

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Periodically there are controversies that we must discuss, even if they make us uncomfortable. Because there are so many volatile and confusing issues right now, we will dispense of the pleasantries and get right down to business. Many have asked to hear about the status of the Latin Mass after Pope Francis' motu proprio from last month. Others are interested in what the American Bishops are doing about compromised Catholic politicians who seek to receive Holy Communion while supporting legal abortion. Finally, for well over a year an increasing number of people have been hearing about Father James Altman. As you might imagine, sides have formed and a widening chasm is challenging the Church. Before reading further, please pray:

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth your Spirit and they shall be created. And You shall renew the face of the earth. O, God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit, did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that by the same Holy Spirit we may be truly wise and ever enjoy His consolations, Through Christ Our Lord, Amen.

As a basic principle, it's wise to remember Saint Paul's words to the Thessalonians, "*Test all things, retain what is true,*" (1 Thes. 5:21). When it comes to discussing things with which we're not all that familiar, it's very easy for inaccuracies to be glossed over because we simply don't know any better. For most of us, this includes life in the Vatican and what the Pope must be thinking. I had a classmate who worked at the Latin desk in the Vatican for some years, so vicariously I learned a little bit about what life is like there on a daily basis. And while that's a lot more than most human beings on the planet know, it's analogous to someone who visited the State Capital one time while in grade school. In matters that affect the Holy Father and the work coming out of the Vatican, we should begin by acknowledging our extremely limited understanding and experience. This would bring a healthy degree of humility to the conversation, and God knows there is generally a short supply of that virtue these days.

Another basic principle is that there is always more than meets the eye. If we're honest, we see in ourselves the tendency to jump to conclusions or to put a person into a category that we've predetermined based on some faulty information or a prejudice that we may or may not know we have. Some public people are a more open book and it's easier to draw conclusions from what they say or do. Pope Francis plays his cards as close to his chest as anyone alive right now. This makes him one of the hardest people to read. And that means anyone claiming to know what he is thinking and what motivates him ought to be held in suspicion until there are facts buttressing such claims. All of this is background for Pope Francis' reigning in the Extraordinary Form of the Roman Rite (a.k.a. the Latin Mass).

A simple summary is that the Latin Mass is as sacred now as it was for the many centuries that it brought grace and salvation into our world. At the end of the Second Vatican Council many rather radical changes were introduced into the Mass and that was a very challenging time for a lot of Catholics. The Latin Mass was never suppressed, and it was Pope Benedict XVI that gave a general permission for any validly ordained priest to offer it. For the record, I'm trying to learn it because it's a part of our spiritual family tree. I'm not sure if and when I would ever have reason to offer the Latin Mass, but learning it is like meeting relatives that I never knew I had. And though Pope Francis rescinded Pope Benedict's universal permission last month, he did not suppress the Latin Mass or in any way suggest that it was part of the problem. For the record, the problem is the same as it's always been: the world, the flesh, and the devil. And the devil loves division. That's allegedly why Pope Francis deemed it necessary to pull the reigns in a bit with the Latin Mass. What we can do is acknowledge that we receive the same Jesus in Holy Communion as the good people across the river at Saint Mary's. And we can pray that the Communion we receive in Mass will deepen the communion we live with each other.

Speaking of Communion, the reality of Catholics who openly promote abortion and who persist in receiving Jesus at Mass is rearing its ugly head again. Sadly, this is as old as Catholicism, as Saint Paul points out in his first letter to the Corinthians (1 Cor. 11:28-32): "*Therefore, whoever eats the bread or drinks the cup of the Lord unworthily will have to answer for the body and blood of the Lord. A person should examine himself; and so eat the bread and drink the cup. For anyone who eats and drinks without discerning the body, eats and drinks judgment on himself. That is why many among you are ill and infirm, and a considerable number are dying. If we discerned ourselves, we would not be under judgment; but since we are judged by [the] Lord, we are being disciplined so that we may not be condemned along with the world.*"

Catholics who receive Holy Communion while simultaneously aware of grave sin on their soul (for example, missing Sunday Mass without a valid reason, fornication, intentional drunkenness, etc.) commit a sacrilege. And sacrilege is a quick way to close our heart to the graces God wants us to receive. When people claim they get nothing out of Mass, it may be because they're living in sin and their souls are not able to receive the graces God wants to give. While the focus is seemingly always on Catholic politicians who publicly support abortion, we miss an opportunity to examine our own consciences so as to make sure we're living the faith with sincerity. Saint Paul sagely points out that each of us will stand before God and answer for the Communion we received. While we pray for conversion for all who sadly support the termination of innocent human life, we do well to remember to work on our own ongoing conversion and go to confession at least once a year.

It seems that we're out of space for this week, which means you'll have to wait until next week to hear about Father James Altman. As homework, please remember to pray for him and Bishop Callahan this week; the night before He died, Jesus prayed ardently for unity. We do well to imitate Him.

May God send the Holy Spirit, so that we may trust Him with the innocence of children and the wisdom of His saints!

Knowing who we are and who we will one day become helps us to better chart the course and direction of our earthly lives. Looking to the example of our Blessed Mother, we receive the assurance we need.

Catholic Charities Bulletin: Wisconsin Safe Haven Laws allow parents to relinquish an infant under 72 hours old to any first responder, no questions asked. Those first responders could be police officers, 911 emergency medical staff, or hospital staff members. You do not have to give your name or address to the professional accepting the baby unless the baby has been harmed, someone is forcing the parent to give up the baby, or the baby is more than days old. The parent may be asked if they are willing to fill out a form, but is NOT required; it will help providers give the infant the best care, if you wish to learn more about this law, visit <http://dcf.wisconsin.gov/cps/safehaven>.

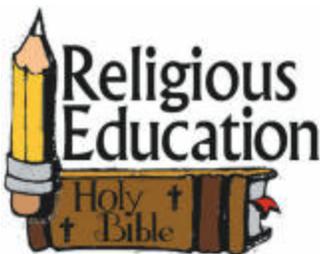

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd at Holy Name

Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) is a religious education method centered around the parable of the Good Shepherd and based largely on the Montessori method of education. Through interactive lessons and hands-on experiences, children learn about God and faith in a way that is experiential, tangible and developmentally appropriate.

The focus of the program is to deepen the child's existing relationship with God; to encourage the formation of a personal prayer life; to participate fully in the liturgical and sacramental life of the Church; and to develop a deeper understanding of Catholic identity and tradition.

CGS is divided into three levels, and each level differs in tasks and instruction according to the developmental needs of the child. Level one is for ages 3-6, level two for ages 6-9, and level three for ages 9-12. All sessions will be from 2:30-5:30 pm with Level I on Wednesday, Level II on Tuesday and Level III on Thursday. If you work, perhaps a grandfather or grandmother, an aunt or uncle, or a big brother or sister could do the pick up and drop off for you.

CGS can be the program of choice for any of our religious education families. However, it does not have to be one or the other. Last year we had children that attended CGS and Religious Education classes, and other children that attended both CGS and Newman Catholic schools. It's an entirely different experience for the children in the Atrium.
