QUASI MODO - DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY

<u>Haec est dies quam fecit Dominus</u> "This is the day the Lord has made, let us be glad and rejoice in it!" (Ps 117:24). For eight days already we have celebrated the Feast of the Resurrection: the perfect and unending Day of the Risen Christ, the great and glorious Pasch of the Lord! For eight days now the splendor of "the Alpha and the Omega, the beginning and the end" (Rev 1:8) has flooded the Church with light and joy.

<u>Ministry of Divine Mercy</u> As we look at Christ with His resurrected body we behold His glorious wounds. He is the Crucified and Pierced One out of Whose open Heart flows a torrent of water and of blood. Priests are called, in a special way, to remain beneath the glorious Cross of Christ together with the Virgin Mary, Mary Magdalene, the other holy women, and the disciple whom He loved. And so each priest must make of his own heart an open chalice held aloft to receive the torrent gushing from the pierced side of Christ, that not a drop of it be lost. All that flows from the side of Christ must be received by the Church in the person of the priest and then distributed lavishly, applied with tenderness to every spiritual brokenness and wound. This is the spiritual ministry of Divine Mercy. The priest, in a most excellent way, is the one who applies the mercy of God to your soul, washing you in the waters of Baptism, forgiving your sins in the Sacrament of Mercy, which is Confession, and feeding you with the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist.

Peace Be With You In the Gospel, Jesus says to the disciples a second time, "Peace be with you" (Jn 20:21). Then He adds, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you" (Jn 20:22) So Christ's mission does not end with his death and resurrection; we are to continue the Lord's work day to day. We are to carry out His works of mercy. We are to practice the corporal and spiritual works of mercy. The Church is the community of those who have experienced the mercy of the Risen Christ and known his peace. The Gospel tells us on the third appearance of Jesus doubting Thomas was present, and He says to them, "Peace be with you." Anything that happens three times in the Bible is rather important, so pay close attention. At this appearance the Lord breathes on them. As the Son of God breathes on them recall how God breathed the breath of life into Adam in the Garden of Eden. Imagine how the breath of the Holy Ghost hovered over Mary at the Annunciation and see how the priest breaths over the host and chalice as the bread and wine are transubstaniated into Christ's Body and Blood in the consecration. There is a life-giving power to the breath of God and so when Jesus breathes on the apostles he says, "whose sins you shall forgive, they are forgiven them, and whose sins you shall retain, they are retained." We show our belief in the this power to forgive sins each time we profess in the Creed, "I believe in the forgiveness of sins."

The Balm of Divine Mercy The Church is a community of sinners trying to be hold, people wounded by sin who are contemplating the glorious wounds of the Risen Christ. Our wounds are the means by which the mercy of the Risen Christ penetrates into the secret places of the soul. Remember the parable of the Good Samaritan. He stops and helps the poor wounded man lying on the roadside. Everyone else passes him by. Christ is that Good Samaritan for you and for me, for we are truly the wounded men lying on the roadside of life. In the parable the Good Samaritan pours oil into the man's wounds, this symbolizes the balm and ointment of God's mercy. It is an oil that heals, cleanses and purifies. After pouring in the oil the Good Samaritan binds up the wounds. This binding of the wounds calls to mind the charity of Christ who binds us together with Divine Charity. Those who know themselves to be wounded and who expose their wounds to the radiance of Christ's glorious wounds, experience the power of his resurrection. These alone are sent forth by Christ to carry on his work of healing mercy in the world.

Communion Antiphon When Jesus appears the third time and says, "Peace be with you" (Jn 20:26), it is Thomas who is torn between the desire to believe and persistent doubts, so Christ says, "Take your finger and probe my hands. Put your hand into my side" (Jn 20:27). That is to say, "Put your hand into my heart, Thomas. Touch what is most intimate in me, or rather allow me to touch what is most intimate in you, that you may not persist in your unbelief, but become full of faith." These words of Jesus are given us, designedly, as today's Communion Antiphon, to accompany the procession of those who, full of adoration, approach the wounds of Christ's glorious Body. This was the experience of Saint Faustina Kowalska, the humble woman, chosen by the Risen Christ in the 1930's to recall the Church to trust in Divine Mercy. The image of the merciful Christ by which Saint Faustina sought to draw the wounded, the doubting and the fearful to Divine Mercy reminds us to "Never to despair of the Mercy of God" (RB 4:74). Each of us is invited to encounter the Water and the Blood flowing from the Sacred Heart of Christ, and, like Thomas, to probe Christ's glorious wounds, to penetrate even to his Sacred Heart. Then, will the prayer of Saint Faustina — "Jesus, I trust in you!" — well up from deep within all of us. Then will the cry of Thomas become our own: "My Lord and my God!" (Jn 20:28).



The Divine Mercy Chaplet



1. Sign of the Cross

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit. Amen.

2. Optional Opening Prayers

You expired, Jesus, but the source of life gushed forth for souls, and the ocean of mercy opened up for the whole world. O Fount of Life, unfathomable Divine Mercy, envelop the whole world and empty yourself out upon us.

O Blood and Water, which gushed forth from the heart of Jesus as a fountain of mercy for us, I trust in you!

Repeat three times

3. Our Father

Our Father, Who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. Amen.

4. Hail Mary

Hail Mary, full of grace. The Lord is with thee. Blessed art thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

5. Apostles' Creed

I believe in God, the Father almighty, Creator of heaven and earth, and in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died and was buried; he descended into hell; on the third day he rose again from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of God the Father almighty; from thence he shall come to judge the living and the dead. I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

6. Eternal Father

Eternal Father, I offer you the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of your Dearly Beloved Son, our Lord, Jesus Christ, in atonement for our sins and those of the whole world.

7. On the Ten Small Beads of Each Decade

For the sake of his sorrowful Passion, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

8. Repeat for the Remaining Decades

Say the "Eternal Father" on the "Our Father" bead and then ten "For the sake of his sorrowful Passion" on the following "Hail Mary" beads.

9. Holy God

Holy God, Holy Mighty One, Holy Immortal One, have mercy on us and on the whole world.

Repeat three times

10. Optional Closing Prayer

Eternal God, in whom mercy is endless and the treasury of compassion inexhaustible, look kindly upon us and increase your mercy in us, that in difficult moments we might not despair nor become despondent, but with great confidence submit ourselves to your holy will, which is love and mercy itself.

The Divine Mercy Sunday Indulgence

What is an indulgence?

"An indulgence is a remission before God of the temporal punishment due to sins whose guilt has already been forgiven, which the faithful Christian who is duly disposed gains under certain prescribed conditions through the action of the Church which, as the minister of redemption, dispenses and applies with authority the treasury of the satisfactions of Christ and the saints."

"An indulgence is partial or plenary according as it removes either part or all of the temporal punishment due to sin." The faithful can gain indulgences for themselves or apply them to the dead.

Catechism of the Catholic Church 1478-1479

What are the conditions for a plenary indulgence?

- Sacramental confession (within about 20 days before or after)
- Eucharistic communion (preferably on the day, or the days before or after)
- Prayer for the pope's intentions

What are the specific conditions for the Divine Mercy Sunday indulgence?


- On Divine Mercy Sunday, in any church or chapel, in a spirit that is completely detached from the affection for a sin, even a venial sin, take part in the prayers and devotions held in honor of Divine Mercy.
- Or, in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament exposed or reserved in the tabernacle, recite the Our Father and the Creed, adding a devout prayer to the merciful Lord Jesus (e.g. "Merciful Jesus, I trust in you.").
- A partial indulgence is granted to the faithful who, at least with a contrite heart, pray to the merciful Lord Jesus.

The message of the Divine Mercy is simple. It is that God loves us - all of us. And, he wants us to recognize that his mercy is greater than our sins, so that we will call upon him with trust, receive his mercy, and let it flow through us to others. Thus, all will come to share his joy.

The Divine Mercy message is one we can call to mind simply by remembering ABC:

A: Ask for his mercy. God wants us to approach him in prayer constantly, repenting of our sins and asking him to pour his mercy out upon us and upon the whole world.


B: Be merciful. God wants us to receive his mercy and let it flow through us to others. He wants us to extend love




and forgiveness to others just as he does to us.

C: Completely trust in Jesus. God wants us to know that the graces of his mercy are dependent upon our trust. The more we trust in Jesus, the more we will receive.

This message and devotion to Jesus as the Divine Mercy is based on the writings of St. Faustina Kowalska, an uneducated Polish nun who, in obedience to her spiritual director, wrote a diary of about 600 pages recording the revelations she received about God's mercy. Even before her death in 1938, the devotion to the Divine Mercy had begun to spread. Learn more at thedivinemercy.org.
