

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! For people who like big words, sesquicentennial (which means "150th") is like eating a massive piece of chocolate cake. Of course, pronouncing big words takes some practice, at least for most of us. When our Diocese celebrated its 150th anniversary a few years ago, I practiced saying that word so that I'd be ready for interviews from "Good Morning America" or other major media opportunities. For the record, nobody called me and so I've been waiting to impress people with my perfect pronunciation, always being careful to avoid purportedly picayune peccadillos. The point is, I like saying "sesquicentennial." In another 75 years, someone will be saying it about Holy Name.

If that's not the most convoluted introduction you've ever read, then I've failed you. But maybe it got your attention and now you're waiting with baited breath for some news about our upcoming celebration of 75 years as the first parish on the west side of Wausau. This week it will be important to pray for pleasant weather, a nice turnout, and fond memories accompanied by a clean bill of health for all who are able to join us in person. There are many people to thank and I invite you to do so when you see our parishioners selflessly and generously serving with smiles. As you may already know, we invited all of the former pastors and associates and we've been blessed to hear from many of them. We're expecting at least two of them to join us for Mass and lunch on Sunday. Many of them are currently serving other parishes and were gracious enough to write notes to us. Here are some inspiring excerpts from a letter written by Father John Parr, who was pastor from 1999 until 2002:

"My heartfelt congratulations and prayerful best wishes to you and God's people at Holy Name of Jesus Parish on the occasion of the 75th anniversary of the parish. I thank God for those whose Gospel faith and life inspired and humbled me years ago, and continues to do so today. I thank God for those who in their hunger gather at the altar to be fed by the Lord, and each day seek to feed others with God's goodness and mercy. I thank God for the people of Holy Name Parish who for love of Christ share each other's burdens, pray for each other, weep with each other, rejoice with each other. I thank God for this faith community that seeks to make God's love believable to our needy world.

I regret not be able to be with you personally on October 3. I promise to remember you at Mass and making my prayer that of St. John Henry Newman:

"May it be our blessedness, as years go on, to add one grace to another, and advance upward, step by step, neither neglecting the lower after attaining the higher, nor aiming at the higher before attaining the lower. The first grace is faith, the last is love; first comes zeal, afterwards comes loving-kindness; first comes humiliation, then comes peace; first comes diligence, then comes resignation. May we learn to mature all graces in us; fearing and trembling, watching and repenting, because Christ is coming; joyful, thankful, and careless of the future because He has come."

We also received a short letter from Father Peter Kieffer, but it was hard to make out what exactly he was saying . . . mostly it described how he felt most at home at Holy Name when he was wearing purple and yelling "Skol, Vikings!" We also heard from Father Dan Thelen and his was a much nicer letter. He said he really enjoyed serving Holy Name as a young priest and would like to come back here as the pastor someday. Don't worry, I wrote back and told him, "Over my dead body!" Wow, the nerve of some of our young priests . . . Please keep in mind that nothing in this paragraph is true, but it does segue into a nice quote I came across years ago:

"'He (Jesus) stirs up the people.' Expect that, each of you who would be called Christian. Expect it when columnists and editors who are censored for ethnic slurs or attacks on virtually any other people can romp all over the place at the expense of Catholics who dare to publicly uphold their faith, without a murmur from publishers or owners. Expect it when you object to school boards about the imposition of the world's values on children. Expect it when you object to your television stations about imposing the world's values about marriage and family life, and when you object to theater owners who show the movies they show and to producers who produce them. If you're going to be a real Catholic, expect to be treated like one and be glad, even if it doesn't make you feel good. Neither Christ nor the Church has ever said that 'feeling good' is the purpose of life. 'If you would follow me, take up your cross.' Not in all of history has Easter come before Good Friday," (Cardinal John O'Connor, former Archbishop of New York City).

We are living in difficult times, and people are easily provoked into saying regrettable things. We began this column with the big word, "sesquicentennial." When thinking about the tenor of public rhetoric, such words as "blowhard" and "rabble rouser," come to mind. One has to be more and more careful about what we see and hear if we're to maintain any semblance of inner peace. As we pause next week to thank God for the first 75 years, we do well to remember that Our Lord came into a world that he both created and loved. And He still loves this world. If we're to imitate Jesus in this – and that's what true Christians seek to do – then we must strive to love this world, not condemn or dismiss it. And that's not easy when we're so often criticized and misjudged. But this is an opportunity, not an obstacle. Jesus is different from any other person who ever lived in this world because He loved His enemies. With His help, we can learn to pray for those who want to push us around. If we do, there's a good chance Holy Name will still be here when . . . wait for it . . . it's time to celebrate our sesquicentennial!

May God be praised for all the good He inspired in the people of Holy Name these past 75 years!

St. Oscar Romero said, "When the church hears the cry of the oppressed it cannot but denounce the social structures that give rise to and perpetuate the misery from which the cry arises." Why are so many people still so gravely hurting? We have the resources and the means to make things better. We choose not to. There are still those things called greed, pride, lust, apathy, jealousy, gluttony, and anger that prevent us from seeing each other and people to be loved and not objects to be used. Is this how God intended things to be?


God loves what is good and upright. It doesn't matter who did it or where it came from. In God's eyes, the end result is always faith, hope, and love. Those will always unite a person with God. We fill our lives with many things that are not good either for ourselves or for others. All of us have to work to discover what it is, exactly, that leads to the world's brokenness. There are people, systems, and ideologies in place that foster oppression and injustice rather than equity and fairness. Sadly, our complacency can be the greatest evil. Turning a blind eye, ignoring the truth, and believing that we are helpless to fix so great a problem, does little to move us closer to the kingdom of God. As members of the Body of Christ, we cannot condone anything that keeps people in misery.

As it is said, charity begins at home. Perhaps a good place to start is with our own households and making sure their foundations are properly laid.

Catholic Charities Bulletin: Wisconsin Safe Haven Laws allow parents to relinquish an infant under 72 hours old to any first responder, no questions asked. Those first responders could be police officers, 911 emergency medical staff, or hospital staff members. You do not have to give your name or address to the professional accepting the baby unless the baby has been harmed, someone is forcing the parent to give up the baby, or the baby is more than days old. The parent may be asked if they are willing to fill out a form, but is NOT required; it will help providers give the infant the best care, if you wish to learn more about this law, visit <http://dcf.wisconsin.gov/cps/safehaven>.




1st Reconciliation Parent Meeting
