From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! "Leaf by Niggle" is a short story written by J.R.R. Tolkien in 1938. It's a reflection on the reality that our life is directed toward a journey that we all must make someday. The writing is subtle and sophisticated, and only after time to ruminate on it, does the reader realize that the journey is the one we'll make when the Lord calls us from this life to Himself. In other words, it's a story about death and how we must prepare for it. The main character in the story understandably drags his heals, claiming that his life's work is not yet complete. I wonder if it will be any different for us when the Lord comes . . . that we too will ask for just a little more time to tie up any loose ends and to say our goodbyes with sincerity and love. And while we don't have much control over when that day comes, we do have some say in how we spend the time between "*now and the hour of our death*," (which, as Chuck Neff sagely pointed out, are the two most important moments of our life).

Mother Mary Francis was a fairly famous Poor Clare nun who passed away in 2006. Because I have a first cousin who is also a Poor Clare nun, I've always been rather partial to their religious order. My cousin's monastery (where cloistered nuns live) is in Barhamsville, Virginia and I've been there three times: once, when it first opened in 2004, again on a short visit in 2005, and in 2015 to celebrate my cousin's 25th anniversary as a professed nun. The Poor Clares are named after Saint Clare of Assisi, the remarkable noble woman whose order was founded by her friend and contemporary, Saint Francis of Assisi. Of all the impressive things about the Poor Clares, what stands out is their incredible trust in Divine Providence (they own nothing in this world except their Breviaries – a.k.a. prayer books) and their dedication to intercessory power. Did you know that they wake up at midnight every night and pray for an hour for all those who in the world are being tempted by sin? I joined them one night while I was visiting and it's something that I'll never forget.

Back to Mother Mary Francis. She had a very impressive gift for writing and she put it to good use many times over the years. Her book on the *Anima Christi* ("Soul of Christ") prayer is one of the most lucid and accessible explanations of that ancient post-Communion prayer that you'll ever find. But for my money, my favorite book by Mother Mary Francis is <u>A Right to be Merry</u>. In the inside cover of the book are these words: "*Our Lord told Margery Kempe, the anchoress (a.k.a. hermitess) of Lynn, that her enclosed life of union with Him gave Him the greatest satisfaction, and it gave her 'as great a right to be merry as any lady in the world'.*" Yes, consecrated women are some of the most joyful women in the world, and as we celebrate this month dedicated to mothers, it's good to remember spiritual motherhood and all that it contributes to the world.

Speaking of spiritual motherhood, here's one of my favorite passages from <u>A Right to be Merry</u>:

"People take doors for granted. And that is a great mistake. For doors are much more than movable panels in walls, swinging you from one place into another. They are always gateways, even when they are exits. All his life long, a man is walking steadily toward the gates of eternity, so he can never truly make an exit. He is forever going.

To me, doors are things of mystery and magnificence, opening on to new vistas of things which are each day a little less unseen, as the trek home to God brings us daily closer to the low door of Heaven."

As we near the end of another school year, our thoughts naturally include this year's class of graduating seniors. They'll be walking through some doors for the last time. When we're young, we always look forward, never backward. As Tom Petty once put it, "*into the great wide open, under them skies of blue.*" Oh yes, to be young again – what a blessing, even if youth is famously wasted on the young!

As the class of 2022 walk through some doors for the last time and others for the first, we do well to pray that they listen for the voice of God. He knows us and what plans He has for us, plans to give us hope and a future (Jeremiah 29) . . . if only we would take the time to prayerfully ask. Saint John Paul II, on the day he canonized the Carmelite nun Teresa Benedicta of the Cross (Edith Stein) in 1998, spoke these encouraging words:

"This woman had to face the challenges of such a radically changing century as our own. Her experience is an example to us. The modern world boasts of the enticing door which says: everything is permitted. It ignores the narrow gate of discernment and renunciation. I am speaking especially to you, young Christians . . . Pay attention! Your life is not an endless series of open doors! Listen to your heart! Do not stay on the surface, but go to the heart of things! And when the time is right, have the courage to decide! The Lord is waiting for you to put your freedom in his good hands.

"The enticing door which says everything is permitted." Some of us have been through that door and would want to save others the heartache that is found on the other side. But God gives each person the ability to choose which doors they will open, as well as the grace to repent when they find sadness and regret on the other side. Not all doors lead to happiness. But Jesus said it's not as complicated as it seems: "*I am the gate . . I am the way, the truth, and the life.*" It's a low door, one that requires humility, courage, and trust. For most of us, those are virtues that only come through much trial and error. But by God's grace they come.

We pray for the class of 2022, as they continue their journey through this beautiful and sometimes tragic and confusing world. As they discover that all beauty, truth, and goodness have a source - God, may they trust in His grace and walk through the doors that will lead them someday home to Him.

May God bless our high school seniors and their families with hope and joy as they celebrate this wonderful milestone!

"It is necessary for us to undergo many hardships to enter the Kingdom of God." Many folks really work very hard to circumvent difficult situations. We prefer the easier way around something, rather than risk inconvenience, hurt or prolonged suffering. It's no wonder euthanasia is rapidly becoming acceptable around the world. Through purely human eyes, there is no issue bypassing the inevitable, taking control and bringing things more swiftly to a place of peace. If this is the way God sees things, then why does Jesus make such a big deal helping us understand the experience of suffering and embrace it? God's wisdom clearly takes us in another direction.

Imagine if we were able to eradicate ALL hardship and suffering. Where would we be? As we look at our own journeys, many of our solid more growth producing life lessons have been born of suffering, disappointment, inconvenience, darkness, and despair. There is something sacred about all of these experiences as God uses them to create something new. Envisioning a life without hardship and suffering brings us to a vision where everything is flat-lined and dull. As much as hardship and suffering are difficult crosses to bear, not taking them up runs the risk of us becoming shallow, empty, and lifeless. Helen Keller remarks that, "a happy life consists not in the absence but in the mastery of hardships." What an incredibly wise insight! Many really successful people and saints were brought to their station in life because they suffered. Suffering teaches us about what's important and propels us to search the depths of our souls for resources and strength we never would have known before.

This is especially true when we love as Jesus asks us to love. Love, perhaps above any other experience, can cause us great hardship, pain, and suffering especially when it's authentic and unconditional. While it can thrust us into an incredible experience of God and life on one hand, it can bruise and wound us deeply on the other. Mastering the art of love is the secret to living life well, walking in the presence of God and investing in the joy of the Gospel. Love and suffering walk hand in hand. Compromising one will compromise the other. Maybe that's why Jesus spent so much time convincing us to accept both.
