From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! On July 12th the Church celebrated the Feast day of Zelie and Louis Martin. They were canonized Saints in 2015 and they're the parents of Saint Therese of Lisieux, the famous "Little Flower." Incidentally, there aren't a lot of Martins that became Saints and, though I hate to admit it, it's not looking like there will be many in the future either. Louis and Zelie are recognized today as heroic witnesses of what marriage can be when vows are lived with humility, fidelity, and trust. Let's begin our brief meditation by mentioning how God transformed them through suffering.

Louis wanted to be a priest, Zelie, a nun – both were turned down. When they met each other, they fell in love but decided to live as Mary and Joseph and never consummate their marriage. A holy confessor told them that one of the ends or goals of marriage is to raise up children for God's Kingdom in Heaven. They went on to have nine children, five of whom lived to be adults while the other four died at birth or shortly after. Their five girls all ultimately ended up as nuns. But their family suffered tremendously. Zelie got sick with breast cancer and died, leaving Louis to raise the last two girls on his own. Leonie had many struggles for years because she had been abused by a nanny, unbeknownst to the parents. Louis later on succumbed to mental illness, spending three years in a psychiatric hospital. Life was very hard for them – it seems that no saints were ever produced by an easy life.

Family struggles sometimes lead us to despair. We love our families, and we do our best to help them, especially if they've fallen away from the faith. However, sometimes we push too hard, and it only makes them feel more and more distant from the Church and God. Louis and Zelie learned to turn to Mary and Joseph as their mentors and this gave them courage and perseverance. One beautiful devotion to the Blessed Mother was given to me by my Poor Clare friend, Sister Mary Agnes. It's dedicated to Our Lady of Confidence and recently I learned more about its history:

The first picture of Our Lady of Confidence was given to Sister Chiara Isabella Fornari (1697-1744) by the artist Carlos Maratta when Sister was a young nun in the Poor Clare Convent of Todi, Italy.

Through this picture, Sister Chiara Isabella and her associates were drawn to a deep and intimate relationship with Our Lady, who showed her approval through unusual cures, conversions, and above all new hope, which penetrated throughout Italy (Sister Isabella's beatification process is underway). Copies of Sister Isabella's pictures were made, one of which is in the small students' chapel of Saint Mary's Seminary in the Pontifical Major Seminary at the Lateran Pontifical Basilica of Saint John the Baptist, the oldest church in Christendom and the seat of the Cardinal Vicar of Rome.

Twice Rome was delivered from the ravages of cholera. During World War I over 100 seminarians who were forced into the armed services of Italy, returned safely. It was this later favor that prompted the seminarians to superimpose crowns of gold and jewels on their picture.

When a student at the seminary, Pope John XXIII became a devotee of Our Lady of Confidence, frequently visiting the seminary chapel. He said his first Mass there. He often visited and said Masses there especially on the second Sunday in Lent, her feast day. His spirit lived with Our Lady of Confidence and his last words were 'Mater mea, fiducia mea,' (my Mother, my faithful one).

Many others have also found hope through the devotion. 'My Mother, My Confidence' is a short prayer which can be repeated over and over again. In addition to this brief aspiration, the longer prayer is as follows:

"O Mary Immaculate, the precious name of Mother of Confidence, with which we honor you, fills our hearts to overflowing with the sweetest consolation and moves us to hope for every blessing from you. If such a title has been given to you, it is a sure sign that no one has recourse to you in vain. Accept, therefore, with a mother's love our heartfelt devotion, as we earnestly beseech you to be gracious to us in our every need. We pray that you will make us live in constant union with you and your divine Son, Jesus. With you as our guide, we are certain that we shall walk in the right way and that it will be our happiness to hear you say on the last day of our life those words of comfort, 'Come, my good and faithful servant, enter into the joy of the Lord.' Amen."

When I lost my breviary on June 18th, I also lost that prayer card. By the Providence of God, I later found a letter from one of the Poor Clare nuns that I visited while giving their retreat earlier in the summer. Lo and behold, there was an image of Our Lady of Confidence along with the prayer – I have resumed saying it every day, begging God for the grace of deeper trust in Him. This prayer helps us do something for our families as well as keeping us from pushing too hard. "*My Mother, My Confidence!*" What a short and sweet way to pray.

No family is complete without both a spiritual mother and a spiritual father. Saint Joseph is the Universal Patron of the Church and devotion to him helps us not to get disheartened by things we find confusing, if not downright scandalous. Saint Joseph helped Louis Martin let go of his daughters and trust that they would find happiness in a life of service to God and the Church. And that was a lot harder than we sometimes suspect. Let's imitate Louis' devotion to Saint Joseph, so that instead of casting stones when we're frustrated, we remember to turn to prayer. I leave you with a beautiful prayer to Saint Joseph:

"O dear Saint Joseph, as you responded with such great faith in protecting and providing for the Holy Family, so God has entrusted you with the care of His Church on earth. Protect our Holy Father and all the members of the Church; take our families into your special care, particularly those who are struggling; inspire us with courageous trust in the Father's merciful providence; and as we entrust our needs to your prayers, fill our hearts and souls with the peace and joy that can only come from the Heart of Jesus. Good Saint Joseph, graciously hear our petitions. Keep us ever united in the love of Jesus Christ, ever fervent in imitation of Our Lady, and always faithful in devotion to you. Amen."

May God bless and heal our families, may He strengthen all marriages, and may we find strength in His Holy Family!

July 17, 2022 - 16th Sunday in Ordinary Time

"Our families need to ask for the gift of the Spirit! Through prayer, even in the busiest times, we give time back to God, we find the peace that comes from appreciating the important things, and we encounter the joy of God's unexpected gifts. Through daily prayer may our homes become, like the house of Martha and Mary, places where Jesus always finds a warm welcome (Pope Francis)." While it is necessary to attend to the details of hospitality, learning how to be present to people, experiences, and God is sometimes more important. Creating homes that are welcoming environments requires not only organization and structure but members who truly enjoy being there and celebrating life with one another.

Details can often get the best of us. While attending to details is important to success, our obsession with them can be problematic. Whether wanting to make a good impression, fear of failure, insecurity, or emotional immaturity, throwing ourselves into the "details" of hospitality can distract us from being present to those we want to serve. Conversely, focusing exclusively on being present without any attention to detail also sets our attempts at hospitality up for disaster! We need a balance of both. But creating a truly welcoming space in our homes and within ourselves requires still more.

We have to be empty of ourselves. Becoming a welcoming, hospitable person is not possible in someone focused on their own needs and desires. If the one we serve is the one who looks back at us in the mirror, then there is no space for anyone else. While Martha and Mary had different ideas of what it means to serve, they both had the inner space and freedom to do so. They were detached from themselves. Detachment becomes the challenge to hospitality and creating a God-centered, open-hearted space in our lives. When we impulsively act out of our personal agendas, violence, abuse, pride, greed, lust, power, control, passion, and self-aggrandizement encroach upon the space needed to be present to another human being. Not only can others not find a home in us, but even God cannot find a home in us!
