From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! The title of this week's column is "No-shave November." You're looking at a picture that was taken of me in the summer of 2008. I was making my 30-day retreat and I decided to not shave for as long as I could stand it. I think I went for three weeks and decided that was enough. I had this picture taken because my students were always encouraging me to grow a beard. After they saw this picture, they never brought it up again!

While I'm not entirely certain of the origins of "No-shave November," my guess is that it's connected to deer hunting. While hunting clothing has improved tremendously, it still gets cold sitting on a deer stand waiting for a trophy buck to appear. Abundant facial hair is therefore advantageous. Farm kids almost all hunted and our family was no different. I remember the excitement of Mom bringing out the blaze orange hunting clothes and getting things ready for opening morning. When we were young, my brother Tom and I mostly participated by driving the deer toward Dad. We'd get so excited when we heard him shoot, and we'd hustle to the end of the drive to see what Dad got. Mostly, we ate "tag soup" – no matter how you dress it up, it's simply not as delicious as venison. One year Dad built me my own deer stand and it was time to prove my virility by bagging a big buck. And wouldn't you know it, an impressive 8-pointer came trotting down the valley, less than 100 yards from my stand. Only later when Dad described "buck fever" to me did I begin to understand what had happened. I was shaking so badly that after I shot and missed, I dropped the gun and had to climb down and retrieve it. I'm pretty sure that buck was laughing at me. Later on, I managed to wipe out his whole family and all of his friends (sometimes hunters exaggerate).



This weekend we remember the hunters in our prayers, that they be kept safe while they do their part to make driving on our roads a safer enterprise. I always head down to the farm on Thanksgiving afternoon or the following morning to hunt for a few hours. While it's been years since I actually shot anything, I thoroughly enjoy being out in the woods because it holds dozens of wonderful memories for me. My brother Tom runs the farm now, and he and his boys have had some impressive success, especially recently. Last year Tom and his son Zach shot two of the biggest bucks we've ever seen on the farm, and when they showed them to Dad, in his own way he expressed admiration and gratitude. Not to get too far off the beaten path, but most hunters have an innate respect for the animals they kill. When speaking of cattle, Temple Grandin said some profound things that apply equally to deer and indeed to all wild game: *Of course they're gonna get slaughtered. You think we'd have cattle if people didn't eat 'em everyday? They'd just be funny-lookin' animals in zoos. But we raise them for us. That means we owe them some respect. Nature is cruel, but we don't have to be.*

Before moving on to something more spiritual, I'm sometimes asked what I like to eat. Frankly, there's not much that I wouldn't eat – one exception is that I'm not a huge fan of fennel. Other than that, my parents raised me to eat whatever was put in front of me. And because I'm not a good cook, I've learned to smile and say "thank you" for all of the good food people have dropped off for me over the years. When I was younger, one of my friends said I was kept alive by the Eucharist and Kwik Trip. I eat a lot healthier now, and wild game such as venison is almost always in my freezer. My brother Tom raises beef in the old-fashioned, natural way, and I have some of his hamburger in my freezer too. If you're ever interested in trying it, you can find him on the Internet at mountainlanebeef.com. Now you can accurately accuse me of soliciting for my brother and pandering for myself! In all seriousness, I'm grateful to all of the people who have kept me healthy by the wonderful food they've dropped off at the parish center. But before each of you reading this decides to cook something for me, please call and see if there's any room in the refrigerator. I never want food to go to waste, and calling Judy before you cook something has been very effective thus far.

Okay, let's transition from physical food to spiritual food. Praying for the souls in Purgatory is an ancient Catholic practice, and one of the best prayers for such an occasion comes to us from Saint Gertrude the Great (d. 1302): *Eternal Father, I offer Thee the Most Precious Blood of Thy Divine Son, Jesus, in union with the Masses said throughout the world today, for all the holy souls in purgatory, for sinners everywhere, for sinners in the universal church, those in my own home and within my family. Amen.*

The pious tradition about Saint Gertrude's prayer is that it frees upwards of 1000 souls each time it's prayed. No matter how many are affected by it, the person who prays it regularly will certainly grow in awareness of how linked we are by prayer to those who have gone before us. Another prayer that you've probably heard at the end of the Rosary is the following:

Let us pray: O God, whose Only Begotten Son, by His Life, Death, and Resurrection, has purchased for us the rewards of eternal life, grant, we beseech Thee, that while meditating on these mysteries of the most holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, we may imitate what they contain and obtain what they promise, through the same Christ our Lord. Amen.

It's often called "The Rosary Prayer" and I first heard it while in college. It's beautiful and one that doesn't take too long to memorize. You can add it to your spiritual toolbox! Finally, as we come to the end of the year of Saint Joseph, the following prayer is over 1,900 years old and I most recently saw it printed on the front of Father Charlie Hiebl's funeral program:

Oh St. Joseph whose protection is so great, so strong, so prompt before the throne of God, I place in you all my interests and desires. Oh St. Joseph do assist me by your powerful intercession and obtain for me from your divine Son all spiritual blessings through Jesus Christ, our Lord; so that having engaged here below your heavenly power I may offer my thanksgiving and homage to the most loving of fathers. Oh St. Joseph, I never weary contemplating you and Jesus asleep in your arms. I dare not approach while he reposes near your heart. Press him in my name and kiss his fine head for me, and ask him to return the kiss when I draw my dying breath. St. Joseph, patron of departing souls, pray for us. Amen.

May God feed us with the Bread of Life, so that we may serve Him and His people with zeal!

November 21, 2021 - Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe

We often come to life expecting all of the pieces of the puzzle to nicely fit together. We want and expect harmony, order, and fairness, the achievement of rewards for good behavior, good health, and happiness. We can more easily accept death when it comes naturally after a good long life, but have a real difficulty comprehending the meaning of it all when it is cut short. Willing to put in a good measure of effort, we desire positive results. When things go wrong and life gets hurtful, unjust, and downright ugly, we become unsettled and can quickly fall into despair. This is especially true if we are people of faith who believe in a God who sees things on our terms and works in favor of our life agenda. What happens to our faith when we find ourselves sitting in a mess?

Does it help to know that God understands and that hardship, failure, disappointment, injustice, confusion, and all of life's ugliness do not make faith irrelevant or irrational? God is wonderfully and surprising creative! He turns the tables on not only our understanding of life, but of what it means to be a king. God sends us a king who is not exempt from life's ills but embraces them. The king that God gives to us knows what it means to be poor, suffer insults, be ridiculed, face rejection, endure suffering, be betrayed, and face a most unjust and horrific death. This is our king. Jesus is not a king of prestige or grandeur but a king who brings light to darkness, hope to despair, sinners to mercy, and new life out of death. Christ dances before us pleading with us to hold on, cling to love, avoid being negative, stop feeling cheated, and be strong in faith! There may be hardship and disappointment now but there are more surprises to come.

Once we understand this truth, we will also understand that we are on a most incredible and awesome universal journey to Christ and becoming one in Christ. We all carry within us the image of God, the image of our suffering king. The One who lives in us also lives in all of our brothers and sisters. Failing to see this universal Divine Presence in all is one of the greatest mistakes we can make, for we also fail to see God, our king, as well. There are many things that can bring hardship to life. If we keep our head about us and do not lose hope, we can persevere and strive for the greatest degree of justice possible. Even though there are ample things that can challenge our faith, we also know that our deepest joy comes from union with God and our brothers and sisters. One day, the fullness of that joy will be ours to have when we are all eternally one with Christ our King forever.
