From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Paul Kingsnorth is an Irish poet who recently wrote an engaging article in the periodical, "First Things." He first described how he and his buddies liked to visit churches when they were young: "*We must have been fifteen or sixteen when we discovered the church visitor's book . . . I'd like to say it was someone else's idea to write in the visitor's book, where other people had inscribed things like "what a beautiful building" and "I feel a tremendous sense of peace here," but a man should never lie about matters of the soul. It was I who took up the biro (pen) and scrawled, "I WILL DESTROY YOU AND ALL OF YOUR WORKS! HA HA HA!" then signed it "SATAN." A few days later, we came back and did it again, "DIE, NAZARENE! VICTORY IS MINE!" I think we'd been watching the Omen films. We kept going for weeks, wondering when we'd be caught. We never were, but one day we came in to find that all of our entries had been tippexed (whited) out and the pen removed. The fun was over. We went to the video shop instead.*"

Rebellion is seemingly an inescapable phase that all of us must pass through at some point. This is true of individuals, and at times, entire societies. For example, the so-called 'sexual revolution' had more to do with rebellion than anything else. The interesting thing was how many drugs people consumed during those years. If unfettered sexual activity was truly the source of peace and joy, then why all the drugs? As Trent Reznor pointed out in a song he wrote about 20 years ago, "*I tried to kill it all away, but I remember everything.*" Yes, even atheists have consciences and what happens in Vegas never really stays in Vegas – it always ends up in the bottom of our hearts. Rebellion is a part of growing up, but some seem to live by the mantra that while we can be young only once, we can be immature forever.

Next week the Catholic Church celebrates National Natural Family Planning (NFP) week. For those of you who read the Catholic Life magazine, you met some couples who are doing their best to trust the Lord's plan for their families. While it's not always easy, such faith changes us in good ways. What follows is an explanation of how NFP blesses couples by challenging them to trust in God's Providence. I wrote this for the Bishops' USCCB website back in 2016 and, believe it or not, it's still there!

From 1979 until 1984 St. John Paul II spent the majority of his Wednesday audiences explaining God's plan for love and marriage. Fundamentally the Pope taught that no person should ever be used or manipulated—sadly, this happens much more frequently when the human heart is opened to a contraceptive mentality. The Holy Father cited the Second Vatican Council document, Gaudium et spes by reminding us that we can only discover who we really are through a sincere gift of ourselves (see GS, no. 24). As made clear in Humanae vitae, such a sincere gift must be freely given, it must be a total gift of self that proves itself by fidelity and a fruitfulness so tangible that we even have to give it a name (see HV, nos. 9, 10). These days countless couples are striving to live God's plan for marriage and the results are obvious: more noise in church and even more chaos once Mass is done, but a lot more happiness and a brighter future too! Pope Francis has rightly intuited that many are understandably concerned with nature and the many manipulations that are so commonplace today. It's in this vein that many of our young people find Natural Family Planning to be attractive: no chemicals, no unhealthy manipulation of the body, no permanent negative side effects. Because Saint Pope Paul VI prophetically predicted many of the results of the contraceptive movement, more and more people are suspicious of claims that we can wantonly make our body serve our boundless desire for pleasure. And while old habits die hard (and some have compared contraception to other sundry addictions), the truth of God's plan for conjugal love is proving to be more resilient and attractive than was thought two generations ago. In conclusion, if the salvation of many still depends on the holiness of a few, we can be certain that the Holy Spirit is speaking to the hearts of many in the Church and inviting us to open our hearts to God. While there are impressive benefits of Natural Family Planning, possibly its greatest attribute is that it demands sacrifice and communication. So does true love. The time is right not only to hear this good news, but also by the grace God gives us in the Sacraments, to live it more fully and courageously. The late Father John Harvey put this well when he wrote: Everyone needs love—and tragically, many may find little or no true love in this life. This is because there are many counterfeits of love. Some are simply insincere, like manipulations or narcissistic projection, which is self-love looking like love for someone else. Other counterfeits are more sincere and honest enough, but they are not true love. They may be sympathy or indulgence or even affection built on mutual concern and attraction, but they fall short of being true love. For as St. Paul reminds us, love never fails (1 Cor. 13:13). Love seeks not its own but rather bears all things, endures all things, hopes all things (The Homosexual Person, Ignatius Press, 1987, p. 11).

Mr. Kingsnorth eventually grew up and began to live as a mature and reasonable adult. He later admitted, "*I didn't know back then that the Christian story is the story of our rebellion against God. I didn't know that by taking part in that rebellion I had become part of the story, whether I liked it or not.*" By the grace of God, his story had a happy ending, as he describes it today: "*I grew up believing what all modern people are taught: that freedom meant lack of constraint. Orthodoxy (right belief) taught me that this freedom was no freedom at all, but enslavement to the passions: a neat description of the first thirty years of my life. True freedom, it turns out, is to give up your will and follow God's. To deny yourself. To let it come. I am terrible at this, but at least now I understand the path.*"

We pray for all of our married couples, especially for those who have not yet opened their hearts to God's mysterious plan for them. As those who practice NFP can attest, God's ways are not our ways – they're far better, more adventurous, much more demanding but much more rewarding too. NFP invites married couples to trust that God knows us and wants what is best for us. In the end, it's a leap of faith that is only possible through grace. Let's thank God for the courage and witness of the couples who are learning to truly trust in the Lord.

May God bless all married couples with the joy that comes when we trust in His Providence!

There's an ordinary pine grove located on a tree farm not too far from town where life's stresses and demands seem to melt away. It is here that all that seemed so important out there no longer is and one can get lost in the rows of trees and majestic beauty. God is here and all is good. We need to connect with the Divine Source of all that is in order to understand what it is we are doing and why we are doing it. Otherwise, things stop making sense and bitterness can overcome one's spirit. It's okay to play once in a while and to discover that place of profound life and peace. People always have needs and there is constantly something to do. And while all of that is necessary and we are needed, there is also that inner solitude within that needs to be celebrated and released.

We all need a pine grove. It's that little place we can go and leave all that consumes us behind. It's a place where technology can be set aside and wonder, and awe given some time. We don't have to text, calculate, or orchestrate anything in the pine grove. It is a somewhat deserted place where all of that can be set aside and we can just be. The anger, frustration, exhaustion, discouragement, helplessness, and occasional apathy, all can fall to the ground like all of those pine needles that once held their place on the branch of a Fraser Fir. The needles can let go. We can let go. We are beings connected with Being and we all need to remember what really matters, who really matters and what life is truly all about. We need to find that place where we can rest and let go of all of the barnacles we accumulate. Rest, breathe, seek, and love.

The world will need us again when we leave the pine grove. It will all be waiting for us, beckoning for our attention. But we will have prayed and will have marveled at the silence and the beauty of goodness. We can go back, ready, and eager to listen, to help, to heal, to cry, to embrace, and attend to all that is asked of us. But, having let go of the distractions in that deserted place we will have a renewed sense of purpose. We will know better Who it is we serve and what we are meant to do. It will all be clearer now that we have been Divinely touched and refreshed.

Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults begins September 13, 2021




