

Greetings from the Pastor

A few years ago, I had the great opportunity to tour around the Grand Canyons. It is difficult to recall how long I stood looking at the imposing beauty and the awesomeness of the Canyon. Neither can I say how many times I went back and forth, in that short trip, to gaze repeatedly at the grandeur of the Grand Canyons. I felt like being there longer. It was like what St. Peter suggested: Lord, it is good for us to be here; let me make three tents. I was simply enwrapped in the thrill of what I was seeing. Then I thought, the author of this worldly heauty must be far seeing. Then I thought, the author of this worldly beauty must be far

more beautiful than Grand Canyons, and heaven must be much more desirable than this place.

I took a trek into the abyss of the canyon, to the brink of the Colorado River that spiraled along the valley, by the bank of which many people camped over night. As I stood there, in the bottom of the gigantic mountains around me, and looked up and around the gargantuan beauty that surrounded me, I could not but simply praise God for His handiwork. And it was time for me to trek back laboriously into the actuality. As I trod the winding trail up, I carved on one of the rocks with a rock GOD BLESS AMER-ICA.

I sat down on a rock, a little away from the trail. Trekkers with backpacks and walking sticks ascended and descended. But I wondered how many of them knew that the land they were walking on was sea once upon a time! Well, the great beauty that surrounded them and me had been hidden under some mighty sea. The sea had to recede for the Grand Canyon of grandiose beauty to appear.

Many a time, the real beauty of a person is hidden beneath and behind what seems to be a rough and rugged life. We may have to wait patiently, sometimes many years, for the hidden beauty of life to emerge. The longer I looked at the Canyon, greater was the beauty, I thought. And I knew I could not exhaust the beauty ever; neither walking sticks ascended and descended. But I wondered how many of them knew that

As sea retreated revealing the Grand Canyon to the world, rough shells of our outer life should wither away revealing the inner beauty, as years go by. Look repeatedly into that beauty; learn to appreciate life.

Stewardship and More

Communion & Mortal Sin Ouestion:

I have a friend who receives communion, but who I know for a fact is in a state of mortal sin. Should I tell our priest? Is it my responsibility to say something?

Answer:

While we may always want to do what is best for our friends and family members, we have a responsibility to respect their privacy and their conscience. In its reflections on the Eighth Commandment ("You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor"), the Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "Respect for the reputation of persons forbids every attitude and word likely to cause them unjust injury. [One] becomes guilt: -of rash judgment who, even tacitly, assumes as true, without sufficient foundation, the moral fault of a neighbor; -of detraction who, without objectively valid reason, discloses another's faults and failings to persons who do not know them; of calumny who, by remarks contrary to the truth, harms the reputation of others and gives occasion for false judgments concerning them" (no. 2477).

We will never truly know what is in a person's mind, heart, and soul; only God knows those things. We should, of course, take our concerns to God and entrust the person about whom we are concerned to God's grace and mercy. If we have concerns about the spiritual wellbeing of someone with whom we are close, we should go to the person themselves and talk about our fears and concerns. Unless it is a case of abuse or endangerment (which we have a moral and even legal responsibility to report to the appropriate authorities), we ultimately do not have the freedom to share another's persons faults or sins, however good we think our intentions might be.

Giving as God does

Ask yourself this question — what would you pray for if you really believed God could and would do anything for you? In my experience, we all have something. We all have that miracle we're afraid to request, afraid we will be disappointed.

Do we doubt God's readiness to give because we ourselves have such an imperfect understanding of charity and love? Maybe if we had better faith in God we would be more ready to give of ourselves — and maybe if we were more ready to give of ourselves, we would understand more clearly the ways of God.

Because we're not really afraid that God can't do something. We know He can do anything. What we're afraid of is that He will do what He always does: give us what we need, not what we want.

Have you ever had a friend in need and you just wanted to give them something — a meal, a phone call, a text? Not because you knew it would help, but simply because you wanted to reach out. And have they ever said to you: It wasn't so much what you gave, but the fact that you did. You gave them what they needed even if it wasn't what they specifically asked for.

When we give in this manner, we are giving as God does. Sometimes we are afraid to ask because we don't want to be disappointed. But remember, the blind man on the road got what he asked for, but he would have gotten what he needed even if his answer had been the opposite. God's generosity is always reckless, and it's always perfect.


