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Epiphany of the Lord - January 2, 2022

Friends,

Peace be with you.

This is my first column in 2022. I hope you all had a very blessed New Year's celebration "kicking the old year out, kissing the new year in " as Irving Berlin wrote in his song Let's Start the New Year Right. As we turn our focus toward this new year, I hope to be able to keep focused on what we are doing well and ask God to make clear what he wants us to do better. Personally, I am very much looking forward to 2022 but also a little hesitant. I'm hesitant because I know that I am not "new" anymore. I've been here long enough that my mistakes and foibles, for instance my struggles with learning people's names, are not as easily excused. Still, there are exciting things too. I plan to take more vacation this year than I have the past few years. I plan to be gone in March on a retreat with some vacation before and after. And I get a month-long sabbatical at the end of June ending the first part of July. I plan to take another vacation as well in the Fall of the year. I know this may seem excessive and planning to do something and actually doing it are two entirely different things. But please know that I really haven't taken much vacation in my time here and I can feel that it's starting to have an effect on my concentration and peace of mind. Plus, you deserve a break from me.

In a recent meeting, the Archdiocese of Dubuque clarified the meaning of a recent comment by the Archbishop about the need to start a pastoral planning process, a phrase notorious for meaning the need to close parishes. Understandably, that concept scares people. Let me say, from what I see and hear, our Archbishop and his people are going about the process in a very different way than most other dioceses. The Sioux City Diocese, for instance, just came out with a list of parishes and the dates they were to close. Other dioceses have done similar things. That's not what our Archbishop is doing. He is asking us to think about what things a parish needs to do to be continuing the mission of Jesus Christ. A parish that reaches out to the poor, tells the story of Jesus to those who need it, and is a genuine place of prayer is a viable parish. A parish that does nothing for the poor, does nothing for catechesis or evangelization, has few baptisms or marriages, and whose liturgies are more known for their convenience and speed is going to be asked to change. They'll be given the tools to be more active in their faith. And, if it becomes obvious that they are unwilling to live the Christian life to its fullest, they may be asked to close. But please notice that this is a several years long process involving consultation and assistance to help parishes to grow. It will begin by reaching out to people "on the margins", as Pope Francis calls them. They want to reach out to people who are unchurched or people who have left the church or people whose churches have closed. They also want to hear from the poor and the homeless, to hear what the church can do to make them feel more connected. Please notice that I have not talked about money at all. The perception has always been that a parish that can pay its bills will stay open. In some ways, dealing with monetary

shortfalls is the easiest problem to solve. More people through the doors makes more income or decreasing the amount of money a parish pays its staff makes less expense. It's much harder to change a culture of comfort in a church, a culture that thinks the whole purpose of the church is to do what I want it to do when I want it to do it. A culture of comfort doesn't care about the poor because they only care about control. A culture of comfort doesn't care about catechesis or evangelization because they know everything and more people in church just means someone is sitting in their pew. A culture of comfort wants a 30 minute Mass so they can be back home before the game begins or will miss Mass if there's a chance it will conflict with something they deem more important than receiving the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus. Our parishes cannot be places focused on a culture of comfort. We must be focused on being the Body of Christ on earth. Let's pray that all four of our parishes can keep focused on that into this new year.

A MESSAGE FROM BROTHER STEPHEN/OTHER

The Octave of Christmas

Christmas is so extraordinary the Catholic Church extends the feast for eight days, known as the Octave of Christmas. On December 26, 27, and 28 we also celebrate the feasts of Saint Stephen, Saint John the Apostle, and the Holy Innocents respectively. The Sunday following Christmas marks the feast of the Holy Family (replacing the feast of St. Stephen this year) and the 8th day of the octave, the Solemnity of Mary.

Saint Stephen impacted many lives, was known for his wisdom and grace, and was chosen to assist the 12 apostles in fulfilling their ministry to those in need of the word of God. Both Jesus and Stephen were falsely accused, persecuted, and killed because they spoke the truth. Jesus was crucified. Stephen was stoned to death. Both focused on God and prayed for forgiveness for their persecutors, witnessing exceptional courage, trust, and forgiving love.

Saint John the Apostle was among the first disciples of Jesus. John was instrumental in the conversion of Saint Paul and authored the 4th. biblical narrative of the Gospel as well as three letters (1, 2, and 3John) included in the sacred scriptures.

Herod, the insecure and fear filled king of Judea, considered the news of Jesus' birth a threat to his throne. He mercilessly ordered all boys under two years old to be killed. The Feast of the Holy Innocents recognizes these victims.

The feast of the Holy Family. Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, presents an example and inspiration for all families. There are multiple Catholic Institutions named in honor of the Holy Family. We older folks might remember how our Religious Sister teachers had us place a JMJ, representing the holy family, at the top of our homework.

January 1 is, of course, the beginning of the new year and the world day of peace. In the Catholic Church's liturgical calendar it is the feast of the Solemnity of Mary which celebrates motherhood, the highest honor attributed to Mary. The Catholic Church marks January 1 as a holy day of obligation highlighting the role Mary played in salvation history.

While considering resolutions we may or may not keep this new year, we would do well to ask Mary, Queen of Peace, to intercede for our troubled world and to remember and give thanks for the love our own mothers have instilled in us, the guidance we have gained from holy mother the church, and the sustenance that is ours from mother earth.
