

From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! A teacher had a sign in her room that said the following: "Jesus can turn your water into wine, but He can't turn your whining into anything." Well said. We live in a world that is often characterized by pouting, pity parties, and plain old-fashioned petulance. What we need when we find ourselves making defiant speeches to ourselves about how we're never understood or given our due is a true perspective. One of the best features of the monthly magazine "Columbia" (put out by the Knights of Columbus) is titled the "Catholic Man of the Month." Allow me to share the following from the August issue:

Blessed Karl Leisner (1915-1945)

The path to priesthood for Karl Leisner was both ordinary and extraordinary, marked by the common struggles of discernment and the unprecedented violence of World War II. It culminated in an unlikely event – a secret ordination inside Dachau concentration camp in 1944.

Leisner had grown up in western Germany, one of five children in a close-knit family. As a teenager, he organized a youth group that combined prayer and study with hiking, biking and camping. A retreat at the Marian shrine of Schönstatt in 1933 had a profound effect on him, and the next year he began to prepare for the priesthood in Munster. His leadership impressed Bishop (now Blessed) Clemens von Galen, who entrusted him with diocesan youth activities. However, Leisner wrestled with his vocation, feeling both a deep call to the priesthood and a deep attraction to family life. Another visit to Schönstatt brought clarity and he was ordained a transitional deacon March 25, 1939.

A short while later, Deacon Leisner was diagnosed with tuberculosis and sent to a sanitarium. Another patient there reported him for speaking against Hitler, leading to his arrest in 1940. Sent to the priest block at Dachau, he was known for comforting and encouraging his fellow prisoners even as his illness worsened.

When Bishop Gabriel Piguet arrived at the camp from France in 1944, an intriguing possibility arose: Could Deacon Leisner finally be ordained a priest? After ecclesial permission and the necessary holy oils were smuggled in, the clandestine ordination took place on Dec. 17, 1944. Utterly debilitated, Father Leisner celebrated his first and only Mass on Dec. 26. Several months after liberation, he died on Aug. 12, 1945. His last diary entry read: "Love – charity – atonement. O God, bless my enemies!" Father Karl Leisner was beatified in 1996.

Perspective – it's one of the great antidotes to persistent pouting. And there is a lot of pouting these days. Sometimes we catch ourselves and acknowledge that "these are first world problems" (e.g. the Wi-Fi isn't working or the air conditioning isn't cold enough). But far too often we find ourselves creating speeches in our head that we should never speak out loud. And while knowing some stories of people who have it far worse than we do can help, really what we're up against is spiritual malady that only prayer and the sacraments can heal.

Undoubtedly, the music lyrics I quote most often come from Led Zeppelin's song 'When the Levee Breaks': "Crying won't help you, praying won't do you no good." These are words that suggest absolute and utter futility, which is a spiritual condition tantamount to despair. Each of us finds ourselves at some point between a rock and a hard place. Because we're a fallen race, we have a tendency to give up, to throw in the towel, run up the white flag and quit. There is an ancient enemy of human nature and it's his greatest desire to destroy us by convincing us of the futility of it all. Nothing is going to work out the way we'd hoped so we may as well join the rest of humanity and belly up to the bar of materialism or hedonism or whatever is on tap for our particular time in human history . . . so goes the internal argument that the devil fuels with his lies. When we find ourselves persistently complaining about the way things are, this is a cry for spiritual help – it means we're not praying enough or going to church on a regular basis.

Please do not misunderstand the point: folks who pray and go to Mass regularly complain and pout too (some even more than the national average). But it would be far worse if they didn't pray or go to Mass. The fact is that we're very fragile people and it doesn't take much to knock us off balance. Don't forget that people started hording toilet paper when it seemed that the world was ending in 2020 . . . not to humiliate anyone, but we're easily spooked and if not for the grace of God, we're capable of some pretty desperate responses to the things life throws at us.

If you're struggling with the world and find yourself frustrated, angry, and quick to explode on people with whom you disagree, this is a spiritual condition that requires more time with the Lord. After all, Jesus came not to condemn but to forgive. Yes, Jesus will judge the living and the dead at the end of time – and He will be just to those who have done terrible things. But as Father Leisner pointed out with his last words, we owe it to our enemies to pray for them. If we don't, then we're not true friends of Jesus. And it would be impossible for someone like Father Leisner to pray for someone like an SS officer unless it was given to him from Above. Father Leisner learned somewhere along the line that evil can be defeated by goodness and that forgiveness is the key to all of it.

So, we always have a choice: will I chronically pout about petty things and indulge in perpetual pity parties? Or will I pray so that I can persevere in patience with God and His people? The former is so easy and it's a famous human pastime – we love to get together and complain about the way things are. It's much more rare to see people who come together to pray for their enemies and for the people who have hurt them. Soon we'll begin our monthly evenings of recollection with a strong dose of Eucharistic Adoration – please join us and discover the wisdom of Father Karl Leisner, who offered his brief priesthood for the people who ignored his suffering and so assured him of an early death. But Leisner was right and Led Zeppelin was wrong: crying does help you, and praying does the greatest good.

May God grant us serenity so that we will learn how to forgive the people we do not like!

August 14, 2022 - 20th Sunday in Ordinary Time

An inward transformation occurs in a person who decides to follow Jesus Christ. Things change. They see the world differently, understand their journey more deeply and profoundly, have their sights fixed on eternity and union with God and hold themselves to higher standards and virtues. It requires a conscious choice to be a Christian, and this choice must be renewed at least daily. While the basic premise of Jesus' message may appear heartwarming and straightforward: love of God, neighbor, and self, the implications of doing so are challenging. The true disciple is called to live radically, and often finds themselves at odds with the world or even with those in their own homes.

Holding ourselves to higher standards comes with a price. We have to leave other things behind. It is difficult to be people of faith, hope, and love in a world often fixated with its own fulfillment and self-absorption. Justice, temperance, prudence, and fortitude require sacrifice if they are to be lived with integrity. God's ways are not ours. This becomes crystal clear to those who have enough courage to stand against the tide. Putting love into action requires that we challenge accepted modes of doing business and fight complacency. This is what makes the saints stand out as witnesses. They are simply sinners, just like us, who persevere.

People do not want to be told that they're sailing their ships in the wrong direction. Clinging to their insistence and need to be correct, they can become defensive when challenged. This can happen even with those closest to us. As much as the Gospel calls us to unity, it also can easily create division. When we love seriously, we encounter more than feelings of warmth and acceptance. "What does love look like? It has the hands to help others. It has the feet to hasten to the poor and needy. It has eyes to see misery and want. It has the ears to hear the sighs and sorrows of men. That is what love looks like (St. Augustine)." Love also has the courage and honesty to tell people what they may not want to hear but need to, and model, without wavering, a life of humble, loving, and faithful service. Don't lose heart! There are many examples of faith before us and around us. If Jesus endured the voices of opposition, so too can we. There is no need to apologize for speaking the truth.


Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults begins September 8, 2022
