

## From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! “*You cannot be a Catholic and a Democrat,*” said Father James Altman last September. Maybe you’re offended by these words. Or maybe you think this guy should be canonized right now. Whatever side of the political aisle you find yourself, this is a teachable moment. Many people are more passionate about politics than about religion. People who define themselves as a Democrat or as a Republican fall into a regrettable reduction, as if we’re no more than political players on an ever-changing chessboard. God reveals that we are His children and that our identity comes from our relationship to Him. Saying we’re merely a member of some political party obscures the fact that we are God’s children now. People who put their politics before God have their priorities mixed up. In the old days, people who put other things or persons before God were called idolaters.

Yes, Father Altman caused quite the stir when he began to preach more and more boldly about the terrible sins of our world, but now that he’s been “silenced” many are scandalized and are calling for our Bishop’s resignation. It’s a somewhat complicated mess, but maybe we can consider a few simple principles that will help us sort things out a bit. First of all, Father Altman subscribes to the school of Sir Edmund Burke, who once wrote, “*The only thing necessary for evil to prevail in the world is for good men to do nothing.*” Father Altman has long taken that as a sort of call to spiritual arms. And this is necessary because it’s consistent with our Baptismal promises to renounce Satan and his works and all his empty promises. But maybe we take things too far. Jesus points this out in a couple of ways.

First, the Samaritans insulted Jesus and the “sons of thunder” (James and John) asked Jesus if they should call down sulfur from the sky as an act of revenge, (cf. Luke 9:54). For the record, Jesus said “no.” And if that wasn’t convincing enough, Jesus rebuked Peter after he cut the ear off the High Priest’s slave (John 18:10). The reality is that Jesus has His own way of fighting evil that does not entail force. The flipside of the coin is that Jesus is very harsh with the establishment (i.e. the Pharisees, Scribes, Sadducees). He flips the tables of the money changers in the Temple and castigates anyone who is quick to judge and slow to forgive. Jesus never compromises with evil, but He doesn’t destroy it either. He simply moves demons from people into pigs. For all of His perfection, Jesus is not an easy Person to define. But He told us that from the beginning when He insisted that His ways are not our ways.

By this time some of you are getting nervous, thinking that I’m against Father Altman. What is at stake is not what side I’m on or anyone is on. What matters most is whether we’re doing God’s will as we make our way through this life. For a priest, the goal is in our attempt to imitate Jesus in all things. God knows we fail more often than we had hoped, but that does not lower the standard. When we were ordained as priests, we were instructed to “*model your life on the mystery of the Lord’s Cross.*” And that is the most important aspect of our priesthood, namely that we learn to suffer and that we teach our people to suffer with deep faith and trust in the Lord. Sometimes we forget this, and that leads to the same forgetfulness of our identity as putting our political party before God. The following quote from Saint Josemaría Escrivá beautifully captures this: “*God is my father, even though He sends me suffering. He loves me tenderly, though He wounds me. Jesus suffers to fulfill the most holy will of God . . . And I, who also want to fulfill God’s will by following in the footsteps of the Master, can I complain if I meet suffering along the way? It is a clear sign of my divine filiation, for He is treating me like His divine Son.*”

This is the crux of the crisis of faith that many are experiencing because of the preaching of Father Altman. Unwittingly, Father has demanded a world without evil, one in which the weeds must be removed posthaste. But that’s not the world that Jesus promised us . . . He said that we would have trouble in this world, but that we should not fear because He has overcome the world, (Jn. 16:33). How did He overcome the world? By forgiving it, by embracing it, by suffering with, for, and from it. Finally, by dying for it. And now He asks His followers to do the same. Yes, we name evil, but only to call it to conversion. And though Jesus loathes sin, He truly does love all sinners. He is as willing to suffer for us now as He was twenty centuries ago. In fact, in His children God suffers more now than ever before. From abortion to euthanasia to all the hurts in broken marriages and divided families, God knows suffering in an unfathomable way. Yet, He refuses to call down sulfur from the sky or lift a sword in self-defense. Jesus chose the Cross and He continues to invite us to do the same. But what does this mean for us?

Preachers come and go, and we do well to thank God for those who speak the truth. But the truth can be used as a club that leads not to conversion but to condemnation. Jesus spoke the truth always, but He fulfilled the prophecy of Isaiah who said that “*a bruised reed He will not break, a smoldering wick He will not quench,*” (Isaiah 42:3). While Father Altman said many things that are true and deserving of our attention, the lapse was in failing to remind us of the efficacy of redemptive suffering. We name sin, but only to draw people to God’s merciful grace. We inveigh against evil only because we love sinners and hope, pray, and suffer for their conversion. In fact, it’s only in learning to love sinners that we’re finally able to accept God’s love for us. So it has always been, so it must always be – again, a quote from Saint Josemaría captures this truth: “*Let’s not deceive ourselves: in our life we will find vigor and victory and depression and defeat. This has always been true of the earthly pilgrimage of Christians, even of those we venerate on the altars. Don’t you remember Peter, Augustine, and Francis? I have never liked biographies of saints which naively – but also with a lack of sound doctrine – present their deeds as if they had been confirmed in grace from birth. No. The true life stories of Christian heroes resemble our own experience: they fought and won; they fought and lost. And then, repentant, they returned to the fray,*” (*Christ is Passing By*).

May God bless all who preach His Gospel, that they may bring the fire that purifies and sets hearts free!

**August 22, 2021 - 21st Sunday in Ordinary Time**

“Far be it from us to forsake the Lord for the service of other gods.” We struggle with our gods. They appear in the forms of things like money, power, prestige, popularity, privilege, and self-fulfillment. We like these “gods” because they make us feel good and ask very little of us in return. When we worship them, we worship ourselves. How can you go wrong with that? We buy into the illusion that if something can give us a comfortable life, free of want and need, then it is worth setting other things aside to pursue it. In essence, we sell our souls. Our struggle with “who is God” and to whom do we belong is a real one and one that can easily find us empty and experiencing disillusionment.

The devil tempted Jesus in the desert and promised him more. We are promised “more.” But in pursuing the more and the satisfying we lose track of the cost, and the cost is great. We sacrifice our very life in pursuit of something disguised as life. We sacrifice truth for something that only “feels” true. While the true and real God certainly promises us many things, many things are also required. It is not about the warm and secure feelings and self-absorption the world wants to provide, but of giving back. There can be no lukewarm stance with regard to faith. If we are in, then faith in Jesus Christ asks us to do some difficult things: work in service of God’s kingdom (not our own), love our enemies, offer no resistance to injury, that we must die to ourselves in order to find ourselves, and trust that Jesus truly gives us his flesh and blood to eat and drink. These are hard things to accept and even harder to put into practice. It is no wonder that many, who may be attracted to Jesus at first, walk away in pursuit of the more self-satisfying gods.

But truth is truth. If we cannot accept it from the lips of Jesus Christ, then where else will we find it? To whom can we go? There is only one source of truth and life, Jesus Christ. Jesus has the words of eternal life and if we do not go to him, then where else will we find this gift? But we must be faithful and buy into the whole package deal that requires sacrifice and fidelity. When we do, we find ourselves, through the Body and Blood of Christ, connected to the Source of all life and then intimately bound with our brothers and sisters. We all have to decide whether we want to stay or go and if we can accept what Jesus has to say. It’s a choice we all have to make.

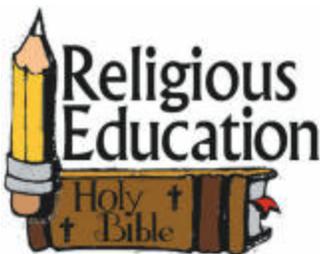
