Greetings from the Pastor

Lord was put to death thinking that eliminating the question mark was the answer to the problem. Jesus was a ‘problem’ to the authorities of his time; he was a ‘troublemaker’, a revolutionary who preached something which was unknown to the people; he was a challenge to the rulers and a threat to the people who had much to lose. In today’s term, he was politically wrong. If he had played political correctness, he would never have been crucified! He was the light of the world (John 8:12), but people preferred darkness (John 3:19), and even now, we do. He came to what was his own, but his own did not accept him (John 1:11). Therefore, they handed him over.

They nailed him to the cross; they closed the tomb with a large rock, and even placed soldiers to guard the tomb. Let him not escape! They were trying to stifle life within that borrowed tomb; they were trying to hide the light by placing it in the hollow of the grave. The world could hold the Son of Man captive only for three days, just as the whale held the prophet Jonah in its belly for three days. The Resurrection was only three days away from crucifixion. Jesus, the eternal life, came back to the shore of life after wading through the ocean of suffering and death. A person can be destroyed but never The defeated, said Earnest Hemmingway. Jesus was the first in history to prove it true. You might nip away every flower from your garden, but you cannot prevent spring from coming, said a Chilean poet. How true! People of the Lord’s time could nip the most beautiful flower that opened its petal in this world, but they could not prevent the spring of eternal life from coming back from death. That is Easter.

Long winter is over; much awaited spring has come. Life is hidden even in death; spring was concealed within each branch that seemed lifeless in winter. Death is only a shadow, just a transient spell; life with God in paradise is the reality. Easter is the festival that proclaims to us that beyond the storms and struggles, pains and persecutions of life, there is the rainbow of hope, which blossoms on the Cross. The Risen Christ is the rainbow God the Father paints above the storms of the Cross. For us, the Cross is power, and Easter is rebirth in the risen Christ. It is time to go forth from the foot of the Cross to the powerful experience of the Resurrection which turned the intimidated apostles into valiant soldiers who safeguarded the infant Church, the womb of Christian life.

Go, tell the world that a Christian cannot be intimidated or defeated by storms, slanders, anguish, distress, persecution, famine, nakedness, peril or the sword, says St. Paul. “It is Christ who died, rather, was raised, who also is at the right hand of God, who indeed intercedes for us” (Romans 8:34). We are an Easter people. Put on the mantle of joy that flutters from the tip of Calvary and be shielded until you sit down in the kingdom of God to dine with Him. Drink deeply from the stream that trickles down from the open side of the crucified Lord who invites us to submerge ourselves in the overwhelming glory of the feast of the Resurrection. Happy Easter.

Communion Fasting

Question:

Do we need to fast for one hour before Mass, or one hour before communion?

Answer:

The practice of fasting before receiving the Eucharist is a centuries-old act of devotion that was once very different than it is today. In the 1917 Code of Canon Law, for example, anyone who wanted to receive the Eucharist had to fast from midnight until the time of communion (even water and medications were forbidden). Over the following decades, the rules for the eucharistic fast were relaxed, first by Pope Pius XII and, later, by Pope Saint Paul VI.

The current Code of Canon Law (1983) states very clearly: “A person who is to receive the Most Holy Eucharist is to abstain for at least one hour before holy communion from any food and drink, except for only water and medicine” (Canon 919, §1). And, in the case of those who are ill and the elderly, the rules are even more accommodating, “The elderly, the infirm, and those who care for them can receive the Most Holy Eucharist even if they have eaten something within the preceding hour” (Canon 919, §3). So, if we strictly follow the “letter of the law,” the fast is calculated from the time of Holy Communion and not the start of Mass. However, when we remember why we fast — it is a reminder of the deeper hungers of the spirit that our physical thirst or hunger symbolize — we see that the issue is much bigger than simply fulfilling what is called for by Church Law and tradition. Joining fasting to our prayers and reflection before Mass is an opportunity to really center ourselves and to prepare our minds, hearts, and bodies to welcome the One we receive in the Eucharist.

A Happy Ending Isn't the Whole Story

“Is there a happy ending?”

When my kids were young, we never made it past the first whiff of any narrative tension before I got this question. As soon as whatever princess or furry woodland animal who was the hero of the story got into any small scrape, they wanted that reassurance, “Is there a happy ending?”

I can't say I blame them. Don't we all feel that way sometimes? We enter into a relationship with someone or some situation, and we just want to protect ourselves. We want to know it's not going to go badly — or, if it does, that we will be able to come back from it. It's a human instinct, a reflex. Our inclination to protect ourselves makes it so that we sometimes want to press fast-forward on the bad stuff and skip straight ahead to the happily-ever-after.

Easter is the ultimate happy ending. It's the day of miracles. The day when all the stones roll away and all the sins are forgiven. It's the day that puts everything right.

But if we learned anything from this week — from the Passion and death of the Lord — it's that we can't press fast-forward on the hardships of life. That tension, that loss, that fear — it's crucial, isn't it? As Catholics, we are who we are because of Easter. But Easter doesn't happen without Good Friday.

So, does the story of salvation have a happy ending? We know it does. But we also remember that the ending isn't all that matters.




