

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Last week I shared some insightful material regarding family life and the wounds that we experience simply because we live in a fallen world. For those who are interested, the following is a list of fantastic books that offer hope and healing. Remember the basic thesis that encourages us to learn more and go deeper is that we cannot go to places with others that we've been unwilling or unable to visit ourselves. And this means places in the heart and soul that we avoid because they cause us to feel shame and guilt. Healing is a blessing for the whole world and the devil doesn't want you to think there's any hope. He's a liar. Pick up one of these books and let the Holy Spirit guide you on a path to deeper peace and greater love for God, His people, and even for yourself! (all book descriptions come from a friend of mine)

- 1) Bessel van der Kolk, <u>The Body Keeps the Score: Brain, Mind, and Body in the Healing of Trauma</u>

 Trauma is not just something in the past it shows up present day in our bodies, in everyday reactions and in our relationships. If you are wanting to understand more about trauma, this is the book. He is a highly accomplished clinical researcher but puts things in readable enough terms. He gives due attention to "developmental trauma" (abuse and neglect in childhood that has a chronic affect every bit as impactful as one P.T.S.D. incident).
- 2) Jay Stringer, <u>Unwanted: How Sexual Brokenness Reveals Our Way to Healing</u>
 In my opinion, hands down the best book right now addressing the issue of unwanted sexual behaviors, how they are connected to stories of harm, and how to be transformed in healthy and holy living today.
- 3) Mark Laaser, <u>Healing the Wounds of Šexual Addiction</u>
 Prior to Jay Stringer's book coming out, this was probably the best book on the topic, in my opinion. Still well worth reading.
- 4) Mark Laaser, <u>Taking Every Thought Captive</u>
 Rather than fleeing our lust, learning to pay attention to sexual fantasies, discovering their good needs and desires that need to be ordered by Christ.
- 5) Mark & Debbie Laaser, <u>Seven Desires</u>
 Designed especially for married couples but was totally transformative for me in 2017. They name seven core human needs that are often running on empty in our relationships. They reflect on the image of an **iceberg** most of us only look at the surface, but "the problem is not the problem." The book offers practical help for individuals and couples to go down to the depths of the iceberg and talk about what is really happening emotionally and spiritually. Highly recommended!
- 6) John Trent & Gary Smalley, *The Blessing*.

 One of Mark Laaser's favorite books because it specifically addresses the deep desire "to be blessed" something we are meant to receive from our fathers and mothers but so often don't. They discuss how parents can learn to help their children feel blessed in their very identity as children of God. I find it helped me to be a Father who blesses his staff and his people.
- 7) Bob Schuchts, <u>Be Healed: A Guide to Encountering the Powerful Love of Jesus in Your Life</u>
 Rooted in the Catechism and the theological anthropology of John Paul II (while aware of teaching of people like Dan Allender), Bob reflects on how unhealed wounds need to be healed so that we can become who we are as a whole person in Christ. Bob runs the John Paul II Healing Center in Tallahassee. I've been there twice.
- 8) Bob Schuchts, <u>Be Restored: Healing Our Sexual Wounds Through Jesus' Merciful Love</u> Bob's newest book (I haven't read it yet) – deals specifically with the theme of sexuality.
- 9) Curt Thompson, <u>The Soul of Shame: Retelling the Stories We Believe About Ourselves</u>
 Probably the single most comprehensive book about toxic shame and how it has a lifelong impact on our relationships. Toxic shame is always lurking at the roots when there are unwanted behaviors!
- 10) Curt Thompson, *The Soul of Desire: Discovering the Neuroscience of Longing, Beauty, and Community*
- 11) Brené Brown, various books (<u>The Power of Vulnerability; Daring Greatly; Dare to Lead</u>)
 She describes so well what authentic vulnerability looks like, how toxic shame gets in the way, and how these principles can be applied in family and the workplace. She became famous following a Ted Talk and has now authored several books. She is Catholic, though she doesn't parade that around.
- 12) Henry Cloud & John Townsend, <u>Boundaries: When to Say Yes, How to Say No</u>
 One of the most life-changing books I've ever read. Helped me to see more clearly how I feel responsible for other people's feelings and other people's reactions, how I struggle to say "yes" and "no" with freedom, and why (based on my family of origin). I find this book incredibly relevant for parish life.
- 13) Henry Cloud & John Townsend, <u>Our Mothers, Ourselves</u>
 The single best book I know in naming specifically the different kinds of wounding that come from dysfunctional experiences of mothering. They describe six different dysfunctional styles of mothering, how those are likely to continue having impact in adult life, how to heal and transform, and then how to re-engage in an adult relationship with mom (if desired).
- 14) Henry Cloud, <u>Necessary Endings</u>
 This book is more of a leadership / organizational health book and totally relevant for us as pastors! It addresses some of the challenging conflict resolution issues, how and why we avoid them, how to face them, and how not all endings are a bad thing. Often, he develops the image of seasons of the year or the image of pruning some branches so that others (and the overall organism) can grow stronger and more fruitful in the long run. **Especially relevant for pastoral planning!**!
- 15) Dan Allender, <u>The Healing Path</u>
 A great overall summary of the approach of the Allender Center in inviting Christians to move from surviving through coping and denial to a path of healing that is animated by Faith, Hope, and Charity. Names specifically many of the ways that Christians and Christian leaders keep themselves (and others) off the healing path, and how to persevere together on it.
- 16) Dan Allender, <u>Healing the Wounded Heart</u>
 A must read for any sexual abuse survivor or those desires to care well for sexual abuse survivors. Describes in detail the ways in which the evil one lies, steals, and mars through the evil of sexual abuse, how people tend to get bound up with lies and inner vows, how they curse their sexual arousal, and what the path to freedom looks like.

17) Colleen Carroll Campbell, <u>The Heart of Perfection: How the Saints Taught Me to Trade My Dream of Perfect for God's</u>
This is the best work I've ever seen on lives of the saints. She selects about seven or eight saints and offers a well-researched and gripping narrative for each – tracing their story arc from being a high-performing, hard-on-self young perfectionist to learning a tender-hearted trust in God's mercy and true growth in charity. From Paul to Francis of Assisi to Ignatius of Loyola to Francis de Sales. Outstanding spiritual reading.

May God give us the courage to face our sorrows, knowing that it's His desire to heal us and set us free! Your friend in Christ, Father Martin

March 13, 2022 - 2nd Sunday of Lent

There is so much wisdom in the first commandment. The daily demands of life, current political ideologies and dynamics, social expectations, corporate philosophies, and even technology can easily become lesser gods. We can find ourselves beholden to and held captive by these secular constructs and systems. Even for those who profess a faith in the one true God, these lesser, attractive but false gods are a temptation. Being overly preoccupied and even obsessed with the state of our present lives, we lose sight of our real destiny and purpose.

Jesus showed his disciples a glimpse of this destiny when he was transfigured before their eyes. In fact, Peter was so caught up in the brilliance, awe, and sacredness of these fleeting moments that he wanted to extend them as long as possible. Wonderful things happen when we leave our illusions and discover something that is true. This is why creating some sacred space in our lives for reflection, prayer, renewal, refreshment, centering ourselves, and disconnecting from the noise is so important. It shows us how false and shallow our lives can be and what is really of importance. Do you create some kind of sacred space in your life? Lent is a perfect time to do so.

St. Irenaeus, one of the early fathers and martyrs of the Catholic Church, said that, "he who was the Son of God became the Son of Man that man ... might become the son of God." We mistakenly believe that life is all about us. It's not. Ours is a journey of transformation in which we become more and more one with the mind of Christ and Christ himself. St. Augustine saw this same transformation occurring when the Eucharist is received. In receiving the Eucharist, we become what we eat, the Body of Christ. Honestly acknowledging false gods that we cling to can open the door for God to show us the wholeness and holiness to which we are called. Take time to discover the sacred. When we do, we will want to stay there for a while. Then, when we return to our personal affairs, we will see more clearly.
