From Fr Von's Desk

Please see the back of the song-sheet insert in the bulletin for an article about the diocesan priests from Saint Joseph and Saint Agatha Parishes and the differences between a diocesan and a religious priest.

As I write this Wednesday morning, I am scheduled to see the surgeon tomorrow, Thursday, about my knee. We will see what he says about adjusting my brace to give me a little more movement of the knee, physical therapy, and possibly being able to drive. I should have some more information to share this weekend.

Over the last few months, our Pastoral Councils at Saint Agatha and Saint Joseph have been working on reinvigorating themselves. We began with the members of the previous Pastoral Councils and have invited some parishioners to join us. We are working to follow a model developed by Russell Peterson in 2011, when he worked for the Diocese of Belleville. Bishop Braxton, in his introductory letter to this document, writes, "This document puts an emphasis on Strategic Planning because of the need for parishes to articulate their Catholic Christian vision, purpose and mission." As Mr. Peterson himself wrote, "The parish pastoral council is a consultative body within the parish that is convened by the pastor and from whom the pastor seeks advice and counsel in planning for parish vitality. A parish pastoral council is not a legislative body. It is advisory to the pastor and charged with prayerfully discerning parish needs, setting pastoral priorities, and empowering people to participate in the Mission of Christ." Our Pastoral Councils are seeing themselves as becoming planning councils. Now, we are clarifying the members' roles and responsibilities as well as clarifying what missions and ministries are currently being accomplished by parishioners in each parish.

Some of our Pastoral Councils members are leading commissions reflecting the different areas of parish life. These include:

- Faith Formation Commission: adult and youth faith formation, ecumenism, and RCIA
- Social Ministry Commission: Respect Life, social justice, charitable works
- Stewardship Commission: time and talent, CSMA, planned giving, fund raising
- Maintenance Commission: maintenance of buildings and grounds
- Community Life Commission: family life, fellowship, ministry to the homebound and those in care centers, funeral luncheons (in practice, this commission might be combined with the Social Ministry Commission)
- Technology Commission: application and updating of information technology in our parishes and school
- Liturgy Committee: We already have a partnership Liturgy Committee which will have representatives on each of the Pastoral Councils.

We plan to finalize our membership and their responsibilities in the next couple of months. We will then present our Pastoral Council members and their roles to all of our parishioners. As each Pastoral Council develops the vision and goals for each parish, we will seek to have the Pastoral Councils meet and work together to help the parishes support each other, in our partnership, to carry out our mission: to make and grow disciples, followers of Jesus Christ. —Fr. Von Deeke

As skin conditions threatened the practice of ritual purity and belonging, it was an ongoing concern. Today, what is it that isolates us from flourishing in the life that God has created for us? As it is Valentine’s Day weekend, a nationally known Catholic psychologist recently cited anger and bitterness as the top problems in marriages today, over financial issues, or anything else. He talked about how important forgiveness is as an intervention and even a form of psychotherapy. He pointed out that it doesn’t mean forgetting, but forgiving...a letting go of anger and setting oneself free from its trap and long-term harm.

While something may be permitted, we need to consider if it will give scandal to another who sees us, Christian or not, and base our decision on that. Finally, we must take into consideration the thoughts and feelings of others so that by our behavior they may desire to emulate our behavior which can ultimately lead to their salvation. That, simply put is to lead a life that reflects that of Christ. So, what was the story behind the “eat or drink...” It relates to eating the meat sacrificed to a pagan god. Many Christians in Corinth, a very pagan city, found it difficult to avoid eating that meat when served in a private gathering and risk embarrassing the host. Eating the meat itself was not at issue. Paul however, was concerned about others seeing what they would consider scandalous or even acceptable behavior under any circumstance and lead them to err or worse, not be saved. May God bless, open your eyes and heart, and keep you safe.



Stewardship Gardens by Gene Racho

Last time you read of some of the challenges stewards of all ages face today in countering the messages the deceiver has been delivering for years. The closing word: Scary. That is the same fear that gripped Jonah, Peter and all the Apostles. If you fear, you are in good company. Jonah left Dodge in a hurry, in the opposite direction to Nineveh and ended up spending three days in a big fish. He finally went and with the help of the Holy Spirit passed on the message given to him by God. Then there was the Apostles in the upper room with locked door in fear of the Jews (Jn20:19) then Jesus came and told them to be at peace. They were no longer afraid. Later (Acts2:1-15), when the Holy Spirit came to them they were able to preach to the Jews from around the world. A more recent true story. A group of people were meeting in a retreat. One who normally was quiet and sat in the background was asked to lead the group. Reluctant to say the least. But the person did and found that once he began to speak the fear evaporated. These are but two examples of people being called by our Lord for a task they feared and found that true to His word, all they required was provided. While we may fear a task, if it comes from our Lord, we must give our full trust to Him like a child trusts his/her parents even though afraid. Jesus holds our hand just as we hold our child's hand to give them courage. Something else to be aware of. Who does God choose for these jobs? The well spoken, well educated and prominent people? Not usually. It is the least qualified that are called. Why do you think that is? Bet we can all think of more reasons to tell our Lord we are not qualified. Like Moses? Doesn't play with God. The time for focusing our attention on our Lord is upon us. Lent. Yes, it is a time of repentance and change of heart. More than that it is time to build a closer relationship with our Lord. To learn to better communicate with Him and to redirect our efforts to a new way of life that focuses on Him, His plan for us and not on our wants and pursuit of worldly things. A fearful thought: putting God in charge. The message from God to all as He called them: Be not afraid. Recall what we have been taught: Put GOD first; be Catholic. Reflect the light of our Lord to all those you encounter. We pray God bless you and prosper all you do in His name.

Ash Wednesday

A SAME AND DIFFERENT ASH WEDNESDAY IN 2021. We have had a year filled with different ways of living and praying. There are fewer people in church. No water in the font. Less singing. Communion only in the hand. Yet we still pray. Instead of giving ashes as a cross on the forehead — unsafe in this Covid time — we can still receive them by sprinkling on the top of the head (permitted by our ritual rules). We will look a little cleaner. We can still repent and believe in the Gospel. We will still bear ashes home to begin our Lenten practices. Come to Ash Wednesday, 17 February at 8:15am at St. Agatha's and 7pm at St. Joseph's.

Lenten Regulations

Each year the Lord Jesus calls the entire Church to a special season of penance and renewal. As we begin this holy time of Lent, we should reflect on our need for conversion of heart, prayer, charitable works and penance. The season of Lent extends this year from Ash Wednesday, February 17, to the Mass of the Lord's Supper, April 1, inclusive.

1. Everyone 14 years of age or over is bound to abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday, Good Friday and all Fridays of Lent.
2. Everyone 18 years of age and under 59 years of age is also bound to fast on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday.
3. On these two days of fast and abstinence, only one full meatless meal is allowed. The other meatless meals, sufficient to maintain strength, may be taken according to one's needs, but altogether they should not equal another full meal. Eating between meals is not permitted on these two days, but liquids, including milk and fruit juices are allowed.
4. When health or ability to work would be seriously affected, the obligation of the law is modified. Those that are excused from fast and abstinence outside the age limits include the physically or mentally ill including individuals suffering from chronic illnesses such as diabetes. Also excluded are pregnant or nursing women. In all cases, common sense should prevail, and ill persons should not further jeopardize their health by fasting.
5. Because Lent is a special season for all Christians, we should not lightly excuse ourselves from these penitential practices.

Enrich Your Lenten Journey

There are several Lenten programs that you may want to explore as we journey towards Easter this year.

Dr. Timothy Gray's Daily Lenten Reflection found on FORMED. The 2020 reflections are currently there, but expect new reflections for 2021 once Lent begins.

THE SEARCH, a seven-episode series hosted by Chris Stefanick, also on FORMED. Each episode is approximately 20 minutes long. Some of you may have attended Chris's program in Mascoutah a few years ago.

THE CASE FOR JESUS, launches Ash Wednesday on FORMED.

FORGIVEN, a four-part series on Confession, found on FORMED.

To use any of the programs on FORMED, just go to formed.org. If you already have an account with them, sign in with your email and they will send you a link to access their programs. If not, click on "Sign Up", and then click "Sign up as a parishioner". Type in "62243", and click on St. Joseph, 6 N Alton Street Freeburg IL. That will take to a link to enter your information to start a new account with your name and email. St. Agatha parishioners are welcome and encouraged to use FORMED with the above instructions.

BEST LENT EVER through DYNAMIC CATHOLIC, which is based this year on Matthew Kelly's book I HEARD GOD LAUGH.
