

## From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Eastman, Wisconsin has one of the finest celebrations of the 4<sup>th</sup> of July you'll find anywhere. For a town of just over 400 souls, they've long hosted a fantastic parade as well as a fireworks' show that can hold its own with the best of them. I made it home to watch the fireworks with my Mom and my little brother and his family, but I missed the parade because I was celebrating Mass at Holy Name. When I asked how the parade went, I was told that there was only one marching band, and not a very impressive one at that. While I'm not going to make some sweeping claims that our kids are unmotivated and the future is bleak, it does give us a chance to consider what G.K. Chesterton said nearly one hundred years ago: "*It's not that Christianity has been tried and found wanting; it's been found to be difficult and therefore not tried.*"

Music, like so many elements of human existence, requires practice. When I was little our band instructor said we should practice at least 30 minutes per day. I liked him, so I did what he said. And guess what – it worked. I got better and better at playing the trumpet. I found a similarity in the practice required to learn a foreign language. At first, the efforts seem futile and the mistakes frequent and humiliating. But for the person who perseveres, eventually the evidence is clear that practice, while not making us perfect, certainly leads us in that direction. None of this is earth-shattering. We know life is not a series of magic tricks whereby we are able to improve without determination and effort. But why do some work at it while others don't? Frankly, it's not surprising that many quit when the successes they had imagined do not materialize. What is impressive is that so many persevere and find happiness in the eventual successes they achieve. Let's consider for a moment why some keep trying, whether it be music, a foreign language, or faith, while so many others throw in the towel.

As we return to Mass again after the 10-week quarantine of 2020 and the reinstatement of the obligation regarding Sunday Mass attendance, it seems that some may not be coming back. What happened to them? A friend astutely pointed out that living a sacramental life is a serious business. People who attempt to go through the motions usually find that they're not "*getting anything out of it.*" Generally, this means that they're not receiving what God is giving because something in their life has closed their soul to grace. For some, this could be a callous attitude about sin. Sometimes people pick and choose what they believe and never tell God that they're sorry when they fail to obey His Commandments. Missing Mass without a legitimate reason is a common way that people start to drift away from their faith. Not confessing these sins closes our hearts and souls to the graces that God wants to give. Once the drift begins, it's not long before we find ourselves no longer attending Mass and probably not even regretting it because it was no longer a source of grace and conversion.

In marriage we see something similar. The Catholic Church has always held marriage to be a sacrament, meaning that it offers many graces for the spouses so that they might persevere in fidelity to Christ and to each other. But many today are not receiving these graces because they choose to marry outside of the Church. This is not a punishment. God offers His grace to each and every person He created. Some are more open to receiving it – we know, for example, that practicing our faith is a surefire way to keep moving in the right direction. Similar to practicing an instrument or studying a foreign language, living our faith means we'll get tired and sometimes feel that it's not working. And that's where faith comes in: it has an inner strength that, while not so evident at first, more and more begins to show its splendor and glory the longer we live it. Faith is not a quick fix or a band aid. In a world that constantly has us racing after the latest fads, faith is a rock that promises stability when the storms and trials come. Marriage, by God's design, is a sacrament, and that means it should always be received in a church.

There are some exceptions, but if you know a Catholic who got married outside of the Church (e.g. by a justice of peace minister, on a beach, in a barn, or on someone's front lawn), that means they're living in an irregular or invalid marriage. Other religions don't have this standard, so this is not an indictment of other practices. The fact that many Catholics are living in irregular marriages means that many graces given by God are not being received. That's not good news. It means that many of these will possibly drift away from their faith because "*they're not getting anything out of it.*" The good news is that they can have their marriage blessed and receive all the graces God has stored up for them. Most priests are happy to help with this process and it doesn't cost a cent. But it will require prayer, commitment, and humility. These are not easy things for us.

The wonderful thing about our Catholic faith is that it only really works if we engage it with sincerity and a humble, contrite heart. Yes, we can live as "phonies:" we sometimes go through the motions and tell God we're doing our best. But both He and we know the truth, even if we tell ourselves otherwise. Practicing our faith purifies our motives, and for the parishioners who are still attending Mass every Sunday and going to confession on a regular basis as they come to the end of their earthly pilgrimage, you will find spiritual gold in their hearts and souls. For those who don't, we need only remember that Jesus taught that we will each reap what we have sown. No one magically becomes holy . . . practice, penance, and perseverance are the way to Heaven.

If you or someone you know would like to talk about having your marriage blessed, please do not hesitate to contact me. God wants to give us so many graces to help us on the way to Heaven – why look a gift horse in the mouth?!

May God continue to help and heal all who have fallen away – may His grace and His friends help them to find their way back home!

St. Oscar Romero said, "We cannot do everything, and there is a sense of liberation in realizing that. This enables us to do something and to do it very well. It may be incomplete, but it is the beginning, a step along the way, an opportunity for the Lord's grace to enter and do the rest."

There were a group of ladies many years ago who made quilts. They were beautiful creations reflecting inspirational designs artfully composed from the simple scraps of fabric each woman would bring to their individual pieces. There was no plan for the finished project as each finished work became the combined creation of what each woman contributed. They abounded in vibrant colors and dazzled the beholder with intricate patterns and their myriad textures. They were so beautiful that they became coveted family treasures passed from generation to generation. Those women never realized the power of their work. Countless babies rested in the comfort of those quilts warmly nestled in the legacy of tradition they were fortunate to inherit. They adorned countless homes with their beauty and brought joy and solace to many faces.

We cannot do everything. We are not meant to. Our work in life is to contribute our individual piece, a piece that reflects the unique thumbprint I claim as my own. We only have to do small things well. Then, as St. Oscar Romero reminds us, the Lord's grace will enter and do the rest. We have to trust that this is true just as those women trusted in the eventual beauty of their final work.

Eucharistic blessings are blessings that start small and multiply. We all come to life with only a few loaves of bread and a few fish. Not any single one of us has all that it takes to transform our world. Who knows what God will do with the little we have and how many will benefit from our kindness, compassion, wisdom, courage, conviction, love, warmth, zeal, faith, and hope? That young lad never dreamed that his few leftovers would do all that they did. God shows up in unexpected ways! Where would life's adventure and fun be if it were any other way? Being able to be part of bringing God's creative, transforming, healing to the world opens us up to wonder, awe, and excitement! We can all bring our little piece to the bigger work of God that can result in being a coveted jewel passed generation to generation. This is good news indeed!

Bread and wine transform into Christ's Body and Blood and we become what we eat. Trust that.

### Catechesis of the Good Shepherd at Holy Name

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) is a religious education method centered around the parable of the Good Shepherd and based largely on the Montessori method of education. Through interactive lessons and hands-on experiences, children learn about God and faith in a way that is experiential, tangible and developmentally appropriate.

The focus of the program is to deepen the child's existing relationship with God; to encourage the formation of a personal prayer life; to participate fully in the liturgical and sacramental life of the Church; and to develop a deeper understanding of Catholic identity and tradition.

CGS is divided into three levels, and each level differs in tasks and instruction according to the developmental needs of the child. Level one is for ages 3-6, level two for ages 6-9, and level three for ages 9-12. All sessions will be from 2:30-5:30 pm with Level I on Wednesday, Level II on Tuesday and Level III on Thursday. If you work, perhaps a grandfather or grandmother, an aunt or uncle, or a big brother or sister could do the pick up and drop off for you.

CGS can be the program of choice for any of our religious education families. However, it does not have to be one or the other. Last year we had children that attended CGS and Religious Education classes, and other children that attended both CGS and Newman Catholic schools. It's an entirely different experience for the children in the Atrium.
