# From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! "*A picture is worth a thousand words*." The picture below was taken at the Conrad Schmitt studio in Milwaukee on July 6<sup>th</sup>. I was visiting their studio with my classmate, Father Thaddeus McGuire. We were blessed with one of the most inspiring and educational tours one could imagine. Conrad Schmitt came to the United States from Germany and founded his business in 1889. Since then, he and his family have learned a lot about the various forms of sacred art. We're blessed to have them fabricating our stained glass windows – they'll change the church look and feel in very impactful ways. Let's pray to the Holy Spirit that we'll find the church warmer, more beautiful, and more uniting than ever before. God willing, this project will be the answer to our ancestors' prayers that stained glass windows one day be installed.

Speaking of Father McGuire, his new parish assignment begins at Saint Clare in Surprise, Arizona on August 1<sup>st</sup>. He really enjoyed his 10 days in Wisconsin and promised that he'd be back again next summer. Let's remember him in our prayers as he becomes the pastor of the largest parish in the Diocese of Phoenix: 6,000 families! By comparison, Holy Name has around 500 families. It's a good thing Father McGuire loves coffee – he's going to need a lot of it in the years to come.

While Father McGuire was here, we organized ourselves so as to hit the most significant spots in Wisconsin. After the weekend Masses, we headed first to my Mom's where we spent two nights. We went to the farm where I grew up and hiked around to see some of the beautiful sights. On July  $4^{\text{th}}$  we relaxed and managed to stay up late enough to watch the fireworks. Then it was off to La Crosse to visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Guadalupe.



If you've never been there, it's an incredibly beautiful spot and an inspiring way to grow closer to the Blessed Mother. After his visit to the Shrine, Father picked me up (I was at a Personnel Council meeting all afternoon) and we stopped by Culver's for a late lunch. After indulging Father's craving for custard, we drove to Milwaukee and stayed in a hotel. It was then that we visited Conrad Schmitt before heading to the ballpark for a Brewers game. They lost 2-1 to the Cubs, but it was enjoyable nevertheless.

Once back in Wausau, we grilled out early and often. Mostly we ate my brother's beef – hamburgers and steak. By the way, thanks to lots of generous people, my brother is sold out of beef until October. After Mass one morning we drove to Green Bay and first stopped for coffee (Kavarna's – they have freshly grounded coffee). Just down the street I noticed an intriguing place called "Prohibition." It turns out that it's a cigar bar and that you can smoke inside. I'd probably still be there, but Father McGuire insisted that we visit the Shrine of Our Lady of Good Help. If you've never been there, it's an amazing place because the Mother of God visited there in 1859. We spent time in prayer and went to confession before returning to Wausau. Finally, Father McGuire took a solo trip to Briggsville, which is possibly a place you didn't even know existed. It is the home of the National Shrine of Saint Philomena and Father McGuire has had a devotion to her for many years. If you don't know the story of Saint Philomena, it's one of the more fascinating tales of courage in the history of our Catholic faith.

Before summarizing her extraordinary life, one of the best talks you'll ever hear about Saint Philomena was given by Dr. Mark Miravalle. And you can listen to it in your own home thanks to our parish subscription to Formed. If you haven't already signed up, then do so today! Then you can simply search for Saint Philomena. I did so a few minutes ago and I immediately found the talk. It's an incredible story, one that I will only scratch the surface of here . . . Born in the late 3<sup>rd</sup> century, Saint Philomena was the only child of a Greek family. One day when she was 13 years old, she caught the eye of the Roman Emperor, Diocletian. He had inquiries made about her and asked to have her brought to him. He requested her hand in marriage and gave her some time to think it over. When she mentioned it to her parents, they were completely in support of such a dangerous union. They could only see how advantageous it would be for them to have their daughter married to the most powerful man on the planet. But Philomena had a mind of her own.

Because she was devoted to Jesus and had already promised her heart to Him, she refused Diocletian's offer. He was mortally offended and threatened to kill her if she persisted in refusing him. It was at this point that the heroic love for Jesus began to manifest itself to all who ever met her. She stood her ground, and Diocletian stood his. After subjecting Philomena to the humiliation of prison, Diocletian ordered that she be scourged as her chosen Spouse had been three centuries before. Next, Roman soldiers were commanded to fasten Philomena to a huge anchor and throw her into the river to drown, but angels came and set her free. Infuriated, Diocletian ordered his soldiers to shoot her with arrows, but once again Heaven appeared to be fighting for Philomena. Eventually she was run through by a sword, but not before impressing all of the soldiers by her courage, her devotion to Jesus, and her peaceful acceptance of a horrific death.

There's so much more to the story and I hope some of you will take the time to listen to Miravalle's presentation. Saint Philomena was a favorite of Saint John Vianney and even though she's a bit less known now than she once was, she's a powerhouse for all who have recourse to her. One night Father McGuire noticed a print of a painting of Saint Philomena in my room and asked me about it. When I told him about Briggsville and how a friend purchased it for me while visiting Saint Philomena's shrine, you could see an inspiration starting to form in his mind and heart. I wasn't surprised one bit when he asked to borrow my car and drive there the next day.

I hope you begin to explore the Formed website, as it's a wonderful way to learn about the saints and their ongoing influence in our world. Knowing and loving go hand in hand, so let's do our part to learn more about our faith so that we can love more generously and learn to forgive, even as Saint Philomena forgave her parents, Diocletian, and even the soldiers who killed her.

May God bless us with sincere gratitude for the gift of life, so that we will always defend it with both love and law! Your friend in Christ, Father Martin

What makes us feel secure? Many people look to tangible forms of security that will safeguard their livelihood and prepare for their future. While acquiring these promises a life with less anxiety and worry, we actually find ourselves more preoccupied and consumed with their growth and preservation. We worry more! We can easily become quasi-hoarders, consumed with obtaining more tangible crutches. Our minds and hearts are always restless, and we never seem to be at peace.

Why do we so easily give our self-worth, value, and sense of security over to things? God certainly does not deny us the pursuit of a productive and enjoyable life but where do we draw the line? A sense of well-being and happiness can easily get deferred to sometime "in the future" while we continue to wrestle with the toils of today. There is no guarantee that there will be an earthly tomorrow and all of the frenzy we bring to securing our state in life will be for naught. When we are called from this world, will we even know where to begin to look for the tranquility and repose our souls so desperately need?

We cannot be hoarders, pursuers of vanity, or greedy. They just don't work as they are too dependent on things that can fall apart. Rather than always feeling the need for more, we need to learn how to be grateful for what we have. By learning to look inward we can learn how to live lives of faithful service to others. "Happiness can only be achieved by looking inward and learning to enjoy whatever life has, and this requires transforming greed into gratitude (St. John Chrysostom)." We all need to be good stewards of what has been entrusted to our care. Grateful hearts recognize the true source of what we have and realize that our true treasure lies not in what matters to us but to God.

### Catechesis of the Good Shepherd SIGN UP TODAY!

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is built on the foundations of the Word of God and the Liturgy. All presentations are based directly on liturgy or Scripture, without any additions or simplifications. The Word of God is not "taught" as in a traditional classroom, but is rather received and explored by the child, together with the catechist. It is also an



intrinsically liturgical program, and exists with the aim of allowing the child to enter and participate in the life of the Church with a fuller understanding and joy. For this, the curriculum of the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd follows the cycle of the Liturgical Year, focusing on the feasts of Christmas, Easter, and Pentecost.

The Catechesis of the Good Shepherd is an approach to the spirituality of children that especially focuses on the child's relationship with God. It is rooted in the Bible, the sacred liturgy of the Church, and the educational principles of Dr. Maria Montessori. Dr. Maria Montessori's approach follows St. Thomas Aquinas' understanding that "all our knowledge has its origin in the senses." Children gather in an "atrium," a room prepared especially for them, which contains simple yet beautiful materials to help them absorb and respond to the most essential proclamations of the Catholic faith.

Children ages 3-12 years are invited to attend CGS (children can begin anytime during the year). For information on the dates and times of the sessions or if you would like to bring your child and walk through the atrium to see if it would be a good fit, please contact Stacie at 715-842-4543 to set up an appointment.
