of Easter - the moon. It would be simpler if Easter were celebrated on the same date every year – some arbitrary human-imposed date - and there have been suggestions to go that route. Instead, we look to the heavens.

And so, when the sun has set, initiating the Sunday after the first full moon after the vernal equinox, we gather around a fire, another force of nature, to begin celebrating the resurrection, something that cannot be contained by time. TL
