From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Years ago, I saw a poster in a rectory in New York City that spelled out the basic principles of "Murphy's Law." Some have claimed that this intriguing list was born at Edwards Air Force Base in 1949 and that it was named after Captain Edward A. Murphy. My own sense is to be somewhat suspicious of anything having to do with Murphy's Law, as it smacks of what is often referred to as an urban legend. Just the same, the "basic principles" are worthy of our attention and there's probably not a single person reading this who hasn't heard or cited one of them at some point. I've listed them in the traditional order, only deleting one that did not pass the parish filter for decency:

1. *Nothing is as easy as it looks.*
2. *Everything takes longer than you think.*
3. *Anything that can go wrong will go wrong.*
4. *If there is a possibility of several things going wrong, the one that will cause the most damage will be the one to go wrong.*
Corollary: If there is a worse time for something to go wrong, it will happen then.
5. *If anything simply cannot go wrong, it will anyway.*
6. *If you perceive that there are four possible ways in which a procedure can go wrong, and circumvent these, then a fifth way, unprepared for, will promptly develop.*
7. *Left to themselves, things tend to go from bad to worse.*
8. *If everything seems to be going well, you have obviously overlooked something.*
9. *Nature always sides with the hidden flaw.*
10. *It is impossible to make anything foolproof because fools are so ingenious.*
11. *Whenever you set out to do something, something else must be done first.*
12. *Every solution breeds new problems.*

After listing these basic principles, the poster ended with the surprising words, "*Murphy was an optimist.*" If that's true, none of us would want to meet a pessimist.

Happy Labor Day weekend, by the way! This column will be light and frothy because it's the end of summer and we're already sad. We've been blessed with a beautiful summer, full of sun, heat, humidity, and ample rain. But the days are getting shorter and now the leaves are beginning to show the effects of time. Soon there will be frost on the pumpkins and some of our feathery friends will head south to more comfortable climates. For now, we take a moment to thank God for the beautiful memories we made with family and friends, remembering that the past is always a preparation for a future that we cannot yet see.

A college basketball coach once gave a very stirring speech about gratitude that I happened to hear. Among the topics, he spoke eloquently about gratitude for the mystery of our life. At the core of gratitude is a certain nostalgia, which seems to sting at times because it reveals that time is passing and our lives must inevitably lead to a final end. While we hope for a happy ending in Christ, many of us misuse the time we have before we die. The coach poignantly quoted the following rather famous poem by Robert Hastings:

'THE STATION' BY ROBERT J HASTINGS

Tucked away in our subconscious minds is an idyllic vision. We see ourselves on a long journey that spans an entire continent. We are travelling by train. Out the windows, we drink in the passing scenes of cars on nearby highways, of children waving at a crossing, of cattle grazing on a distant hillside, of smoke pouring from a power plant, of row upon row of corn and wheat, of flatlands and valleys, of mountains and rolling hillsides, of city skylines and village halls.

But uppermost in our minds is our final destination. On a certain day at a certain hour, we will pull into the station. Bands will be playing, and flags waving. Once we get there so many wonderful dreams will come true and the pieces of our lives will fit together like a completed jigsaw puzzle. How restlessly we pace the aisles and count the miles... waiting, waiting, waiting, for the station.

"When we reach the station, that will be it!" we cry. "When I'm eighteen." "When I buy that new car." "When I put the last child through college." "When I have paid off the mortgage." "When I get a promotion." "When I reach the age of retirement, I shall live happily ever after!"

Sooner or later, however, we must realize there is no station, no one place to arrive at once and for all. The true joy of life is the trip. The station is only a dream. It constantly outdistances us.

"Relish the moment" is a good motto, especially when coupled with Psalm 118:24: "This is the day which the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it." It isn't the burdens of today that drive men mad. It is the regrets over yesterday and the fear of tomorrow. Regret and Fear are twin thieves who rob us of today.

So, stop pacing the aisles and counting the miles. Instead, climb more mountains, eat more ice cream, go barefoot oftener, swim more rivers, watch more sunsets, laugh more, cry less. Life must be lived as we go along. The station will come soon enough.

May our journey through life help us to become witnesses of the unshakeable hope that Christ offers us!

September 5, 2021 - 23rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

From the time we are born into this world until we die, our human radar picks up signals about how to respond to life. What we picked up on when we were very young carries an even greater power. The messages we receive and process tell us what we are “supposed” to do with our feelings, how to understand and cope with disappointment, anxiety, failure, death, illness, and what to expect out of life. As life unfolds for us, these radar messages kick in and resonate in us at very deep levels. Sometimes what we have learned is helpful and sometimes it is not. The stories we have been told, especially when we are young, about how life is best lived and how to negotiate its pain carry a heavy weight.

Life can be challenging and frightening. Sometimes, it really hurts to be a human being. It also can be quite unpredictable and, at times, unfair. We face our vulnerability and brokenness of all kinds: physical, emotional, and spiritual. It doesn’t take much for life to quickly fall apart. What we knew to be familiar and true is gone and something we relied upon, physically, emotionally, or spiritually, can be taken away. It is hard to confront our limitations and sit with our incompleteness. Often, life hurts us so much that we find ourselves sitting in a pool of sadness, not sure what we are supposed to do. It is particularly hard when the signals we have inherited tell us that we need to be successful in what we do, and we have to avoid life’s unfairness. We can feel like a failure, wondering what precisely we did to deserve this fate, or ruminate about what we did not do correctly. But it’s really not about us. We are part of a bigger picture and a much more fascinating story!

If we cease doing battle with life’s incompleteness and see ourselves, as God does, on a journey toward wholeness and completeness we can better accept our disappointments and stand firm. The prophets told us, and Jesus reassured us: Be strong! Fear not! Sometimes we have to update our stories and replace them with newer, more accurate ones. When we make God’s story our own and tune our radar into His voice, what we hear is all about restoration, healing, and rejuvenation! This is true even when we think we have hit rock bottom and can go no further. There is always hope. Remember the words of Julian of Norwich: God made us, God loves us, and God keeps us. Now, listen to God when He says, “be opened!” Be healed and allow your stories to change.



