

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! A young man was visiting the Missionaries of Charity (Mother Teresa of Calcutta's religious order) in New York City as a volunteer. After a while, one of the Sisters got to know him well enough to insist that God was calling him to be a priest. He resisted, saying that such a calling was between him and God. The feisty Sister said she was going to make a novena to the Blessed Virgin Mary and that would take care of things. On the fifth day of the novena the young guy was fixing the door trim that had fallen off. While hammering it back on, he was suddenly struck hard in the head by an object that seemingly came out of nowhere. As he was recovering and trying to stop the blood that oozed from his head, he realized that he'd been struck by a statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary that had fallen off its pedestal situated above the door. Just then the Sister who was pushing him toward the priesthood came in, saw the young man bleeding, and was told that the statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary had dropped on his head. Her face softened and she turned to him and said, "Thank God! I hope maybe now you will wake up." Later on, he became a priest, proving the Sister's prophetic hunch accurate after all.

Sometimes it takes a sudden blow to the head to straighten us out – this is meant spiritually much more than physically. We live in a world that seems to always teeter on the brink and we face wave after wave of bad ideas that we're invited to bravely renounce. It wasn't that long ago, for example, that embryonic stem cells were touted as the cure to so many physical maladies. Lost in the excitement was the fact that these are our tiny brothers and sisters who share both our dignity and our potential. Due to the absence of any cures (not a single one to date), the project was abandoned and the whole enterprise has receded into the dustbin of history. Billions of dollars were spent and many human embryos were sacrificed on the altar of science, but the fruits were non-existent. Such utter failure was a blow to the head, which has been good news for nascent human beings who now have a chance to be born.

Another troubling development came to a head in 2015, when the Supreme Court ruled that God's design for marriage of one man, one woman is no longer defensible. Originally the defense of so-called same-sex marriage was along the lines of tolerance. The idea was that no one was forced to change their own beliefs about marriage, as long as people could choose to live as they saw fit. However, one of the problems with sin is that it's incredibly restless and ruthless too. It starts by preaching tolerance ("*live and let live*"), but it's not long before it becomes tyrannical, thereby requiring approval from each and every citizen. The transition from tolerance to tyranny is practically inevitable with sin. As a case in point, consider the Equality Act, which is presently being debated in the Senate.

The Equality Act initially tugs on our heartstrings because we all know equality is a good thing and worthy of our attention and our defense. Sadly, "Equality" in this context is a misnomer that has very little to do with equality and much to do with draconian oppression. With the Equality Act, our government seeks to require our consent regarding its erroneous ideas about gender and marriage. As our Bishops point out, "*every person is made in the image of God and must be treated with respect and compassion. Individuals have a right to live free of discrimination or harassment. However, the federal Equality Act of 2021 (H.R. 5), which aims to prevent discrimination by making "sexual orientation" and gender identity" protected categories under the Civil Rights Act, would instead foster inequality and intolerance.* Cardinal Timothy Dolan, Archbishop of New York, recently stated "*The Equality Act goes far beyond the noble desire to protect vulnerable people. It burdens consciences, severely curtails the rights of people to practice their faith, smuggles in an abortion mandate, and explicitly exempts itself from respecting religious freedom.*" In other words, it's time for another blow to the head.

God knows many of us have struggles that cause us embarrassment and shame. But indulging our fantasies about being whatever we want to be and loving in whatever way we want to love only leads to more heartache. Interestingly, in a culture that prides itself on "*following the science,*" the claims about gender that are endorsed by the Equality Act have hardly a shred of scientific evidence to buttress their claims. While our enemies will chalk up our position to the usual narrowness of Catholics (who are unscientific – so our detractors always suggest), the fact is that genetically we're either male or female. We certainly empathize with kids who struggle to find integration and happiness in this world. But championing the right to be whatever a person arbitrarily decides regarding "gender" is a ticking time bomb. Advocates of the Equality Act will make a lot of noise of lowering teenage suicide rates. And honestly, they drop momentarily when reassignment surgeries are performed. But wait five years and the suicide rate returns with a vengeance to an unacceptable level. Please God, save us from the terrible "cures" that are many times worse than the struggles they claim to fix.

A shot to the head is what true faith delivers, correcting our inclination toward superficial solutions for deeply spiritual problems. Gender confusion is a heavy cross that ought to elicit from us true charity and compassion. One of the best resources today can be found at the website personandidentity.com. Their self-description states:

*The mission of the Person and Identity Project (PIP) is to assist the Catholic Church in promoting the Catholic vision of the human person and responding to the challenges of gender ideology. Gender ideology has permeated the culture with stunning speed, influencing medicine, business, media, entertainment, government and education. Because it is sowing confusion and undermining the Church's mission of evangelization, the rise of gender ideology has created an urgent need for clarity, education, and compassionate guidance for Catholic families and young people. The Person and Identity Project is committed to assisting the Church in meeting these needs. PIP is a collaborative effort, coordinated by a leadership team that has decades of individual experiences in education, seminary formation, non-profit leadership, and apostolic service. The Person and Identity Project (PIP), which began in 2016 as the Catholic Women's Forum Gender Project, is an initiative of the **Catholic Women's Forum** at the **Ethics and Public Policy Center**, and is funded in part through the generosity of the Our Sunday Visitor Institute.*

May the Mother of God touch both our heads and our hearts, so that we may live the truth in love!

4th Sunday of Easter

Any builder worth his or her salt knows the value and importance of a cornerstone. Properly laying and securing this primary unit determines how the rest of the project unfolds and its success. Cornerstones are necessary elements not only of buildings but of lives as well. Many human beings conduct the business of their lives paying little attention to a grounding reference or starting point. Hence, what unfolds is a tapestry of relativism, with few anchors or guideposts and many impulsive choices. Some consider love to be their cornerstone. While this may sound attractive and useful, the pursuit of love without a simultaneous pursuit of its source can be shallow and self-focused. Just because a person chooses to do no harm and love others does not mean that they are living in truth and properly anchored to the real cornerstone.

Jesus is the true and authentic cornerstone and shepherd. It is only in following the Risen One as the way, the truth, and the life that we can move from being well grounded ethical people to properly focused moral ones. Proper conduct, a true sense of justice, wisdom, virtue, moral principles, faith, hope, and love will be difficult to find unless we listen to the right Voice. It is when we learn to listen to the voice of God that we begin our journey on the road to salvation. It is only the Good Shepherd, the authentic and solid cornerstone, who can guide us through life's questions and challenges and bring us to the safe and proper pasture.

A person's life only has meaning when the cornerstone is properly selected and set. Understanding themselves only as random acts of creation, existing without intent or purpose, will color their choices and influence their decisions. The foundation of their lives will be simply a matter of preference and choice, leaving benchmarks of growth and higher ideals optional to pursue. Whereas people who believe that they are fashioned and loved into existence by a God who purposely made them, have this incredible unconditional relationship at their source which has tremendous significance. Their allegiance is not to themselves but to their Creator. Life, then, is an adventure in search of this Creator God and a journey of self-discovery that seeks to unite their will to His. There is a cost. We have to give up our life in order to gain our life. As ironic as that sounds, it is true. It is only when we finally figure this out that the true cornerstone of our lives will be properly laid and we can, with God's help, get about the business of properly constructing a temple that endures.


