From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Back in the day, speech class was required for all sophomores (and for those who aspired to greatness, forensics was offered as a competitive way to hone one's skills). From speeches to inform, to instruct, and to entertain, we were expected to learn the art of speaking, notwithstanding the usual dose of nerves. My own experience was not so traumatic, as we were allowed to have a text from which to read. One might compare this to riding a bike with training wheels. With all due respect to training wheels, at some point we're invited by the Holy Spirit to speak from the heart and it's then that we begin to see who we really are deep down inside. Of course, being vulnerable with others is not something we relish, for a litany of reasons. Some reading this may already be growing nervous that the author is about to indulge in a wild exposé that would make even the authors of *The National Enquirer* blush. Sorry, not today my friends!

The goal of a good speech is communicating not only some truth, but doing so in a way that brings about conviction in the hearts of others. And the spoken word has a power that the written word simply cannot equal. We've all read powerful speeches from the past. But our experience cannot be compared to those who heard the speeches as they were given. For example, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s "*I have a dream*" speech is still rated by many as the greatest speech ever given. Probably all of us are familiar with it on some level. And as moving as it still is all these years later, its greatest power was experienced by those who heard it in person on August 28th of 1963. The power of the spoken word, especially when heard from the mouth of the speaker, even in our modern era so steeped in various and sophisticated forms of communication, is still unparalleled.

At this point, we might wonder if we've just put Jesus in the unenviable company of those who were once more influential, but due to time and circumstances, have gradually faded away. If the previous claims are true, namely that the spoken word is more effective than any other way of communicating, then the fact that Jesus' words are 20 centuries old must remove Him from any consideration of being the most influential person in the world today. After all, we don't even have any YouTube videos of Him giving His famous Sermon on the Mount. How can Jesus compete with the likes of videos that have been watched billions of times when His words are so old and seemingly outdated? For anyone who wants to pass along the faith, this is one of the great challenges that cannot be avoided, as young people rightfully wonder what a 1st century figure has to do with the 21st century.

One way to respond to this dilemma is, while being aware of it, not to get too concerned about it. Once we feel that we have to somehow bring Jesus into the 21st century by making Him likeable and relatable, we're setting ourselves up for various disappointments. First of all, kids do not like pandering and they are quick to recognize when we're dressing things up in a way that we think will win them over. Kids are inherently skeptical, especially by the time they become teenagers. What made people like Pope John Paul II and Mother Teresa so effective with youth is that they refrained from trying to make Jesus or themselves more marketable by embracing the values touted by modern culture. Legion are the church movements that seek the latest and greatest means of winning more followers, only to later realize that many of these seeds of faith fall on shallow soil that cannot withstand the heat of the spiritual life. If you're inclined, look up the video series "Church Hunters" with John Crist on YouTube – it's a satirical depiction of how people decide on what spiritual fare will satisfy them.

The reality of the spiritual life is that it transcends what we might expect – any logical positivists reading this are now disgusted because science explains everything and I've just suggested there's more to the world than science. Some are already penning responses encouraging me to "*follow the science.*" And that is all well and good, given that science has helped us in remarkable ways to understand the world in which we are living. But one of the core theses of our faith is that God created a universe that seems, at certain points, to transcend scientific explanation. Albert Einstein himself recognized this when he wrote, "*Strange is our situation here upon earth. Each of us comes for a short visit, not knowing why, yet sometimes seeming to a divine purpose.*" We do well to follow the science, but it can only take us so far. For those who want to ascend the Mount of Beatitudes and listen to Our Lord's words, this is as accessible today as it was to those who were alive and present for the real thing in the Year of Our Lord 28 A.D. Yes, this is a shocking claim, one that would work well at the beginning of any speech that hoped to grab the attention of the audience.

How to buttress this claim is rather simple: spiritual truths do not contradict scientific truths, but sometimes they do seem to transcend them. Many people claim that science and religion must always be at odds, enemies who are forever doomed to be suspicious of one another. But there is another way, one pointed out by a true story about an old man on a French train just outside of Paris in the late 19th century. He was praying his Rosary when a college student got on board and saw his beads. He berated the old man for his medieval superstition and claimed that he should try science, which had relegated religion to the dustbin of history. The old man, now somewhat upset and seemingly about to cry, responded that he had tried science and found it rather difficult because it so often came up short of explaining everything. The college student, sorry that he had upset the old man, gently asked him for his business card, explaining that he would send him some good science books that would bring him inner peace and certitude. After fumbling around in his coat pocket, the old man finally managed to find a business card and handed it to the college student. Upon reading it, the young man's face fell, for on the card was written, "*Louis Pasteur, Director of Applied Science, Paris, France.*" Arguably the greatest scientist of the modern era, Pasteur found no disconnect between faith and reason, nor between science and religion.

As we close, you might wonder if you've heard that story about Pasteur before – I've told it at least once at Holy Name and many times in my lifetime. For my money, it's always more effective in speech than in writing because of the power of the spoken word. Jesus not only spoke words of truth – even His detractors claimed that He spoke with power, with authority. That's because He wasn't merely speaking words; He was, is, and forever will be the Word who became flesh, the One who has no beginning or end, who came to save His people. And that's as powerful today as it was when He first revealed it – at least for those who have ears to hear.

May the Word of God be our daily bread so that our hearts, minds and souls can become pure!

Archbishop Fulton Sheen said, "It takes three to make love, not two: you, your spouse, and God." Apart from the incarnation of God in Jesus Christ, nothing speaks better of God's incarnate love than marriage. God designed it this way. We place great value on love and rightly so. What we fail to realize, however, is that love, its very presence and place in our lives, is not simply part of the human package deal. Love comes from God. It is one of God's greatest gifts to human beings. When we begin to realize that our very ability to love is sacred, it changes up how we see the essence of life, and purpose and sanctity of marriage.

God is love. It stands to reason then that if we follow the path of unconditional, self-emptying love we will then stumble upon God. It is precisely this intimate wedding of God with love that gives such eloquence and honor to the love between husband and wife. As a living sign of Christ's love for the Church and for humanity, husbands and wives speak volumes of God's unconditional incarnate love for all of his children! The Divine power that brings unity and life to marriage is so strong that once joined, it really cannot be separated.

Admittedly, marriage covenants can be extremely difficult to negotiate and, at times, very painful to experience. God's perfect divinity always meets our broken and imperfect humanity. God is okay with this setup as he created it this way. Our loving is never as unconditional as God's and often tainted by our own imperfections, needs, memories, hurts, sinfulness, and weakness. All of this baggage negatively impacts even the most well-intentioned marriages, causing them to be hurtful and empty. We are love works in progress. God can succeed in perfecting our love only if we keep our eyes fixed on him as the source of that love. That's why marriage is always about three and not just two.

The Divine intimacy at the heart of marriage is what can make them celebrations of great union and happiness. Couples who are still madly in love with each other after many years, still looking at each other with that timeless twinkle in their eyes, best tell the story of God's oneness with humanity. Honor, celebrate, and support those who have accepted a vocation to marriage. Living in a world that easily pulls relationships apart, may they find hope and inspiration from their faith companions who are on the same journey!

Catholic Charities Bulletin: Wisconsin Safe Haven

Laws allow parents to relinquish an infant under 72 hours old to any first responder, no questions asked. Those first responders could be police officers, 911 emergency medical staff, or hospital staff members. You do not have to give your name or address to the professional accepting the baby unless the baby has been harmed, someone is forcing the parent to give up the baby, or the baby is more than days old. The parent may be asked if they are willing to fill out a form, but is NOT required; it will help providers give the infant the best care. 
