## From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! While I was serving at Saint John's some years back, someone dropped off a complete box set of the Laura Ingalls Wilder books for the school library. It was very difficult to make that delivery – I really wanted to keep the books for myself. I grew up reading the Little House books and they are fantastic. I suppose some of the attraction to the books was the fact that I grew up on a farm. But what gives Wilder's books such staying power is their reflection of the value of hard work and the inestimable worth of family life. Ma and Pa worked so hard to make a better life for their three girls and their sacrificial love was like a beacon that drew the whole community closer together. Sometimes we wonder if such things are even possible anymore.

The short answer is that no times are so difficult that God cannot produce saints. Yes, we're living in unsettling times. But so have many others. And their stories are being told today, such as the heroism and forgiveness of a guy like Louis Zamperini whose WWII heroism is told in Laura Hillenbrand's book <u>Unbreakable</u>. Or maybe you've read the story of the American boys whose unparalleled rise to the top brought them face to face with Adolph Hitler as they competed for the gold medal in rowing in the 1936 Olympics (cf. <u>Boys in the Boat</u> by Daniel James Brown). Another great story of courage and compassion is <u>The Hiding Place</u> by Corrie Ten Boom. Finally, one would be hard-pressed to find a more remarkable story of fortitude and forgiveness than Immaculée Iligabiza's book, <u>Left to Tell</u>. Someone mentioned that Immaculée came to Wausau some time ago, and I only wish I had been here to meet her. Her devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary and the strength it gave her not only to survive the 1994 Rwandan genocide, but even to forgive the people who killed her family are almost unbelievable.

All of this is a prelude to the theme of this column, which comes from the movie "The Way," (the 2010 movie about the pilgrimage across Spain to the tomb of Saint James the Apostle): "You don't choose a life, you live one." At times, we fight hard to have life on our terms. We can be very stubborn people. However, for those who spiritually mature, the realization sets in that we have been given the gift of life and that comes with certain strengths and weaknesses. These are the limits of our life, and they cannot be exchanged. Sadly, our world considers every option open and that can make a real mess of a person's identity. We tell kids they can be whatever they want to be, but that's not exactly true. Transgenderism is a depressing topic and no matter how one engages it, non-conformism to such pseudo-science will win one an instantaneous black eye. Not that it solves all of our problems, but the above mantra gets it right: "You don't choose a life, you live one."

That being said, accepting the life that God gave us is one of the most challenging realities that we'll ever face. We labor under the impression that our dreams will all be realized and that our hopes will always be fulfilled. I think of my friend Adam. He loved baseball and was remarkably good at it. After an impressive college career that culminated in being named an All-American, it seemed that his dream of making the Major League was within reach. Except that it wasn't – he washed out at the next level because he just wasn't good enough to compete with others who were more talented. No one ever worked harder than Adam, and yet he had to come to grips with a dream that was ending. This is hard stuff for us as human beings, but it can be good for us too. After all, there's no shame in giving our best, even if it's not as good as we had hoped it would be. In faith, God receives what we give and He multiplies it. If you don't believe me, maybe you'll believe Mother Teresa of Calcutta.

Mother Teresa was asked once how she helped 40,000 people in the course of her lifetime. Her response was characteristically short and sweet: "I helped one person, and then Jesus brought another and another. This was all His work, not mine." Often times we hang back and avoid the task Jesus is asking us to consider because we feel inadequate or it's too humble for us to engage. In his later years after moving from the farm to town, Dad continued his lifelong habit of picking up the garbage that he found along the streets. But he added another task, that of greeting each and every pet he encountered along the way. Once I walked with Dad from his home to church, a distance of just over a mile. I was amazed to see the response of each dog and deer (yes, there was a domesticated deer in a pen) as we made our way to church. It was like walking with Saint Francis of Assisi.

Hard times are an opportunity for fortitude and deep faith. The other alternative is deep fear, but we don't do well when we live in such a state. There is a choice, and God gives each of us the grace to choose rightly. But maybe that's the hardest part, asking Him for help. As the following quote makes clear, we'd all like to be heroes and do it on our own: "Dear God, I give You all, willingly. But I don't know how to give, I just let them take. The best is to remain quiet. Because though I may not know how to give, You know how to take . . . . Yet I would have wished to be once, just once, magnificently generous to You!" (The Diary of a Country Priest, George Bernanos). Patterned on the life of Saint John Vianney, Bernanos' book shows how heroic goodness requires a humble heart and the courage to ask for help. When is the last time you asked for help? As Pa and Ma Ingalls demonstrate over and over again, before we can give we have to receive. It's just really hard to ask for help.

May God help us to live heroically the life and vocation that He has given us!

God's love story reveals itself in our stories, experiences, and aspirations. We are all prodigal sons and daughters. There are many times in our lives when we would "sell our souls" in order to pursue our passions. We pursued what we wanted without regard for others or God. We have sowed our oats, thrown ourselves into careless pleasures, spent what we know we ought to have saved, turned our backs on those we love and abused gifts we have been given. We even hit bottom and realized the silliness and self-destruction of it all. We needed to come home. We knew we erred and needed a gentle presence to show us God's unconditional love. This wayward journey home changed us.

As much as we need to be welcomed, we are also the one who needs to do the welcoming and mercy giving. Those we love need our guidance, but they don't always take it. We know that what they are doing is off the mark, self-destructive and wrong. We have to let them go and let it happen, even though they might get hurt. As we wait and hope, they choose to make their way back to us. They don't need us to judge them. They have done enough of that to themselves. We immediately embrace them and are just happy they're home. God uses us to help heal them. Knowing how much we craved understanding and forgiveness ourselves, we can now freely give it away. God uses what he has taught us to teach others.

We are also the entitled ones. At least we "think" we are entitled. After all, we work hard for what we have. We cannot get our heads around the idea that someone can get something that I really deserve! If I do what I'm supposed to do, I ought to be rewarded for that, right? If I do something wrong, I ought to pay the consequences. This is justice, isn't it? This is not God's justice. God is all about love, mercy, compassion, and forgiveness. God's justice is love freely given without merit. We carry the stories of the prodigal son, the unconditional forgiving father, and the entitled angry brother with us. When we make friends with all three, humbly telling those stories to others makes us Christ's ambassadors

Please consider becoming a mentor to help participants in a successful St Vincent de Paul program called "Getting Ahead in a Just Getting-By World." This 16-20 session workshop helps individuals build their own personal plan to get out of poverty. The program helps participants explore their "Life Now"; develop their "Future Story"; and learn how they can apply the "Theory of Change" to "Get Ahead." Mentors are a powerful part of this process. Those living in unstable environments need people in their lives who can support them through the very difficult changes necessary to build skills, change relationships, connect with resources, and develop the attitudes and behaviors necessary to complete this journey. Typically, Mentors meet with their investigators once a week for one hour and are available for occasional phone calls. Mentors are not a 24/7 hotline, nor do they provide financial support.
