## News and Notes



Jesus and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. You may be thinking, what did these two have in common? Or, why should we, as Catholics, care about Martin Luther King Jr? All are valid questions. Dr. King became known as a Baptist minister who rejected racism in our world. In his "I Have a Dream" speech, he stated that he

dreamed of a day where blacks and whites could live together in harmony.

Bishop Robert Barron has identified three aspects of Dr. King's life that serve as a model for our time. His commitment to provocative non-violence, his ability to bring religious discourse into the public square, and the rhythm and beauty of his language. (Barron) Specifically, Bishop Barron says Martin Luther King Jr. had a unique ability to "turn the other cheek" without accepting the violence being done to blacks. He used his background as a Christian preacher to bring religious language to the broader public, specifically when he quoted from the book of Isaiah in his "I Have a Dream" speech and tied it to the Declaration of Independence.


Fr. Michael Kwatera, a monk at St. John's Abbey in Collegeville MN, writes "What Jesus tried to do in his ministry was to bring all people together to share God's banquet of mercy and love...That is why Dr. King, through his ministry and witness, tried to bring all people, black and white, together at one table: literally as he physically tried to end segregation at lunch counters throughout the South, and spiritually as he united clergy, religious, and lay persons of all religious denominations in his efforts for equality and justice." (Kwatera)

It is fitting that this weekend, we celebrate, not only the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, but also the Baptism of the Lord. As Christians, it is our Baptism that unites us, which was the mission of not only Dr. King, but Christ himself, to put aside our differences and live together in peace. Rejecting racism is a necessary Catholic value for many reasons, one is that we cannot be authentically pro-life if we value some lives over others. In the Gospels, time and time again, we see Jesus reaching out to those whose lives most people of his day did not value.

I am the staff liaison to the racial justice committee at Holy Angels and members of this committee write articles for the bulletin a few times each month. I encourage you to read these articles with this lens—how would Christ have treated our brothers and sisters of a different race? Would he have been pleased with the conditions that Blacks, members of the Latinx community, and other people of color have had to live in and work under?

I leave you with this quote. "True peace is not the absence of conflict, but the presence of justice." -Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.

We Have Openings for Children in Our 3K Program: Holy Angels School offers a three day & five day K3 program as a pre-school opportunity. Both offer a half-day or full-day option. Requirements for children entering the threeyear-old kindergarten are as follows:

- Age three (3) before September 1st
- An original birth certificate for recording information

- Record of immunization

- \$25.00 non-refundable registration fee

- Non-refundable first month's tuition and instructional fee - Child must be toilet trained Class size is usually limited to 16 students per session, with a classroom aide. A waiting list will be established when the class limit has been reached. The school reserves the option to increase the class size in order to accept all students on the waiting list as of August 1st. Registrations are accepted on a first-registered-first assigned basis. ## ANNE HAINES AT HOLY ANGELS: SAVE THE DATE FEBRUARY 11 & 12

Anne Haines is the founder and Executive Director of St. Bakhita Catholic Worker House in Milwaukee. Anne will be speaking at Holy Angels on February 11 & 12. More details to come! The following gives you a little background about St. Bakhita and the Catholic Worker House.

#### St. Josephine Bakhita, Dorothy Day, St. Bakhita Catholic Worker House

St. Josephine Bakhita is a heroic saint who endured the horrors of slavery with bravery before she escaped into freedom through the group of religious sisters she joined. Josephine was born around 1869 in Darfur (now part of western Sudan). St. Josephine Bakhita is the patron saint of Human Tracking Survivors. Her feast day is February 8.

Dorothy Day (November 8, 1897 – November 29, 1980) was an American journalist turned social activist, who, along with Peter Maurin, founded the Catholic Worker Movement. She became known for her social justice campaigns in defense of the poor, forsaken, hungry and homeless. She espoused nonviolence, and hospitality for the impoverished and downtrodden. Her commitment to social justice spanned most of the twentieth century.

The Catholic Worker movement started with the Catholic Worker newspaper, created to stake out a neutral, pacifist position in the increasingly war-torn 1930s. This grew into a "house of hospitality" in the slums of New York City and then a series of farms for the poor to live together communally. The movement quickly spread to other cities in the United States, and to Canada and the United Kingdom; more than 30 independent but affiliated CW communities had been founded by 1941. Well over 100 communities exist today, all over the world.

Saint Bakhita is a Catholic Worker House in Milwaukee. The St. Bakhita Catholic Worker community has two goals. First, they follow the example of Dorothy Day and the Catholic Worker movement, teaching and living every day the Beatitudes proclaimed by Jesus in his Sermon on the Mount. Second, in partnership with Franciscan Peacemakers Clare Community, we help provide supportive community housing for women who are survivors of sexual exploitation. Women making that transition benefit from the spiritual nourishment and community-building that are part of the Catholic Worker tradition.

## **EDUCATION AND ACTIVITY CORNER**

Sunday Connection: The ministry of John the Baptist prepared for and pointed to the ministry of Jesus. In a similar way, our lives are to offer testimony to who we know Jesus to be for us and for the world. Jesus is the Lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world. How does the witness of our lives give testimony to the reconciling presence of Christ?

As a family, identify as many titles for Jesus as possible, such as Lamb of God, Son of God, Prince of Peace, and so on. Talk together about what these different titles mean and what they tell you about Jesus. Then read together today's Gospel, John 1:29-34.

Consider how John the Baptist gives testimony to who Jesus is. Talk about what people might come to know about Jesus by observing your family life. Pray together that your family life will show others that Jesus is the Son of God, the lamb who takes away the sins of the world. Pray the Lord's Prayer.
