## From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! *"The saints, said Pope Pius XI, were to be compared to the telescopes of astronomers. Instruments permit us to see stars which the naked eye could never discover. Through saints we learn to see those eternal truths which the world's common day veils from our feeble eyes,"* (The Song of Bernadette, page 573). We're fast coming up on the Feast of All Saints and this quote properly lifts our gaze to the heavens. Because we live in a fallen world, many things pull us down. Someone told me once about what happens when you put a live crab in a five-gallon bucket: you have to put a lid on top or the crab will escape. However, if you throw in a second crab (or a third or fourth), you can discard the lid . . . one crab will shimmy up the side and the other(s) will pull it back down. Sounds like fallen human nature and the world in which we live. Maybe it's time for us to sing a rousing rendition of the Electric Light Orchestra's, *"Don't Bring Me Down!"*

Yes, the saints remind us of the incredible potential inside each and every one of us. Even our secular world recognizes a role for heroes: from Spiderman to Captain America to Wonder Woman, we project onto these figures our own innate desire to do something heroic. The Church has long sought ways of cultivating these desires so that the end result would be a man or woman whose goodness set their world on fire. It was Saint Catherine of Siena who once said, *"If you become what God wants you to be, you will bring fire to the earth."* That, in a nutshell, is the goal for each and every one of us.

Sometimes I'm asked if I have a favorite saint and it's one of the most difficult questions to answer. It's a bit like asking who my favorite parishioners are . . . I'll save that article for just before moving to my next assignment (many moons from now)! In the spirit of a late-night show that has since run its course, here is my top ten list of favorite saints.

Both of my Grandma's had sincere devotions to the Blessed Virgin Mary, so she's been a part of my life for as long as I can remember. Praying the Rosary was very common for my family and I have a lasting memory of my Dad leading the Rosary in the car while driving with Grandma to visit relatives in Madison. Dad had a brisk cadence and Grandma was never quite finished with her part of the prayer before Dad would start the next one. I felt bad for Grandma and was tempted many times to tell Dad to slow down but it seemed not to be my place. These days the Rosary is still a very important part of my life. Meditating on the mysteries is not easy because we're so frequently distracted. Just the same, so many experiences in life have convinced me that it is one of the most powerful intercessory prayers, meaning that it does tremendous good for others. And that's just like the Blessed Virgin Mary, whose life was one of constant care for others. If you want to get to know the Blessed Virgin Mary better, one powerful way is to visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help, which is just two hours from here. You'll hear the story of Mary's appearance to Adele Brise in 1859 as well as the miraculous intervention during the Peshtigo fire.

Saint Joseph made my top ten some years ago. He's not as easy to get to know because he's quiet and reserved. When my Uncle Arnie died in 2004 his family discovered an old prayer to Saint Joseph in his wallet. It had obviously been prayed thousands of times and it conveyed to his family how much he had prayed for them. I began a 30-day novena to Saint Joseph in 2009 and liked it so much that I'm still praying it. At Father Charlie Hiebl's funeral he had on his Mass program the prayer to Saint Joseph that begins, *"Oh Saint Joseph, whose protection is so great, so strong, so prompt before the throne of God . . ."* When I became a pastor for the first time in 2011, I realized that I was in way over my head. Since then I've found hope, courage, and stability in my devotion to Saint Joseph.

My first favorite Saint was undoubtedly Saint Anthony. Because Anthony is my middle name, I heard about him early and often. And because my brother and I lost our baseball countless times, Saint Anthony was the one who unfailingly helped us to find it. Anytime you see a statue of a saint wearing a brown habit and holding the Baby Jesus, that is always Saint Anthony (and not Saint Francis). He's a gentle saint with a kind heart and limitless patience (imagine how many people ask him every day to help them find something).

In high school a teacher asked us to close our eyes and imagine where we would be in five years. Because we were seniors, most of us would be out of college and out in the real world. I imagined being in Rome, which is interesting because I was doing my best to tell God that I really wanted to get married and raise a family. Somehow the thoughts of priesthood never really went away, and there I was imagining myself basking in the glory of the Eternal City. By Divine Providence, it all came true. I lived in Rome from 1995-2000 and loved basically every minute of it. One of the things I miss most are the bells of Saint Peter's Basilica. We lived within earshot of Saint Peter's, so I heard those bells countless times and I they still seemingly ring from time to time somewhere in the depth of my soul. Before leaving Rome for good, I wrote the only poem of my life, which I will share with you here:

*For whom the bells toll, I thought I always knew;  
Saint Peter the fisherman, tested, tried and true.  
Whereas once the cock did crow reckoning all as loss,  
Today hope chimes on, recalling Peter's cross.  
Massive dome, pristine façade, marking where his feet last trod.  
And yet, all grandeur aside, is this not where Saint Peter died?  
Faith, doubt, hope and fear, all of these did battle here.  
And though his soul has now gone home, Peter's beloved keys remained in Rome.  
For whom the bells toll, I thought I always knew;  
The truth is, good Christian, they ring for me and for you!*

Yes, the saints lift our hearts and our souls to God: *"here we have no lasting city,"* (Hebrews 13:14). Who are the saints that have helped you the most in your life? And who would you most like to meet? The good news is that you don't have to die to meet them. But more on that next week (after all, I only gave you four saints and I promised you ten).

May God grant us the grace to become Saints so that we may adequately thank Him for our life!

**October 31, 2021 - 31st Sunday in Ordinary Time**

Centuries of God’s devoted people have found this prayer on their lips: “Hear, O Israel! The Lord is our God, the Lord alone!” The fundamental prayer has been laid as the cornerstone of many spiritual lives. Where did you learn how to pray or did you? Maybe there is a wisdom figure in your life who inspired and guided you by the genuine, holy simplicity of their lives. His or her example may have led you to God and taught you how to pray. Or perhaps you discovered this art on your own after stumbling over yourself enough times and finally realizing it was time to reach out to Someone greater than yourself. There is a timeless truth that we not only tend to forget, but may have never learned. There is only one God, the Lord alone! As a result, we often worship other gods rather than the One true God. Everything in our life gets distorted and we find ourselves lost and off center.

If we haven’t learned it yet, there is a life lesson at the top of all of the possible lessons to be learned. There is One True and Eternal God who alone has a solitary claim on us and must be loved with all our heart, soul, mind, and strength. Until we learn this primary lesson, we run the risk of getting distracted and sidetracked. We will also never really figure out what is at the heart of the relationships we share with the other human beings on this planet with whom we share life. That one primary lesson will teach us the second most valuable lesson: that we must love our neighbor as ourselves. You cannot have one without the other. The presence of God in the core soul of each one of us requires that all of our relationships work together. This truth is at the heart of the Gospel.

If every human being, each in their own way, could stumble upon and genuinely embrace this truth, look how different life would be! Our priorities will immediately shift from “I and me” to “us and we” and we will develop a more inclusive vision for our brothers and sisters. Concerned not only about my own wellbeing and happiness but also that of our brothers and sisters, humanity stands a chance at succeeding in the struggle with injustice, abuse, inequity, violence, war, entitlement, and privilege. It seems that getting to this point has been at the heart of the Gospel and the kingdom of God from the moment Jesus first started to preach. It’s a wonder why, then, why so many centuries later, we have still failed to achieve his vision. Maybe we just haven’t learned our primary lessons yet.


