

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Ruth Pakaluk is probably not a name you have ever heard, at least not yet. She was a convert to Catholicism who was a wonderful mother of six children. Sadly, Ruth died of breast cancer in 1998 at the youthful age of 41. Recently her cause has been opened, which is a Catholic way of saying that she may have been a saint. If you'd like to know more about her, she wrote a beautiful book titled, The Appalling Strangeness of the Mercy of God. Without spoiling any of the story that she tells, I'd like to share a few of Ruth's insights in our column this week.

Now that spring has officially arrived, the change of seasons and the passage of time are perennial themes that have deep meaning for us as human beings. For example, springtime resembles our own beginning and the hope that it brought to our parents and so many others. Everything is so fresh and new, just like the first blades of grass and the tulips that courageously announce that winter has passed. And while it seems that babies grow up so fast, seemingly changing right before our very eyes, we are actually the slowest of all God's creatures to mature and leave our parents. God knew what He was doing when He gave us a lot of time being little and dependent on others, especially on our parents. While there are many more things we could say about spring, it's summer that we love best (even if it's still a couple of months away).

Ruth once gave a talk titled "Summer Vacation: good use of time." Ruth described the symbolism of summer as follows: "So what does summer signify? Summer signifies the bliss in Heaven. What is it that is so beautiful about summer? The long, long days, with evening stretched out well into what really should be considered night. The hot, lazy days with blazing sun in a deep blue sky and huge cumulous clouds sailing across the sky. There is a sense of the infinite expanse of time, of the fullness of beauty. No deadlines, no final exams – all the effort and struggle is over and we're just meant to bask in the sun, smelling the fragrance from the rosebushes in full bloom. Or gazing at the endless ocean, listening to the never-ending sound of the surf. And so on. This is something like what heaven is going to be like. And it is good for us to get good doing the things we are intended by God to do for eternity. And it is good for us to help our children and grandchildren acquire the conviction that they were meant for that kind of eternal beatitude." Ruth had a poetic sense of things and the soft touch of a mystic in the making.

Having given a palpable description of summer, Ruth would go on to explain how people had a tendency to think of the leisure of summer as "killing time." Saint Josemaría Escrivá took a very different approach: "To rest is not to do nothing: it is to relax with activities that require less effort." Most of us could think of leisurely activities that energized us versus those that left us feeling drained and dull. An easy example is the difference we feel between time scrolling on our phone versus time spent with friends playing a board game or enjoying an animated conversation. The difference is incredible. To that end, Ruth went on to give some practical advice about how to use the leisure time that life affords us: "Some practical tips to conclude. Put your interior life first: perhaps get out of the house early, before everyone is awake, to go to Mass or to pray. Try going for a walk to say the Rosary. Post a list of topics to study or read. Find a friend or two to read them with and discuss them. Make a list of trips you want to make, people you want to see. Post it on the fridge and see how many you can cross off in the course of the summer. Make the children stick to some kind of schedule. Don't let them sleep until noon. Make them do some reading and devote themselves to some educational activities. Maybe also make a list of some movies you've always wanted to see and watch them together. But don't overdo it."

All of this may seem a bit out of place, given that it's early April. But human beings are famous for thinking ahead. Many reading this have already made many plans about the upcoming summer. Planning time for God and virtuous activities is necessary if we ever hope to grow in holiness. Saint Josemaría advocated having a plan for our spiritual life so that we wouldn't leave it to chance or whatever we feel like doing from day to day. No one ever advanced in science, music, or sports without having a definite plan and strong dose of discipline. The spiritual lives of the saints are no different. Men and women who make a spiritual plan for summer and indeed for every other season have a very good chance of living more and more generously and joyfully as the years go by. Maybe it's a good time to think about how you spend each day, especially considering how you spend the moments of leisure that you have at your disposal. Wasting time leads to restlessness and listlessness – neither of which are much fun. Lent, interestingly enough, cultivates spiritual discipline that is meant to enhance the way we have fun . . . if we only take the time to truly pray, fast, and give alms to the poor.

As we come to the last two weeks of our annual preparation for Easter, this is a very acceptable time to examine how we use the time God has given us. How much of it do we use for Him? How much do we use to serve His people? How much of it do we waste on things that leave us dissipated and feeling bored? God gives us the spring to remind us of not only the gift of new life, but the extraordinary hope of eternal life. What we do in this life echoes unto eternity. Ruth understood this and was able to live each day with gratitude and purpose. When the Lord came to take her home, she was ready because she had learned to spend her days preparing for life in Heaven. Her life is an invitation for us to do the same.

May God bless these days of Lent with a wise use of time, so that our hearts become more able to receive His love and share it with His people!

We love to make examples out of those who have erred and done wrong. Publicly punishing others serves as a means of demonstrating the consequences for what is deemed inappropriate or wrongful behavior. While this may appear an effective way of achieving conformity to established rules, it runs the real risk of distorting motivation. Obviously, we want people to do what is right and pursue healthy, virtuous behaviors and ideals. But is fear of punishment ever the best motivation for avoiding one action in favor of another? Doing something out of fear is never healthy. Focusing exclusively on our behavior and what others expect or think, leads to living life with a self-focused superficiality. We become more concerned about protecting ourselves from something negative and unpleasant, than investing ourselves in the freedom, wonder and awe of being human! We can still find our way to the unacceptable or inappropriate behavior as long as we do not get caught! Being a whole, focused, and God-centered human being requires more. It demands an investment of the heart. Virtuous, moral, and mature lifestyles reflective of the Gospel necessitate love.

When we experience and recognize love, God's unconditional love, in the depth of our soul, we fall in love with what we have found. We then find ourselves leaving destructive and sinful actions behind in search of something more holy, dignified, true, integral, and loving. This is really "mercy realized." God's tremendous, loving, eternal forgiveness and willingness to bring us back to something more real and tender is transformational. The respect for myself that I receive from God is so life changing that it causes me to run quickly away from anything sinful and self-destructive to things that are whole and holy.

There are many people who want nothing more than to judge or criticize us. What would actually stoning the woman caught in adultery really accomplish? Nothing more than the inflation of the already self-righteous egos of a few men who think they have power. They have no power because they are sinners too, just like everyone else. What all of us have is the humble ability to express sorrow for pursuing destructive thoughts and actions and receive the power of God's mercy. Then, Jesus' request to "go and sin no more" will be one we proudly heed and follow.

After undergoing a pastoral year at Mary, Mother of the Church Parish in La Crosse, Fr. Williams entered St. Francis de Sales Seminary in Milwaukee while taking classes at Sacred Heart Seminary and School of Theology where he earned his Masters of Divinity and Masters of Art in Systematic Theology. Fr. Williams is currently serving as Associate Pastor of St. John the Baptist Parish and Chaplain of Columbus Catholic Middle and High School, both in Marshfield.


