## From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Griswold versus Connecticut was the Supreme Court case in 1968 that first legalized the use of contraception for married couples. It was just five short years later that abortion was legalized, which suggests that there is a causal connection between the two. But if you decide to point this connection out to others, it's not always welcome news. Some years ago, I attended a peaceful and prayerful protest of a Planned Parenthood event in La Crosse that was promoting the expansion of its contraceptive services. At one point, while we were praying the Chaplet of Divine Mercy, a young college student walked up to me and spent the next five minutes yelling at me, accusing me and the others of being murderers. You just can't make this stuff up. Somehow, by the grace of God, I managed not to respond to his crazy and illogical antics.

Of all the troubling developments that characterize our world today, one of the more disappointing is the fact that we do not know how to argue. We can certainly blame others for this, and given the terrible examples we see on television and social media, that wouldn't be completely wrong. But our faith challenges us to look first into our own hearts and see if there's some room for improvement. As the 6<sup>th</sup> century Saint Dorotheus of Gaza once put it, *"Yet the reason for all disturbance, if we look to its roots, is that no one finds fault with himself. This is the reason why we become angry and upset, why we sometimes have no peace in our soul. We should not be surprised, since holy men have taught us that there is no other path to peace but this."*

Saint Thomas Aquinas (d. 1274) was one of the finest when it came to argumentation. He was diligent in his respect of his opponents, usually knowing their arguments better than they did. He believed in the truth and that, for it to rise to the top, there had to be arguments and debate. His favorite Proverb was *"iron sharpens iron,"* (Prov. 27:17) – the idea being that resistance to the truth helps refine it, clarify it, and codify it. But debating the truth is hard work and it makes us vulnerable – heck, we might be exposed as not knowing as much as we thought. Many people today indulge in the "drop the mic" sort of silliness that accomplishes nothing. For example, maybe you've seen the sign that begins with *"In this house we believe."* People are free to display such things, but it does give the impression that arguing the points they make will not be tolerated. One of the statements, *"Science is real,"* seems to imply that science has all the answers. Were one to suggest that science (and scientists) have limits, someone might be offended and that might result in scorn and a social media storm.

Or what about the claim that *"Love is love"*? In philosophy this is called a tautology, which is a logical error because a thing cannot be defined this way. But arguing about love might not have the happy results we'd expect; after all, *"love is love!"* and don't you dare disagree. Living in this climate can be challenging because people are increasingly unreasonable. Again, if you refuse to celebrate June by running up the rainbow flag and embracing everything it's come to signify, you clearly know nothing about love. Try to debate this and it probably will go downhill quickly.

One of the most potent arguments at the moment is the question of whether to be vaccinated or not to be vaccinated. Let's first recall some basic principles that help us make medical decisions: 1) do no harm (Hippocratic oath), 2) risks and benefits, and 3) informed consent. Medicine, to be true to its nature, ought to do no harm. This is further clarified by the fact that the benefits of whatever medical intervention being considered ought to outweigh the potential risks. And undergirding all of this is the patient's right to know and understand the risks and benefits so that the right decision can be made by the patient (or to whomever such authority has been delegated in case of incapacitation).

Sometimes things get intense and people become pushy – we're living in such times. But we do well to remember that the best way to help people decide what to do about their personal health is to present them with the facts. Pushy people annoy because they demean the dignity of others. And the more pushy people become, the more resistance they can expect to meet. Sadly, some then claim the right to make decisions for others who don't see things as they do. And that's a line we should never cross. Abdicating our personal freedom to make decisions about our own medical health leads to one of the slipperiest of slopes. People have the right to make their own decisions regarding their health. At the same time, we have an inherent duty to consider the common good and the safety of others. Because so much is still unknown about COVID-19 as well as the vaccines (which are not yet approved by the FDA), the right moral decision might not be so clear for everyone. This reality is not helped by exerting more pressure.

Saint John Paul II insisted that the Church ought always to propose the truth, but that she could not impose it. Jesus convincingly claimed that we would know the truth and that it would set us free. But He gave us a choice. Even when many abandoned Him because of His controversial teaching about the Eucharist, Jesus turned to the Apostles and asked if they would leave too. They had a choice, which is a part of the world in which we live. Jesus gave them the grace to live in the truth, but He didn't make the decision for them. Something similar is at work as we grapple with the vaccine and whether we will receive it. Each person gets to decide

There are many arguments happening about many elements of COVID-19 and the vaccines. This is good news and promises to ultimately lead to a greater understanding of the truth. Unhelpful is the push by others to do the thinking for us and tell us that if we fail to agree with their conclusions, it's because we're ignorant, selfish, or something much worse. In a nutshell, there are good reasons to get vaccinated for COVID-19. But there are also good reasons not to get vaccinated, a compelling one being that we know so little about the long-term effects. Either way, people have a right to be wrong (unless it endangers themselves or others – but that's a topic for another day).

May God bless all who spend their lives keeping us healthy and safe, even at the risk of their own health and safety!

**July 11, 2021 - 15th Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Maybe the work is best left to the professionals. That's how many people view the preaching of the Gospel. That's the stuff priests, religious, deacons, lay ministers, and other professional Church people do. It has little to do with me. Well, that's not really true. The fact of the matter is that preaching the Gospel has everything to do with you, with all of us who are baptized members of the Body of Christ. Nobody gets off the hook from that job. The question is, however, how do we do it? Well, there's a safe way, which many choose, to preach the Gospel — and the risky way. The safe way pretty much keeps the Gospel in church and around like-minded people. I say my prayers, go to Mass, contribute to the food pantry, tithe, and attend Bible Study. That pretty much covers the bases, right? Wrong.

The risky way is the more challenging way and for many, the "road less traveled." Imagine those first disciples going out and into people's homes. They must have had some amazing conversations with folks about God's kingdom, changing their hearts, forgiving sins, and looking at the world differently. They must have met people who were hurting, exiled from their communities, neglected, lost, or living self-insulated lives in a society that served the rich and neglected the poor. While there were many who welcomed what they had to say and the conversations they had, there were others who no doubt rejected them and literally tossed them out on their ears! The Gospel, while being a message of joy and hope, isn't always received well by those who are very comfortable keeping things as they are.

The risky way involves example and conversation. We have to take the Gospel from church and carry it with us wherever we go. What kinds of conversations do we have with others? We interact with those closest to us, in our work, social circles, institutions, corporations, in politics, and beyond. Our conversations with others reveal a great deal about how we see things and what we consider important. If we are really interested in seeing God's vision for the world succeed, then we will talk about it. It will become a part of our everyday conversation and find its way into our interactions with others. How will we preserve the dignity of human life and encourage others to have a relationship with God? We must be the example, live value centered, virtuous lives, stand against injustice, combating racism, and learn ways to resolve conflicts without violence.

If we are going to succeed going forward, we have to find a way to bring our prayer centered lives into the marketplace. Our conversations have to change. Not everyone wants to hear what the Gospel has to say. That's a risk God asks us to take.


