

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Years ago, the U.S.S. Lincoln was cruising along the Atlantic coast line when radar spotted an unknown vessel in its path. At once, the captain dispatched a message, *"This is a US Naval ship, adjust your course 30 degrees to the north."* A voice answered back, *"Adjust your course 30 degrees to the south."* Now the captain was perturbed. *"I repeat, this is Captain Robert Johnson of the USS Lincoln, adjust your course 30 degrees to the north."* Again, the answer came back, *"Adjust your course 30 degrees to the south."* This time, on the edge of losing control, the Captain said with all his might, *"This is the twice decorated Captain Robert Johnson, commander of the USS Lincoln, the second largest ship in the United States' Atlantic Fleet, accompanied by three destroyers, three cruisers and numerous support vessels. I demand that you change your course immediately and identify yourself."* The voice came back, *"Adjust your course 30 degrees to the south. This is the Portland Lighthouse."*

This is a story that never fails to amuse me. It highlights how our anger grows by degrees, and that once it crosses a mysterious line, anything is possible. This week we're going to examine the capital sin of wrath. Before going any further, please know that, like pride, not all anger is disordered and sinful. This weekend's Gospel described how Jesus was angry because His Father's house (the Temple) was being turned into a marketplace. This is what we call righteous indignation. Anger is not the opposite of love, it's a cousin (indifference is the opposite of love). When we're angry because someone is being manipulated or hurt, this is a sign of true charity and a move toward justice. As Saint Paul once wrote, *"Be angry, but do not sin,"* (Eph. 4:26) – Jesus' righteous indignation is precisely this kind of anger.

Wrath is the kind of anger that is not good for us because it upsets our inner peace. As a still lake perfectly mirrors the heavens on a clear day, so can our soul mirror the Divine Image that was indelibly impressed upon us at Baptism. But when the wind picks up because of an impending storm, the lake becomes a white-capped maelstrom of chaos and confusion. Such waters no longer mirror anything. Something similar happens in our hearts and souls when we get upset. With God's help, we can catch and check this before it becomes something much worse. Let's take a brief look at how things can go south in a hurry.

First, someone irritates us by an annoying habit or something that is said. We all know the feeling of internal unrest when someone we don't particularly like enters the room. Please don't think of who that person is right now – we are trying to keep this more on the theoretical side! If we are not careful, what begins in mere irritation can gradually escalate to more intense dislike. That's when things become dangerous and we move from internal unrest to outward displays of our anger. If you've ever witnessed road rage or the kind of abuse that people shower on referees when they're displeased with the call, these are actions that cross the line and become sinful. From foul language to crude gestures, we're beginning to lose control and that leads to the impairment of our judgment. When I was a teacher, I learned never to discipline a student until I had calmed down on the inside. Sometimes that meant I would wait until the next day.

Saul on the road to Damascus is the image of what wrath can lead to if unchecked. Saul was intent on arresting and killing Christians – but remember, this was a progression that began a long time before it led to such terrible things. One of the more disturbing realities of the modern world is how many people play dangerous games with wrath. Sadly, many feed their anger through use of social media and inordinate attachment to television. We're certainly allowed to be disappointed in people who we think ought to know better. But once we allow the actions (or inaction) of others to lead us to wrath, we're on a slippery slope. One easy solution is to turn it off, whether it's Facebook or Twitter or the news. Believe it or not, we can live without knowing these things. And a little more silence might lead to prayer, which would convince us to pray more and judge less. *"God alone will repay,"* (Romans 12:19).

As for righteous indignation, there are many opportunities for practice these days. One current event is the production of vaccines for COVID-19. We ran a chart a month ago that showed the moral status of the 17 vaccines that have begun appearing on the market. Pfizer and Moderna are the vaccines being used in our area and they are morally licit, though sadly they were tested using stem cells derived from aborted fetal tissue. Johnson and Johnson's vaccine comes out this week and it is not morally licit because it used an aborted-derived cell line in production, as well as in testing. In other words, while it is not sinful to receive the Pfizer or Moderna vaccines, it would be sinful to receive Johnson and Johnson's (unless there was absolutely no other option). What can we do about this? Pharmaceutical companies have blind spots and unless we begin to speak up, nothing will ever change. Why not write a letter? If you need help, here's an example of what you could write:

"I am writing in regard to your COVID-19 vaccine. It is my understanding that a cell line originally derived from an abortion is being used in the production of your vaccine. I am contacting you to request that your company stop relying on these cells in the pharmaceutical work that you carry out. Please understand that as one of your potential customers, I am very concerned about these issues. It is my understanding that alternative, non-abortion-derived cell sources are available or could be made available. It is important for all of us to show our respect for the remains of those children whose lives were taken prematurely, and one way we can do this is by avoiding these cell lines in scientific research and pharmaceutical development. Thank you."

"Be angry, but do not sin" - here is our chance to really do this. Johnson and Johnson can be contacted by mailing your letter to Johnson & Johnson, c/o Office of Corporate Secretary; One Johnson & Johnson Plaza; New Brunswick, New Jersey, 08933. I sent my letter just last week. Will you join me? If not, maybe it's because you struggle with sloth. A senior quote I once saw in a yearbook got it right – *"I know apathy is a disease, but I just don't care."*

May God teach us to be meek and humble of heart so that we may love others as He loves us!

3rd Sunday of Lent

Many prefer a “create as you go” approach to life where laws and protocols primarily exist to secure and protect liberties rather than dictate and outline proper and right behavior. There are no real benchmarks for acceptable ethical and moral behavior, with a “you can’t tell me what to do” attitude prevailing. Parents are even limited in what they can request of their children, and dealing with threatening behaviors, especially from adults, are a challenge as well. Acceptable and expected conduct seems to amount to safeguarding each other’s space rather than increasing awareness of necessary relationships that require a more refined and higher response.

We have lost our axis to the world of “anything goes” and no longer see the Ten Commandments as practical and wise guideposts to effective living. We live on “relativism island” where only a possible suggestion to “love and do not harm” may be the only standard able to be preached. While Jesus most certainly emphasized love above anything else, it was never about warm fuzzy feelings or halfhearted humanitarian efforts. The love of which Jesus spoke establishes an intimate connection with God, neighbor, self, and creation. Because this love, who is God Himself, is at the foundational core of our lives, it demands actions and attitudes that serve to build up, increase, and free up those relationships. Love requires proper conduct. Preserving and enhancing these love centered relationships is at the heart of the Ten Commandments (and the Beatitudes) and the reason for Jesus’ display of anger in the temple.

The Ten Commandments can save the world from turmoil and conflict by instilling basic moral and relational principles within us. They also hold a healthy sense of sin in balance and always remind us of our relationship with God and the freedom God offers. Our faith preserves these jewels of truth that we often look beyond, dismiss altogether, or seek to remove from public view. Human beings can be so arrogant at times. Our Lenten journey, especially when embarked upon with sincerity and resolve, can restore all of our essential relationships. When we get absorbed in life’s preoccupations and demands, things can quickly get distorted and we can find ourselves way off track. In short, we find ourselves in sin. Humanity is losing a sense of both grace and sin. We need both to understand what is real and true. Until we do, the oppressive systems and ideologies that hurt so many will never change. We will never change. We are grateful for those courageous souls who willingly embrace the conversion and hard work Lent demands and stand against antiquated systems and ideologies. They give us hope that all is not lost.


Southwest Wausau Circle of Joy Food Pantry
