

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Next Sunday we will celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of Mary, body and soul, into Heaven. Pope Pius XII declared this dogma in 1950 and it reminds us of the mystery of our bodily resurrection at the end of time. To enhance our devotion to the Mother of God, we'll have Scapulars available for anyone who would like to get enrolled. If what you just read sounds strange and incomprehensible, then this is a very teachable moment.

In 1251 the Blessed Virgin Mary appeared to a Carmelite priest named Father Simon Stock. Mary offered him a Scapular, which is a simple cloth garment worn over the shoulders (the shoulder bone being the *scapula*, hence the name of the garment). Mary promised Saint Simon that whoever died while wearing the Scapular would not suffer eternal punishment. As you might imagine, some folks got excited and began to claim that we now have a "get out of hell free" card. That is not what the Church actually teaches about the Scapular.

The scapular is a Marian habit or garment. It is both a sign and pledge. A sign of belonging to Mary; a pledge of her motherly protection, not only in this life but after death. As a sign, it is a conventional sign signifying three elements strictly joined: first, belonging to a religious family particularly devoted to Mary, especially dear to Mary and the Carmelite Order; second, consecration to Mary, devotion to and trust in her Immaculate Heart; third an incitement to become like Mary by imitating her virtues, above all her humility, chastity, and spirit of prayer.

Wearing the Scapular is a personal devotion that as a Catholic you're free to take or leave. When Jesus died and rose to save us from eternal damnation, He won for us infinite graces. Most of those graces come to us through the Sacraments, preeminently in the Holy Eucharist and regular confession. But there are many others that can be received through the various devotions that have been approved by the Church. Think of these graces in this way: the Catholic Church is a treasure chest of devotions that you're welcome to embrace as you see fit. These devotions are not a "one size fits all." Rather, there's something in the Church for everyone and it's up to you to discover what helps you most in becoming more like Jesus Christ. Devotion to His Mother has always been near and dear to many Catholics. Maybe you're one of them.

My Dad wears the Scapular and has for pretty much as long as I've known him. I wore the Scapular when I was younger, but then I became self-conscious and I worried about the uneven tan that I got when I wore it. Mostly, I didn't like having to respond to my friends' questions about what it was and why I wore it. But as life has a way of humbling us (or hardening us, which happens more often if we have no faith), I realized I needed more help if I was ever to become a good guy. Mary is not only Jesus' Mother, she is His best disciple. Growing closer to Mary inevitably brings us closer to Jesus. For some people, wearing the Scapular is an effective reminder that following Jesus is the best thing for us and for the whole world. If you'd like to give it a try, come to Mass next weekend and open your heart to the prayers of enrollment.

One other feature of the Scapular is that it has a way of reading souls. What I mean by this is that there have been countless stories of people who tried to use the Scapular as an amulet or a lucky rabbit's foot. Because faith cannot be faked forever, sooner or later people who were not keeping the Commandments felt compelled to take the Scapular off. Honestly, this is a heartening reality for all of us, as the last thing we'd ever want to become is someone who pretends to be something that we are not. I would particularly recommend the Scapular to those who are lukewarm in their faith (e.g. folks who miss Mass whenever it's inconvenient). Mary, as a perfect Mother and a powerful intercessor, will pray so that we can take another step in our spiritual life.

Another opportunity to grow in faith has to do with being authentically pro-life. Mothers are innately pro-life by God's design. However, because we live in a fallen world and because the devil, who was a murderer from the beginning, we have to be vigilant in our defense of innocent and defenseless human life. The devil loves to get us to do his dirty work, and there's nothing more devastating for us as human beings than to be complicit in the death of babies in the womb. God gives us so many graces to respond with courage and compassion to this ongoing fight for the right to life. Many of you are already aware of the opportunity to purchase a "Choose Life" license plate – they've been available to Wisconsin motorists since late October 2017. Pro-Life Wisconsin and Wisconsin Family Council partnered to underwrite all the administrative costs of Choose Life Wisconsin, which allows us to give every penny that comes from the sale of the plates to Wisconsin's incredible pregnancy care centers! With 1,791 of these plates on cars in the Badger State, sales have resulted in a total of nearly \$100,000 which has been granted to over twenty-five Wisconsin pregnancy resource centers in a little over two years. Finally, I recently finished a fantastic book about Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI. Among the many gems, here are two for your ruminating pleasure:

"The culture of Europe arose from the encounter between Jerusalem, Athens and Rome – the encounter between Israel's faith in God, the philosophical reason of the Greeks and Roman law. This three-way encounter has shaped Europe's inner identity. Aware of human responsibility before God and acknowledging the inviolable dignity of every single human person, it has established criteria of law: it is these criteria that we are called upon to defend now in our own historical moment." (Benedict XVI: A Life, Peter Seewald, pg. 81)
"Indeed, Joseph (Ratzinger – the future Pope Benedict XVI) was very moved by Saint-Exupéry. Later he would often quote the core sentence of the parable from The Little Prince: 'You only see well with your heart. What is essential is invisible to the eye.'" (pg. 148)

May God help us to grow closer to Him through the influence of His Saints, especially Mary and Joseph!

August 8, 2021 - 19th Sunday in Ordinary Time

The lens through which we view life makes a difference. It also determines who we choose to learn from and what we allow to shape our thoughts and feelings. For many, life is simply what it appears to be, a given that either through evolution or some other means just came to be. There is no apparent rhyme or reason to things and things can be dissected and understood only in terms of what they empirically present. To the person using this lens, a tree is a tree and a flower is a flower. Their composition and existence can be understood only to the extent that current human knowledge allows. Through this lens, what gives life purpose and meaning? This lens has an essentially unknown beginning and definite end. Once those are accepted, the middle becomes some kind of pursuit of happiness, with values and principles being things that are self-created and found acceptable.

But there is a Divine lens that also exists and deserves mention. It is found when one stumbles upon faith and begins to see things differently. This lens is of God and reveals a Divine Energy and Life that flows through and in all things. Faith then shows us that all that lives come from this one Source of Love. This is the only true lens that can give human beings the purpose and meaning they desperately need. From this perspective, all of life is much more than what is immediately apparent! It now tells and reveals a story about God generous, creative, and unconditional love! The unfolding of the human story is the unfolding of God's story. What meaning our lives have when they are viewed as a part of God's love affair with humanity! We are indeed special.

The lens of our faith asks us to learn from Jesus Christ. Jesus, as the real Bread of Life, shows us our eternal destiny and completes and frames our lives. It is only in allowing ourselves to be taught by Jesus, that faith, hope, and love take on much greater importance. All the relationships in our lives are now structured and ordered using God's primary commandment of love. Jesus, then, is not just some man who lived at some point in history. Jesus is the incarnate Son of God who shows us the way, the truth, and the life. Using this lens changes things up a great deal. Looking at the creation that surrounds you and the special unique people you love, what is God trying to teach you about His love for you and the eternal life He wants you to have?



Wisconsin Safe Haven Laws allow parents to relinquish an infant under 72 hours old to any first responder, no questions asked. Those first responders could be police officers, 911 emergency medical staff, or hospital staff members. You do not have to give your name or address to the professional accepting the baby unless the baby has been harmed, someone is forcing the parent to give up the baby, or the baby is more than days old. The parent may be asked if they are willing to fill out a form, but is NOT required; it will help providers give the infant the best care, if you wish to learn more about this law, visit <http://dcf.wisconsin.gov/cps/safehaven>.

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd at Holy Name

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) is a religious education method centered around the parable of the Good Shepherd and based largely on the Montessori method of education. Through interactive lessons and hands-on experiences, children learn about God and faith in a way that is experiential, tangible and developmentally appropriate.

The focus of the program is to deepen the child's existing relationship with God; to encourage the formation of a personal prayer life; to participate fully in the liturgical and sacramental life of the Church; and to develop a deeper understanding of Catholic identity and tradition.


CGS is divided into three levels, and each level differs in tasks and instruction according to the developmental needs of the child. Level one is for ages 3-6, level two for ages 6-9, and level three for ages 9-12. All sessions will be from 2:30-5:30 pm with Level I on Wednesday, Level II on Tuesday and Level III on Thursday. If you work, perhaps a grandfather or grandmother, an aunt or uncle, or a big brother or sister could do the pick up and drop off for you.

CGS can be the program of choice for any of our religious education families. However, it does not have to be one or the other. Last year we had children that attended CGS and Religious Education classes, and other children that attended both CGS and Newman Catholic schools. It's an entirely different experience for the children in the Atrium.
