#### From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! Some of you have noticed pictures in the back of church of our future spiritual hall of famers: this year's First Communion class! This is their big weekend and we both support them with our prayers and bask in their enthusiasm and joy as they receive Jesus in Holy Communion for the first time. Oh, to be a kid again! According to Jesus, we'll have to become like children if we hope to gain admittance to Heaven. What follows are some of the lessons we can learn from our youngest parishioners.

While visiting my brother and his wife and family for Easter, I was blessed by many experiences that both validated my vocation and deepened my love for marriage and family. First, there was the drama of hiding the chocolate from Charlie, who at the age of two, seems incapable of temperance. At some point, the defenses broke down, and Charlie was able to break into his parents' bedroom and find the mother lode. By the time his Dad entered the scene, chocolate was spread out all over the place. It seems Charlie was strategically setting the stage for the most efficient way to eat as much as possible before getting caught. However, as far as we can tell, something alerted him to the possibility that what he was doing was wrong. It was then that he tried to flee the crime scene and realized that he had locked himself in and was doomed to get caught. By the time I saw him, his quivering chin was covered with chocolate, and it was running down onto his sweatshirt, aided by his tears of repentance. I told Charlie that a life of professional crime did not appear to be in his future – he'd done a terrible job of covering up the evidence.

What lesson can we derive from Charlie's compunction in the chocolate factory? The fact that moral lessons are not wasted on children. God knows his little conscience is not all that well-formed or trustworthy at this point. Just the same, Charlie knew that his parents had told him not to enter their bedroom and not to eat all of the chocolate. And even though he could have blissfully ignored their instructions, at some point he felt the shame and guilt that comes, even while chocolate is flowing like a river right down our grateful throats. This is a sign of how God made each and every person – He gave us a conscience, a moral compass that would help us find the way to true happiness, and someday, the way to Heaven. Our conscience needs a lot of formation and that's the work of parents, teachers, and mentors. Our conscience also needs a lot of grace, and that's the work of prayer and the Sacraments. Parents, your part is indispensable for the future of your children. But you're not on your own (or at least you don't have to be): the work of grace is even more important for the future of your children. Please remember this always: whatever your shortcomings as a parent, God's grace can more than make up for them if you trust in Him and bring your children to Him always. This is lesson number one.

Another lesson comes from the family cat, Jingles. Insofar as I spent the night on the pullout couch, we had some significant quality time together. I was really tired, so I managed to sleep pretty well. Nevertheless, Jingles did his best to roll out the red carpet of feline hospitality, and he regaled me with his impressive bag of tricks. In the morning, over a mug of hot coffee and prayers, Jingles made it clear to me that while he's happy in my brother's home, he lives his own life on his own terms. Not that I blame him . . . one of my nephews pointed out that Jingles doesn't come out much during the day, only at night. If I were a cat and had to negotiate life with 8 hyperactive kids, I'd probably do the same. But I think Jingles was so happy to serenade me because, like us, he craves community. And that's moral lesson number two that children seem to understand innately: life is better with friends. Even for the most introverted among us, we're created by a God whose inner life is one of giving and receiving love. We cannot live without love and children are instinctively drawn to it (suffocatingly so, at times). The struggle for adults is that we remember the times that we were thwarted in our efforts to receive love and so we begin to take less and less chances. In other words, we learn to live more and more like Jingles. For the record, I made an appointment with Jingles for my next visit: we're going to discuss the fact that love takes risks and the necessity of him opening his heart to my nephews and niece. Please pray that Jingles receives my message in the spirit that it is given.

Okay, room for one more lesson, and it comes from my niece, Therese. She turns five on May 31<sup>st</sup>, but already has a budding vocation as a future writer. Allow me to share one of her first stories, dictated to her dear Mom:

"Once upon a time there was two little kids walking on the road and they saw a wolf. They said, "Aaaaah!" And the mother came, and the dad too, and the big brother. Then the wolf scratched them, and then the big lion came. They scratched all the kids up and then the mother and father they scratched until they were dead. They should not have gone down there. The end."

It's a bit of a tragic story, but while I was reading it my brother (Therese's Dad) was giggling uncontrollably. Then I realized that parents have an amazing intuition about their own children. Whereas I wasn't exactly sure how to respond, Therese's Dad knew that her imagination was simply expressing the moral imperative that we should be careful because we live in a dangerous world. And if we're not careful, then in a way it's partially our own fault. Pretty sophisticated stuff for an almost five year old! By the way, it reminds me of a relevant quote from G.K. Chesterton: "Fairy tales don't tell children that dragons exist. Children already know that dragons exist. Fairy tales tell children that dragons can be killed." And that's an essential truth for both children and adults, namely that goodness, in the end, will conquer evil. Sometimes we forget this. Having a crucifix to look at is a perpetual reminder that evil cannot kill goodness, at least not for long.

Before coming back to Wausau, I sat down with my family for a quick lunch (characterized by the usual pandemonium that is good for the soul). At one point, Therese told me to sit by her. While I wasn't opposed, I asked her why she wanted me to sit by her, to which she responded emphatically, "*Uncle Sam, because I love you!*" Among the many wonderful lessons I learned in my 24 hour visit, the boldness of love and its ability to cut us to the quick was my favorite one. We owe so much to childhood and to our children. Let's repay the many lessons we continue to learn from them with our fervent prayers and humble hearts.

May God bless our First Communicants and their families with perfect gratitude as they receive Jesus this Sunday!

#### May 1, 2022 - 3rd Sunday of Easter

Could it be that God's image has become so soiled and distorted that it is hard for us to see it? Our self-serving agendas have done a great job twisting God's image into what profits us. We want our agenda to be God's agenda and use prayer as the convincing leverage we need. Worse still, our success and egocentric agenda often erases God's image completely, replacing it with our own. St. Oscar Romero instructs us that the Son of Man "dies on the cross to cleanse God's image, which is soiled in today's humanity so enslaved, so selfish, so sinful." Striving to preserve control of our destinies at all costs, we fail to see the risen suffering servant, the Christ, standing right beside us.

Jesus, who suffered and died on a cross and was raised from the dead, corrects our soiled image of God. He shows us God as God is, not who we want to make God to be. God is the God of the poor, the weak, and the marginalized. He is the God who tenderly caresses us when we are suffering and hurting, assuring us that all will be safe and well. He is the God of equity, peace, justice, and compassion who wants happiness for each of His children, desiring their wellbeing and success. God goes where men and women are afraid to go, sitting with the lost, the broken, and the sorrowing. St. Oscar Romero challenges us to illuminate with "Christ's light ... even the most hideous caverns of the human person: torture, jail, plunder, want, chronic illness. The oppressed must be saved." The resurrection calls us to be God's microphone, a messenger, and a prophet (St. Oscar Romero).

Using eyes that see beyond the limited constructs and desires of our world, we can see the true and real Jesus standing before us, calling us to transformation and change. Asking us more than once, "do you love me?" We are beckoned to give an answer. Answering in the affirmative, it is now our task to feed the sheep and the lambs who belong to God. In short, equipped with the power of the resurrection and a corrected image of God our task is to make things better, brighter, holier, more life-giving, and just for all of God's children. Considering our choices, our interactions, our philosophies, and aspirations, how can we do this?

#### The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd



The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is an approach to the spirituality of children that especially focuses on the child's relationship with God. It is rooted in the Bible, the sacred liturgy of the Church, and the educational principles of Dr. Maria Montessori. Dr. Maria Montessori's approach follows St. Thomas Aquinas' understanding that "all our knowledge has its origin in the senses." Children gather in an "atrium," a room prepared especially for them, which contains simple yet beautiful materials to help them

absorb and respond to the most essential proclamations of the Catholic faith.

If an adult hears a beautiful passage from the Bible, the adult might take a Bible, find the passage, and read it slowly and think deeply about God's words. A child needs another way. In an atrium the child can ponder a biblical passage or a prayer from the liturgy by taking the material for that text and working with it – placing wood figures of sheep in a sheepfold of the Good Shepherd, setting sculpted apostles around a Last Supper table, or preparing a small altar with the furnishings used for the Eucharist. Some works of the older children include copying parables and moral maxims from the Bible, sequencing written prayers from the Rite of Baptism or the Mass, working with a time line showing the History of the Kingdom of God, or beginning to formulate what their special role and gifts are for fulfilling God's Plan.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is built on the foundations of the Word of God and the Liturgy. All presentations are based directly on liturgy or Scripture, without any additions or simplifications. The Word of God is not "taught" as in a traditional classroom, but is rather received and explored by the child, together with the catechist. It is also an intrinsically liturgical program, and exists with the aim of allowing the child to enter and participate in the life of the Church with a fuller understanding and joy. For this, the curriculum of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd follows the cycle of the Liturgical Year, focusing on the feasts of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost.

The CGS has been developed for children from Infants – 12 years-old/Confirmation.

Trained volunteers are needed, as this beautiful program continues to grow. Please contact Father Martin or Stacie Stanke if you'd be interested in receiving training, which will be offered in Wausau this summer. Volunteers are unanimous in their claim that they receive far more than they give. If God is nudging you, it's time to respond!
