

A Letter from Msgr. Schaedel PROVIDENCE NEVER FAILS

Dear Parishioners,

In response to several requests, here is my homily from last weekend:

Eighteenth-century Germany: a woman named Maria faced a problem pregnancy. She had given birth to eight other children. Three of them died from birth defects. All of her children were deaf, blind, mentally challenged, or both. Maria herself had syphilis. Her husband was a musician too fond of drinking.

Had Maria lived in this century in this country, her friends and doctor would have encouraged her to have an abortion. Today's sophisticated medical testing could have suggested terminating her ninth pregnancy. But she didn't. Maria carried her ninth pregnancy to full term. Maria named her ninth child Ludwig: Ludwig von Beethoven. Beethoven is one of the greatest musical composers the world has ever known!

Human life has no price tag. The Church consistently teaches that human life fashioned in God's own image is sacred. In the Gospels, particularly Luke's Gospel, we find Our Lord spending time building up human life. Christ affirmed the value of human beings made in the likeness of God! Yet today, we live in times when we witness unlimited attacks on human life: wars on every continent, senseless shootings in schools or churches, increasing violence in our own city.

But the ultimate attack on human life is abortion. <u>Abortion</u>: the killing of defenseless pre-born life. Abortion is an attack on life itself. A pre-born infant is killed not because he or she is an enemy, a member of some gang or minority, or just a troublemaker. The unborn infant is eliminated just because he or she is alive.

If human life causes one inconvenience, then society, even our own U.S. government, devises ways to get rid of it.

Forty-nine years ago this weekend, the highest court in the land legislated in support of killing innocence: legalized abortion. No Supreme Court is above the Supreme Law—God's Law. At the end of his term, President Dwight D. Eisenhower said he regretted two mistakes made during his administration. Eisenhower said, "Both of them are both now sitting on the Supreme Court." No human law is above the law of the Supreme Lawgiver—God. <u>Human life</u> is priceless. God is the Lord of Life. God-given rights cannot be legislated. Attempts to legislate against God's Law are ridiculous. People will argue that abortion is a right. About 160 years ago, abortion was not the issue. Slavery was the hot topic. In a debate with Abraham Lincoln, Stephen Douglas defended his pro-slavery position. And he took the same approach abortion-rights activists take today.

Stephen Douglas said: "I am now speaking of rights under the Constitution, and not of moral or religious beliefs. I do not discuss the morals of the people favoring slavery but let them settle that matter for themselves. I hold that the people who favor slavery are civilized, that they bear consciences, and that they are accountable to God and their posterity and not to us. It is for them to decide therefore the moral and religious right of the slavery question for themselves within their own limits." Douglas felt that slavery was none of the government's business. Owning slaves was a right according to their own beliefs.

Imagine how that rhetoric would fly today! Replace the word "slavery" with "abortion." Then we have what Planned Parenthood or pro-choice politicians are saying! We instinctively know: slavery is intrinsically evil. So is abortion. There is absolutely no situation that makes slavery or abortion acceptable. Intrinsic evil is self-evident-a no-brainer! Our own Declaration of Independence says: "We hold these truths to be self-evident...that all men are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights that among these are life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness." Inalienable rights—unchallengeable rights: the first one is life-the Right to Life! God's law also has life as the top priority!

Catholics must stand strong. The Catholic Church is Pro-Life. To many, we are the last enemy in the pro-choice movement. If we are who we say we are, we have no choice. On Friday, thousands of people marched for life in Washington, D.C. The theme of this year's march was "*Equality begins in the womb*." But you won't see much about it in the media. Like the Supreme Court 50 years ago, the media is under the illusion that contradicting God-given rights can be voted in.

That's not the way it works. Right is right, even if no one is right. And wrong is wrong even if everybody is wrong. Our culture sees religion as an agent of oppression. The culture's buzzword is "tolerance." We are supposed to accept whatever people do. Some Christians paint Our Lord as the epitome of tolerance, patience, acceptance, love. Yet nowhere do we find Christ tolerating evil. Christians may never tolerate evil. But some of them are willing to. It's their "right," so they say.

Christmas, Christ's birth, the Incarnation changed how we look at everything human. Christ was human from the instant of His conception in the womb of the Virgin Mary.

Human nature was taken up into God. Abortion denies every bit of that. Abortion says human life is not sacred; it's disposable. The Church categorically then condemns abortion as not the only but certainly the <u>primary</u> "Right to Life" issue!

We Catholics must pray—we must protest—we must vote our conscience. Human Life, even one single insignificant human life, is of the highest value. Had Maria von Beethoven lived in our so-called pro-choice" world of today, we don't know if the magnificent composer Ludwig von Beethoven would have been born. When it comes to human life, there is no choice or vote or legislation.

"We hold these truths to be self-evident... that all men are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable rights," very first among these is life. These are not "Church words." These are the words of our country, the land we love, symbolized by Lady Liberty. And we Catholics must constantly remind this grand lady of these words—echoing the principles on which she was founded—until she finally gets it!

Ask Monsignor a Question: *Will you print your pro-life homily in the bulletin?* (Via several emails)

Sure thing! Just look up.

Of one thing, I am convinced; of one thing I am certain: Providence never fails!
