## From Fr Von's Desk

I am sorry I did not have a bulletin article last Sunday; I was not very productive on those first days after my outpatient knee surgery on 7 January. I am feeling a lot better now; I am able to walk with my brace and walker about as well as before the surgery. By the time you read this, I will have seen the surgeon on Thursday, 21 January. He will remove the staples and give me direction on what the next steps are for me. Hopefully, I will be able to start physical therapy soon, if needed, and be able to get out of the rectory more easily. As of now, we do have substitute priests scheduled for the weekends through 21 February as well as Ash Wednesday, 17 February, if needed. I will see how I am doing and what the doctor says regarding my return to saying Mass. Hopefully, I will be able to start saying Mass and seeing more of you in person sometime soon.

Thank you for your prayers and get-well cards. Thank you for all of your help with food and running errands for me. I am grateful for your support of me and our parishes during this time.

We have now entered into a few weeks of Ordinary Time. As Father David Kalert explained last Sunday, this is ordinary time in the sense of ordered time. It is extraordinary time in the sense that Jesus, our Savior, is always with us and strengthens his presence within and union with us each time we receive him in Holy Communion and ask him to come to us in Spiritual Communion.

As I write this on Tuesday, 19 January, Ash Wednesday, the start of Lent, is less than a month away, on 17 February. In the parishes, we are planning for our Lenten services as well as the Paschal Triduum of Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Holy Saturday Easter Vigil, which will be celebrated at Saint Agatha Church this year. It is not too soon for us individually to pray to our Lord Jesus about what ways he will be calling us to change in this upcoming Lenten Season. What is Jesus calling us to remove from our lives and also include in our lives, so that our lives may be more like his life?

Thank you for your financial generosity towards our parishes and school during the Christmas season and the recent fund-raising activities. With both of our parishes financially supporting our merged school, our operating incomes and expenses are fairly close to our budgets. However, we do not have a lot of reserves, in case some big, unexpected expenses would come up. At Saint Joseph, we are still paying off our Parish Center loan. Many of our fund-raising events, such as the Saint Joseph Parish Picnic, have been cancelled over the last year because of Covid. I know that many of us have been adversely impacted, not only health-wise, but also financially, because of Covid. We pray that the pandemic may lessen in the months ahead and that we may return to our normal lives later this year. We pray too for opportunities to strengthen our parishes and school in the months ahead.

Let us keep each other in our prayers.

## Learn, Act, Connect & Pray

We have Christ's same life-changing words today when we read the scriptures and hear them proclaimed at Mass. We pray that our hearts may be touched and that we repent our sins and truly believe. Christ died for each one of us and we pray that his words can transform us as we examine our life's priorities and choose to follow Him.

## Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

**Proclaiming the Gospel of God.** Jesus is very busy in the beginning of Mark's gospel – proclaiming, teaching, healing. And calling others to come and follow. The responses of Simon and Andrew, of James and John were immediate: stopping what they were doing, leaving it all behind without hesitation – they followed him. Stay tuned to this whole liturgical year to see where that leads.

- How am I hesitating in giving Jesus Christ my immediate attention and response?
- What am I leaving behind, stopping doing in order to follow Jesus in more faithful ways?

## Vocation Corner

Today we hear about Jonah and his call to address the people of Nineveh. By selflessly following God's call, Jonah is able to save those souls from being destroyed. This same selflessness is also evident in Mark's account of the calls of Peter, Andrew, James and John. "Come after me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Mark 1, 17). They left their careers and family to do greater work. Are you called to follow in their footsteps?

## Respect Life Corner

**"Repent and believe in the gospel."** In Mark 1:14-20, Unlike Jonah, Jesus is not a reluctant prophet. He is steadfast in determination to spread the good news! Statement for Observance of Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day

Archbishop of Los Angeles  
President, United States Conference of Catholic Bishops

For much of the past year, America has been reckoning with the legacy of slavery and the persistence of racial injustice in our country. Sadly, it is still true that the "color of our skin" often matters more in our society than the "content of our character," as Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr., said a half-century ago.

This year as we commemorate the legacy of this great American, we remember especially Rev. King's belief in nonviolence and the power of love.

As we witnessed in the violence in our cities last summer and in the violence that broke out again last week at the Capitol in Washington, D.C., our country has become too angry, too bitter, and too divided.

And as we confront our deep divisions, we face the same choices that Rev. King and the civil rights movement faced. For us, too, the question is how will we struggle against the injustices in our society, what means will we use?

In 1958, Rev. King wrote: "Along the way of life, someone must have the sense enough and the morality enough to cut off the chain of hate. This can only be done by projecting the ethics of love to the center of our lives." This is the challenge for every one of us who believes in the promise of America and seeks to renew the soul of this great nation.

In the spirit of Rev. King, we must meet the forces of hate and ignorance with the power of love. We must learn again the wisdom of the Gospel and love our enemies and bless those who oppose us. In this moment, Rev. King would counsel everyone in public life to seek reconciliation and reject the easy temptation to reprisals and recrimination.

We do not love those who oppose us because they are loveable, or even likable, Rev. King once said. We love them because God loves them. And by our love, we seek their conversion and friendship, not their humiliation. This is our Christian duty in this moment — to be healers and peacemakers, to overcome evil and lies, not by more of the same, but with words of truth and works of love.

We ask our Blessed Mother Mary, the Queen of Peace, to guide us in this moment of transition and uncertainty in our country. May she help us to keep believing in the power of love.

## Bible Study

This weeks 1<sup>st</sup> reading (Jonah 3:1-5,10) focuses on the response of the Ninevites, the king and the people, to Jonah's call for repentance to avoid destruction. Nineveh was a pagan city with a large population of more than 120,000. Hidden in verses 6-9 are the lengths the king, the people and animals went through to repent. Fasting, putting on sack cloth (think a burlap shirt rubbing against your body), covering your body with ashes and going that way for a period of time... not just a day. The scripture tells us they repented, changed their hearts not just putting on an act that ended after the destruction did not occur. Their repentance was the point of this reading, tying it to the other readings. However the story is much more. Jonah's determined efforts not to do what the LORD asked then when Nineveh was saved his anger at the LORD for not destroying them. He thought GOD should show no mercy. Read the book for yourselves. Takeaways: 1. How far will we go to avoid the hard things? 2. What are we willing to do to save our country today? 3. Will we forget and turn back to our old ways as soon as the crisis is over? 4. Will we ask GOD to show no mercy to those who caused the current chaos? 5. What do your answers say about us today. May God bless, open your eyes and heart, and keep you safe.

## Stewardship Gardens by Gene Racho

Last week you read about the importance of being in regular and frequent communication with our FATHER. This week you will understand how to prepare for the challenges that lay ahead for stewards. Challenges abound, especially for those who must prepare their children to encounter and build strong defenses against the increasing view that endorses and teaches the acceptance of moral lifestyles and activities that are counter to what we hold to be from GOD. A bigger challenge will be what a child faces from teachers and other students who go along with these new ideas. Stewards may have to make the decision to place their charges in a learning environment that teaches the Catholic way and provides the tools and access to grace that enables them to combat the evils they will face in the world. This is especially true for those who are approaching the time for Confirmation. It can no longer be considered just a ceremony and perhaps last step in Catholic education. It is in fact the beginning of their lives as active Catholics who must defend their faith more than ever in a troubling and chaotic world. Stewards will also face difficult times in the workplace and social arenas as they encounter a "new reality" of what is called "social justice" with all its jargons and restrictive rules on what can and can not be spoken or written about. Challenges can fill pages. What is important is how to overcome them. Grace and strength from the Sacraments. Keeping in constant contact with our FATHER. Review today's Psalm (Ps25): "Teach me YOUR ways O LORD..." Establish and keep a regular prayer life. Read the scriptures: Psalms, Proverbs, the Gospels and Letters, commentaries on them. Include all the family members. There are many resources available on line to help. Difficult days are ahead. Only a strong relationship with our GOD can guide us through them. But, and this is a BIG BUT, GOD is with us at our side. Read all the 150 Psalms and ask our LORD to guide you through them. As Jesus told HIS disciples and us: Be not afraid for I am with you. Reach out and let HIM hold your hand and HE will never let you go. Hold HIS and you might lose your grip. Recall what we have been taught: Put God first; be Catholic. Reflect the light of our Lord to all those you encounter. We pray God bless you and prosper all you do in His name.

### Pavers


