From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! *"All that is necessary to be a saint is to want to be one. Don't you believe that God will make you what He created you to be, if you will consent to let him do it? All you have to do is desire it."* Some of you remember the Trappist monk, Thomas Merton. His autobiography, [The Seven Story Mountain](#), helped many people grow closer to God. Last week we celebrated all the Saints and Merton's quote at the beginning of this article is a timely one: do you want to be a saint? If not, maybe Holy Name is not the right parish for you. I say that in jest, but we are in competition with all of the other parishes around here to produce the first saint in Wausau. Right now, the odds in Vegas favor the east side parishes, but I have a feeling that times are changing. As Saint John Paul II once quipped, *"Become a saint and do so quickly."*

That being said, one practical way to become a saint is to volunteer to help with our wonderful Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS). This is a method of teaching the faith to our children that incorporates the Montessori approach of lots of hands-on learning. It is based on the reality that children are very open to God and His working in their souls when they are young. The CGS method creates an atrium wherein the children are able to encounter God and begin to experience His personal love. Our CGS program is growing and flourishing and we have the delightful dilemma of needing more help. If you feel any interest in becoming a catechist or even just helping out as an assistant, would you please contact me? We have people who would happily offer the requisite training so that you'd feel at peace and confident in the work you'd be asked to do. The times for CGS classes are on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday afternoons. Let's pray as a parish for this intention, as it's a very powerful way to pass on the faith to our children. Holy Name has always embraced the role of teaching the faith, and seeing all of the children coming to our school to grow closer to Jesus honors the people who left us such a solid edifice. Please pray and ask the Lord if He's calling you to help our CGS program continue to grow.

Before sharing a couple of more saint stories, the following was passed along by a faithful reader of this column. It's a passage from [Sundial of the Seasons](#) by Hal Borland and it's aptly titled, "The Migrant Geese:"

"Two sounds of Autumn are unmistakable, the hurrying rustle of crisp leaves blown along the street or road by a gusty wind, and the gabble of a flock of migrating geese. Both are warnings of chill days and crisp nights ahead, fireside and topcoat weather. The leaves have been slow to fall this year, but the geese are on the wing, close to their usual schedule. Cold weather, seasonal weather, has begun to settle in up where the geese spend their Summers. Most birds migrate in silence, but not the geese. Whether you are walking down a city street, standing in a suburban back yard or working in a rural woodlot, you know when the geese fly over. First you hear the distant gabble, a faint clamor that seems to echo from the whole sky. You search the sky, and the gabble comes closer. Then you see them, flying high, marking a "V" almost like a dotted pencil line. You listen and watch, and the flight is so high it seems almost leisurely. If it is a close "V" in firm formation it probably is Canada geese. If it is a looser "V", rippling and waving, it is more likely the less common snow geese. Whichever, the flock's gabbling voice is like the voice of restless Autumn, and the flight never wavers. On and on, over the hills and the towns and the city itself, to the far horizon, and still beyond, southward. And only that restless echo, faint and haunting, remains. They are footloose as the Autumn wind, and they follow the sun. There is something both exhilarating and faintly sad in the echo of their going. Maybe it's the echo of another Summer gone. Maybe it's the freedom song of the skies. Whatever, it haunts the earth-bound heart." (October 1959)

That's a beautiful passage, don't you think? The passage of time and the changing of the seasons affects us deeply, and that seems to increase as the years go by. Lest some of the men reading this begin to lose interest, I emptied a 12-gauge on a Canadian goose one time and it merely shrugged its wings and kept flying. Oh well, it just meant no foie gras that year.

Back to saints and a couple of stories. Saint Thomas Aquinas was one of the brightest people who ever lived, and his ability to synthesize different approaches to the truth stands out as one of the greatest achievements of the human race. His greatest theological work, the [Summa Theologiae](#), has been widely admired for nearly eight centuries and continues to be studied and read by people all around the world. The best-selling Catholic author Flannery O'Connor once shared her own love for Aquinas: *"I couldn't make any judgment on the Summa, except to say this: I read it every night before I go to bed. If my mother were to come in during the process and say, "Turn off that light. It's late," I with lifted finger and broad, bland, beatific expression, would reply, "On the contrary, I answer that the light, being eternal and limitless, cannot be turned off. Shut your eyes," or some such thing. In any case I feel I can personally guarantee that St. Thomas loved God because for the life of me I cannot help loving St. Thomas."* ([The Habit of Being](#))

Because I'm running out of space again, suffice it to say that I love Saint Therese of Lisieux (a.k.a. the "Little Flower") and Saint John Vianney (the patron of priests). Saint Francis Xavier is probably my favorite Jesuit saint, and Louis de Wohl's book about him, [Set All Afire](#), is one of the best books I've ever read about a saint. By the way, Louis de Wohl wrote over 20 books about the saints and they're incredible stories that will leave you feeling like you have a new friend in Heaven. Ignatius press publishes them and they are wonderful gifts (this is not a subtly shameless suggestion that I want these books for Christmas – I've read them all and only want others to read them too). Saint Josemaría is one of the most impressive modern saints for his candor and wisdom. I discovered him in one of the strangest ways, but that's a story for another day. Finally, Saint Maria Goretti has long been a favorite of mine for her purity and willingness to forgive. When Father Carlos Martins came to Holy Name back in April with his "Treasures of the Church" relic display, his recounting of Saint Maria Goretti's life was incredibly powerful. What a blessing it was to have all of those saints present in our church.

"The only real sadness, the only real failure, the only great tragedy in life, is not to become a saint," (Leon Bloy). May God help us to be truly happy – may we become His future saints!

November 7, 2021 - 32nd Sunday in Ordinary Time

On December 10, 1979, a very petite holy woman known as Mother Teresa of Calcutta spoke these words in her Nobel Peace Prize Acceptance Speech, “But I am sure in the families and many of our homes, maybe we are not hungry for a piece of bread, but maybe there is somebody there in the family who is unwanted, unloved, uncared, forgotten, there isn’t love. Love begins at home. And love to be true has to hurt. I never forget a little child who taught me a very beautiful lesson. They heard in Calcutta, the children, that Mother Teresa had no sugar for her children, and this little one, Hindu boy four years old, he went home and he told his parents: I will not eat sugar for three days, I will give my sugar to Mother Teresa. How much a little child can give. After three days they brought into our house, and there was this little one who could scarcely pronounce my name, he loved with great love, he loved until it hurt. And this is what I bring before you, to love one another until it hurts, but don’t forget that there are many children, many children, many men and women who haven’t got what you have. And remember to love them until it hurts.”

Living authentically and walking with holiness always involves sacrifice. It has to hurt. Only actions springing from true and deep sacrifice demonstrate true integrity. Without sacrifice, even what is apparently a generous gesture can be nothing. It is no wonder that the widow who contributed from her poverty received great admiration from Jesus and the young child in our story above the interest of Mother Teresa. It is easy to make the houses of our lives look like they are in perfect order when in fact they are in shambles within. Religion can sometimes make this hypocritical masquerade easy to accomplish. We can find ourselves in all the right holy places, reciting all of the correct prayers, participating in community collections, and reciting the proper doctrines only to find ourselves empty, shallow, self-focused, and overly anxious about personal concerns.

The one who learns to discover their inner poverty, their spiritual poverty, is the only one who can truly place him or herself at the mercy of God. It is only when we allow ourselves to be empty that we realize Who we actually need to fill us. This is the real meaning of trust. Many of us are afraid to take the plunge. We allow ourselves to detach from only so much, always keeping a watchful eye on the protection of our securities. We understand the value of poverty, but we do not want to become too poor. As long as we are able to recognize this tension, our reluctance to let go and our struggle, we can continue our journey of humbly learning how to love so deeply that it hurts. God understands and waits.


