## STEWARDSHIP

### Parents Just Don't Understand



Anybody remember the old rap song by the Fresh Prince, aka Will Smith, "Parents Just Don't Understand?" As we grow up, it is sometimes a struggle for us to imagine that our parents understand us. It can seem impossible that Mom and Dad remember the stress of exam week or peer pressure. We never saw them as children; we never saw their disappointed faces when they weren't invited to a party, or their dashed hopes at a bad test grade. We never saw them homesick their first week of college or nervous to ask their crush to Homecoming.

We're often the same way about God. We gripe about what He asks of us. "He doesn't understand sin — he's all-good," we think. "He doesn't understand temptation — He is perfect."

In Scripture, God can be very much a father, telling us what we can and cannot do. And yet, in His divine genius, He is sometimes simply a man at a well, asking for a drink.

For me, it turns out I didn't need to tell my parents anything about what I was going through as a kid — they knew already. What I needed was for them to tell me what to do, and how to do it.

Similarly, we don't need to tell God about human nature. We need God to tell us about His nature. He's good enough to ask us for a drink, to enter into our humanity. But we have to remember, for our own sakes, to have the humility to ask Him for something, too — the water that will quench our eternal thirst.

## PROVIDENCE NEVER FAILS

Dear Parishioners,

Here we are already at the Third Sunday of Lent! People read Scripture different ways. Same Bible passage—different interpretations. An example is today's Gospel.

Our Lord goes to the house of Simon Peter and his brother, Andrew. Simon's mother-in-law is ill with a fever. So, this proves that Saint Peter, our first pope, was married. He's got a mother-in-law. On the other hand, people use this same Scripture passage to say Simon Peter was not married. Why was he living with his brother?

Besides that, once the fever leaves her, Simon Peter's mother-in-law starts waiting on her son-in-law and his friends. There is no wife in the picture; she must be deceased. So, Simon Peter was not married. Besides that, how many guys who bring home their buddies then have mother-in-laws who "wait on them!" Good luck!

During Lent, almsgiving can take the form of donating money and goods to the poor and performing other acts of charity. A good example is the 40 Cans for Lent Project by our K. of C. The second collection this weekend is for the Little Sisters of the Poor.

The Little Sisters mission is to the elderly poor. We are so blessed to have the Sisters at Saint Augustine Home for the Aged on West 86th Street. Particularly this year, the pandemic has caused the Sisters to spend lots of extra time, effort, and money to keep their elderly residents safe. Please be generous!

Besides that, the Sisters may need some money for legal services. The current administration's pick for running the Department of Health and Human Services is the (allegedly "Catholic") California Attorney General who sued the Little Sisters of the Poor. The nuns refused to violate their Catholic principles by offering immoral forms of "healthcare" to their employees.

During Lent Catholics should dedicate more time each day for prayer. This could be a half-hour of meditation, reading Scripture, praying the Liturgy of the Hours, praying the rosary, a Holy Hour in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament, or attending daily Mass (the best).

We pray the Stations of the Cross each Friday as a group at 2:40 p.m. (except

March 19 and 26) and at 6:10 p.m. We livestream the Way of the Cross; you can access it anytime on our web page. Plus you can also make the Way of the Cross in church on your own.

**A Tip of My Biretta (Hat) to:** The following parishioners who washed all of our pews at the end of February! The disinfectant spray we use after Mass is taking its toll on the wooden pews. I hope we can get past this disinfecting precaution soon!

(By the way, leave the hard-cover hymnals in the pews. Don't put them in the hymnal holders. This way they get disinfected along with the pews.)

**Ask Monsignor a Question:** *What is the difference between abstinence and fasting? I am a fairly new Catholic and really never did understand the difference!* (Via email)

Good question since the Church asks us to do both during Lent! Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of fast and abstinence. The other Fridays of Lent are days of abstinence only.

Abstinence means going without something. For example, abstinence is the best way to make certain a pregnancy develops. But, of course, we're talking about something else here!

Abstinence is not eating meat or poultry. Those who have reached the age of 14 or older are obliged to abstain on Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. There is no "upper limit" here, so it applies to anyone over age 14.

The Church goes on to say that those who are not specifically obliged from eating meat are urged to join in the discipline of abstaining to the extent that they are able. This is why Saint Luke and most Catholic Schools do not offer meat as a lunch option during Lent. Even though the abstinence rule does not apply to most of our students, it's a good thing for the children to learn.

Lots of folks like to say that Catholics just eat fish on Fridays. That's not really accurate. For example, abstinence rules can vary from place to place. In India, Catholics do not eat meat, poultry, or fish on Fridays during Lent. Plus there are other things to eat on Lenten Fridays besides fish. For example there is meatless pasta. In the seminary we followed the regimen of the Benedictine monks and did not eat meat on Wednesdays and Fridays. We often had breakfast food for dinner like pancakes, waffles, or French Toast. I liked it!

Why don't we eat meat? I'm not real sure why we don't abstain from something else besides meat. Coach Lou Holtz jokes that it is because the apostles were fisherman. Doing without meat on Fridays would promote the sale of the fish they caught! I don't think that's true. Coach Holtz goes on to say that it's too bad the apostles were not ranchers!

Fasting is going without something—in this case food. For example, the concept of "intermittent fasting" is a fad today for losing weight. One only eats during an eight-hour window of time and fasts the other sixteen hours of the day. This seems to be working for another monsignor around here, but you'll notice it does not seem to be working for me.

Fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday means we eat only one full meal those days. Two smaller meals can be eaten to maintain physical strength, but together they should not equal another full meal in quantity. Snacking between meals is not permitted.

Catholics ages 18-59 are obliged to fast on the two appointed days. I remember growing up that every day during Lent was a fast day! The rules have certainly been relaxed since those days.


Naturally, anyone who has some serious health issues is excused from abstinence and/or fasting. Common sense is the key here!

Of one thing I am convinced; of one thing I am certain: Providence never fails!

**BUILDING PROJECT UPDATE**



**Framing Progress**

As you can see from the photo above (left), framing for walls at the new vestry is nearing completion. Note that we have decided to call the new sacristy space the “vestry” — leaving the designation of “sacristy” for our existing, older space.

The next major change: cutting the doorway from the existing sacristy hallway to the new vestry on which started on Tuesday, March 2.



**Lower Level Takes Shape**

You can now see the walls taking shape on what will be the lower level STEM classrooms for our school. At the time of writing, we were beginning work on the south wall, which you can see above (right). It is partially framed with wood and concrete will be poured into those “molds.” The earthen ramp, seen at the upper left corner, will be abandoned as the wall continues to be poured towards Illinois Street.

**40 Cans for Lent**



Our 40 Cans for Lent drive benefits our St. Vincent de Paul Boulevard Place Food Pantry. We are often asked if canned goods could be sent directly to the Food Pantry.

After checking with the director, we determined the pantry would accept donations sent directly and dropped off by a delivery service, such as Amazon.

However, there is a risk that the boxes would sit outside the pantry if no one happens to be there at delivery time. The best times for deliveries when someone is always around: Tuesday mornings, all day Wednesdays, Thursday afternoons, Friday mornings and Saturday mornings.

If you send food directly to Boulevard Place, please mark that it is from a St. Luke donor — that will help us determine if we meet our goal of 10,000 pounds.


- Simply donate one can of food or a non-perishable item for each of the 40 day of Lent.


