

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! We're hosting a Mass of Healing at Holy Name on Wednesday, August 3rd at 10:00 a.m. We haven't had one of these in the years that I've been in Wausau – I suppose we can blame that on Covid (it's nice to have a scape goat, even if it's being beaten like a dead horse). What follows are some clarifications as to what happens at such a Mass and who should come.

First, a Mass of Healing is not the same as a Healing Mass. The latter was hosted by Father Bob Thorn many times over the years and it was a powerful catalyst for bringing hope and healing to the brokenness of people's lives. A Healing Mass focuses on Jesus' role as the Divine Physician Who is seemingly more intent on healing the inner hurts of people then He is on curing people's physical ailments. A Mass of Healing is different because it is more focused on the Holy Spirit and how He brings His comfort, courage, and compassion to people who are in great pain or in danger of death. At a Mass of Healing, the Sacrament of Anointing is offered to those who present themselves for this powerful encounter with God. Before explaining who should come, allow me to share a short story.

I remember growing up and hearing about how my Mom was anointed. It was after my baby brother Pete was born. Mom was very sick and the priest came and gave her the Sacrament of Anointing. Thanks be to God, she recovered and was there to help nurture and nourish us five kids for the crucial years of our childhood. Mom always spoke very reverently and gratefully when she told us how much that Sacrament meant to her. I grew up with a certain awe for Anointing because it seemed to me that it had saved my Mom's life.

In terms of who should receive the Sacrament of Anointing, the book <u>Pastoral Care of the Sick</u> provides the following rather succinct criteria: "A sick person . . . before surgery whenever a serious illness is the reason for the surgery. Elderly people . . . if they have become notably weakened even though no serious illness is present. Sick children . . . if they have sufficient use of reason to be strengthened by the sacrament. Sick people who, although they have lost consciousness or the use of reason, would, as Christian believers, probably have asked for it were they in control of their faculties." Now, let's break them down into layman's parlance.

First, the Sacrament is no longer called "Extreme Unction" for good reason. Before the recent development of deeper understanding surrounding the Sacrament, Anointing was reserved for people who were dying, otherwise known in Latin as *in extremis*. Given her solicitude for all of her children, the Church as a mother has generously extended the use of the Sacrament of Anointing to include more than just the dying.

A second point is that, while you don't have to be dying to be anointed, a headache or a broken arm would not be sufficient to merit receiving it. As a classmate pointed out, the Sacrament of Anointing is meant to configure us (i.e. bring us closer) to Christ crucified. If we're not really in any danger of death, then it's not the right time to be anointed. Before surgery it generally makes sense, but given the impressive state of medicine in our country, the likelihood of dying while undergoing certain procedures has become smaller and smaller. If you're not sure about whether to be anointed, you can always ask. Of course, there seems to be rather wide range of opinions which sometimes makes it confusing. Personally, I tend to lean toward anointing if there's any doubt whatsoever.

A final point is to prayerfully prepare to receive the Sacrament. Whether it's this summer or sometime in the future, it would be best if each of us died having received the Sacrament of Anointing. The graces we're given allow us to repent one last time of all sin. These graces also prepare us to meet the Lord with faith, hope, and love. Finally, the graces of Anointing help us to leave this world in peace, which is a grace for both the person dying and his or her loved ones. Saint Joseph is the patron of a happy death, and it's a good idea to pray to him everyday for that grace – both for ourselves and our loved ones. Any priest could tell story after story of the miracles he's seen while anointing people who were coming to the end of their earthly pilgrimage. The grace of Anointing is a powerful gift that affects those who receive it, as well as those who were there to witness it. As I write this, I'm reminded of the older man I anointed last night in the hospital. He was clearly dying (anyone around death becomes very familiar with its telltale signs) and his daughters were keeping vigil with him. The peace that came into the room once the man had received the Sacrament was both palpable and powerful. Jesus promised never to abandon us, and in the Sacraments He always comes through and brings His gift of peace.

The Mass of Healing is scheduled for Wednesday, August 3rd. Please call the parish office and let us know that you'll be coming and would like to be anointed. We want to record the names of those who receive the Sacrament of Anointing, so calling 715-842-4543 and letting us know of your intention to join us will be much appreciated. Even if you forget to call, you're still welcome to come. We'll have volunteers at the door to greet you and we'll give you a name tag so that I will know who wants to be anointed.

If you know of anyone who would like to come but would need a ride, please consider volunteering or asking around to see who could help out. We'd love to have as many people come as are able. From past experiences, I've found this to be one of the most powerful Masses because of the solidarity that we feel with people who suffer. There is a deep bond forged between people who faithfully take up their cross and follow the Lord. If you're able to join us on August 3rd, you'll feel this grace and it will inspire you in your own trials.

May God bless all who suffer in any way! For He sent His Son to bring comfort to the sorrowful, and sorrow to the comfortable.

July 24, 2022 - 17th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Meister Eckhart asks, "Who is the man whose prayers God always hears?" He answers, "God hears the man who appeals to God as God. When, however, man appeals to God, hoping for some worldly good, he is not appealing to God at all, but to what he is asking of God. He is trying to make God his servant. On this point, St. Augustine says: 'You pray to what you love, for true whole prayer is nothing but love!' Thus, we pray to what we love, and no one rightly prays to God but he who prays for God and has nothing on his mind but God." We struggle with what we want God to do and how we want our prayer validated. Meister Eckhart is correct. We often want God to be our servant. We further struggle with trusting that God knows what we need and that His will is best.

God's will is not some predetermined outcome of events that we must simply suggest. "Thy will be done" is not an invocation beckoning us to accept a particular state of affairs passively. Rather, it is the humble and confident placement of ourselves in the presence of the God we seek, whom we call "Father." We must remember that God is the God of life and light. It is from nothing that God brings something and from the darkness that God brings life. Prayer allows us to seek the One we love with the assurance that all will be well regardless of what course the events of our lives take. God is not about passive submission but the humble trust of love.

That's what makes the Lord's Prayer the perfect prayer. It provides us with proper disposition and focus, putting in line all of the essential relationships of our lives. It celebrates and fosters the ever-deepening relationship of trust we have with our Creator. It also calls us to keep open the doors of love between our brothers and sisters with the power that comes with forgiveness. If in one's darkest hour they can find the resolve to fervently pray this perfect prayer of Jesus' conviction, then there is no doubt that God will hear their plea, reach out in love, and bring them ever closer to His heart. What more does one need to weather the storms of life besides faith, hope, and love? These are God's most perfect gifts and all we really need.





Catechesis of the Good Shepherd SIGN UP TODAY!

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is built on the foundations of the Word of God and the Liturgy. All presentations are based directly on liturgy or Scripture, without any additions or simplifications. The Word of God is not "taught" as in a traditional classroom, but is rather received and explored by the child,



allowing the child to enter and participate in the life of the Church with a fuller understanding and joy. For this, the curriculum of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd follows the cycle of the Liturgical Year, focusing on the feasts of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is an approach to the spirituality of children that especially focuses on the child's relationship with God. It is rooted in the Bible, the sacred liturgy of the Church, and the educational principles of Dr. Maria Montessori. Dr. Maria Montessori's approach follows St. Thomas Aquinas' understanding that "all our knowledge has its origin in the senses." Children gather in an "atrium," a room prepared especially for them, which contains simple yet beautiful materials to help them absorb and respond to the most essential proclamations of the Catholic faith.

Children ages 3-12 years are invited to attend CGS (children can begin anytime during the year). 
