THE CENTRALITY OF THE EUCHARIST

Shortly after the death of her husband, St. Elizabeth Ann Seton sought a moment of comfort in her local church. Not yet a Catholic, she took a seat in St. Paul's Episcopal Church in New York City and she began to pray. She later wrote to a friend, "I got in a side pew in which I was positioned in such a way that I was facing St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church in the next street. And I found myself speaking to the Most Blessed Sacrament in the Catholic Church, instead of looking at the naked altar where I was." Long before she became a saint, or even a Catholic, she already had spiritual insight into the Real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist. She understood the undeniable truth that without the true priesthood of Christ, kept in the Catholic Church through apostolic succession, there cannot be the reality of the Eucharist. No priest. No Eucharist.

Friends once scolded St. Thomas More for wasting time going to daily Mass. "Your reasons for wanting me to stay away from holy Communion are exactly the ones which cause me to go so often," he replied. "I have very much important business to handle; I need light and wisdom. It is for these very reasons that I go to Holy Communion every day to consult Jesus about them."

In Dublin, Venerable Matt Talbot, the "saint in overalls," visited the Blessed Sacrament for hours every morning, though he had not always been so pious. He used to get drunk every day. To support his drinking he would steal and fight. But when he gave his heart to God, he resolved to come to daily Mass. On Sunday, he would spend the entire day in church. As the priests heard confessions he prayed for sinners. Every Sunday for forty years, he would sit in Church for seven hours. He was transfixed, his body from the knees up as rigid and straight as the altar candles. As a great inspiration to the laity, Catholics like More, Talbot and Seton have given resplendent examples of Eucharistic fervor.

The newspapers, the internet, the TV daily tell us what is important, how things are getting done in the world, and who has the power to make a real change. Every politician always promises to make a difference. But if you want to meet someone who can really make a difference, meet a priest. He is not important because of himself but of Whom he represents. Priests have the greatest power on the earth, for St. John of Avila teaches that priests "have power over God himself." [1] This awesome privilege imposes a grave obligation upon priests to avoid sin. No priest who has a mustard seed of humility feels worthy to celebrate the Sacred Mysteries, yet the power he has received to transubstantiate bread and wine into the Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity of Jesus Christ exceeds Moses' power that turned the sea into dry land [2] and Joshua's voice that commanded the sun and moon.[3]

When Mary said, "Be it done unto me according to thy word," [4] Christ became present in her womb by the overshadowing of the Holy Spirit, which gave him a physical body. At Mass, when the priest takes the host and says, "This is my Body," Jesus becomes sacramentally present on the Altar through the overshadowing of the same Holy Spirit, which gives him a Eucharistic body. [5] The Holy Spirit of God that made Mary the "Theotokos" ("Mother of God") at the Annunciation is the same "Ruah Hakodesh" ("Spirit of God") that moved over the waters at the Genesis of creation and that descends upon a man in the Rite of Ordination to transform him into a priest of the Most High God, according to the order of Melchizedek. From these spiritual realities flows a profound intimacy between the priest, the Holy Spirit, and Mary.

Priests, therefore, should heed the voice of the Spirit in meditation. By following the promptings of the Spirit, priests can become more vivid ikons of Christ the High Priest who has entrusted all His spiritual offspring to Mary. Priests, imitating Jesus, should place their spiritual children under the mantle of the Immaculata, realizing that every grace flows from Jesus through Mary to each and every member of the mystical body of Christ. [6] In the presence of the Holy Spirit every priest becomes more conscious of the struggle between good and evil within himself. [7] Meditating upon this inner conflict is not neurotic, but rather an important step along the path of sanctification. Just as the Holy Spirit places His seal on the heart of every priest through the imposition of the Bishop's hands, and thereby conforms the priest's heart with the Sacred Heart, so also the Holy Spirit prompts priests to live saintly lives. Let us pray for our priests to be fully conformed to Christ who the Eternal High Priest.

EUCHARISTIC PROCESSIONS

Processions have long been a form of liturgical prayer. Processions to and within sacred sites, especially the Temple in Jerusalem, marked numerous festivals in Jewish prayer, and many of the psalms were composed to accompany such processions.

As an example, the "Talmud" describes processions on the seven days of the feast of Tabernacles, during which the people would process around the altar with willow branches, singing a litany that included Psalm 118:25 as the refrain.

St. Basil (d. A.D. 379) in the East and St. Ambrose (d. 397) in the West provide some of the earliest references to liturgical processions in the Catholic Church.

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Both state that these processions had been practiced for many years, accompanied with sung litanies. Public processions with the Blessed Sacrament became popular only when Jesus' real presence in the Eucharist was questioned. For many centuries this sacramental reality was taken for granted, but in the 11th century an archdeacon named Berengar of Tours — who taught in the cathedral school of Chartres, France — was said to question the Eucharist's real presence. Overt denial of the Real Presence in the Eucharistic species came with the Protestant Reformers.

In response to Protestant notions that the Eucharist was merely a symbol, the Church affirmed clearly the ancient understanding of the Real Presence — and processions through the streets of cities and villages became popular as a means of openly demonstrating support and reverence for this reality. The Council of Trent taught, in 1551, that the Most Blessed Sacrament "is to be honored with extraordinary festive celebrations (and) solemnly carried from place to place in processions according to the praiseworthy universal rite and custom of the Holy Church."

Theologically, processions remind us that we are pilgrims journeying through this earthly existence following Jesus on "the Way" (an early title for the Church). In the Eucharistic processions of Holy Thursday and the solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (Corpus Christi) we publicly proclaim this truth, following the Lord physically even as we pledge anew to do so spiritually. We also give public witness to our acceptance of the Lord's words: "The bread that I will give is my flesh for the life of the world" (Jn 6:51). As such, public processions serve as tools of evangelization within our neighborhoods.


