From the Pastor's Desk

Praised be Jesus Christ! "God is at home. It's we who have gone out for a walk." These insightful words come from Meister Eckhart, who was a Dominican theologian in the 14th century. One immediate takeaway is that not much has changed in the nearly 700 years that have elapsed since: we're still suspicious that God is asleep at the wheel while we're vigilantly trying to keep the world from careening completely out of control. Say what you will for the human race, we've always had a rather high opinion of ourselves.

As we begin a new school year, a brief reflection on the first things is always a good way to start. Just over 30 years ago, Richard John Neuhaus founded a magazine by the name of "First Things" and one of his fundamental convictions was that, "*Culture is the root of politics, and religion is the root of culture.*" Thanks to a variety of insidious factors, Neuhaus' claim is not nearly as well-known as it deserves to be. But any discussion about first things demands some resolution about where we came from, and if we were created, then who created us and why? These are the first things we ought to consider as we search for the whole point of what we're doing here for our limited time on earth.

Many of you still remember the first question that appeared in the Baltimore Catechism: "*Why did God make me?*" And if you remember the question, then it's likely that you also remember the answer: "*To know Him, to love Him, and to serve Him in this world, so as to be happy with Him forever in the next.*" For all of our sophistication today, that simple answer is still impressive in capturing the meaning of human existence. We're here because God wants us to be. The genius of Catholic education is that it can grapple with this "first thing," exploring how we know God's existence and why we're so sure He created us out of love for a divine purpose. If the end truly depends upon the beginning, then studying the reality and ramifications of the beginning is really important. Maybe a brief brush up on some of the salient details would help.

First, we were innocent in the beginning – Saint Francis of Assisi was fond of reflecting on how life must have been before the reign of sin. C.S. Lewis had his own take on things, suggesting that animals and human beings once understood each other because they spoke one another's language. In the seventh book of his <u>Chronicles of Narnia</u>, Lewis suggests that Heaven will be what earth once was before the fall.

Then came original sin, which made a mess of everything. We now work by the sweat of our brow, which is why so many shy away from work and indulge in the sort of listlessness that leaves us chronically unhappy and restless. Without some work to do, people tend to drift from one distraction to another, hopelessly devoted to avoiding work of any type. While the word "epidemic" is one that is vastly overused these days, it does accurately describe the laziness that has brought sadness and spiritual sickness to countless Americans. Historically this is nothing new: the beginning of the end of every empire that ever reigned was the inordinate attachment to comfort at the expense of work. The solution, however, is not solely in cultivating a solid work ethic. As Neuhaus' quote above suggests, the issue is deeper than that.

Culture, which is the bedrock of society, depends on religion and the convictions that lead souls to put their trust in a supreme being. Karl Marx and folks like him thought that a world without God and religion was the only way to find true happiness. Poor Marx thought we could pull Heaven down to earth, but in the process he only promised happiness where it could never be found. Without going deeper down the rabbit hole (this is becoming rather philosophical), suffice it to say that people work harder when there is a supernatural dimension that makes it worthwhile. Sure, some work only to become millionaires, but if you compare them to the saints, the difference is one that even the untrained eye can see. People who do not know God will ultimately find work to be draining and more and more seek ways to avoid it. While the friends of God will not only whistle while they work, they'll know the joy that comes when we serve the one true Master, Jesus Christ.

Speaking of work and its supernatural dimension, someone passed along the following prayer to Saint Joseph that sheds light on some of the things we've been considering:

"Glorious Saint Joseph, model of all who are devoted to labor, obtain for me the grace to work conscientiously, putting the call of duty above my selfish interests, to work with gratitude and joy, considering it an honor to employ and develop, by means of labor, the gifts received from God; to work with order, peace, moderation and patience without ever recoiling before weariness or difficulties; to work, above all, with purity of intention, and with detachment from self, as Jesus worked at Nazareth under the direction of your guidance and skill. Amen."

The saints worked harder than most people, but what set them apart is that they worked for the Lord and imitated Him. One of the most tangible benefits of working for Jesus is that we gradually become more and more like Him. And Jesus is humble, as Saint John Vianney described in the following quote, *"Humility is to the various virtues what the chain is in a rosary. Take away the chain and the beads are scattered; remove humility, and all virtues vanish."*

In closing, while the following anecdote might appear as a bit of a *non sequitur*, Saint Bernard of Clairvaux summarizes our discussion with an insight regarding the purpose of life and death and how God chose to save us:

Saint Bernard of Clairvaux once responded to a married couple who had asked after a traumatic miscarriage, "What is going to happen to my child. The child didn't get baptized." Here's Saint Bernard's consoling response: "Your faith spoke for this child. Baptism for his child was only delayed by time. Your faith suffices. The waters of your womb – were they not the waters of life for this child? Look at your tears. Are they not like the waters of baptism? Do not fear this. God's ability to love is greater than our tears. Surrender everything to God."

May God bless us with attention to the first things in our life so that we'll be adequately prepared for the last things!

September 11, 2022 - 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Since God created human beings, we have struggled to keep our focus on God. We wrestle with the question of "who is God" and foolishly believe some of God's job description can be better completed by us. We wander in different directions, lose our way, think that happiness can be found elsewhere and even construct golden calves to worship. Are we simply too independent or just blatantly stubborn? It's a good question to ask. Even with all of our silliness and distractions, God compassionately and patiently waits. He lets us assert our wills and knows that perhaps one day we will actually wake up and realize how lost we are.

"Since happiness is nothing other than the enjoyment of the highest good and since the highest good is above, no one can be made happy unless he rises above himself, not by an ascent of the body but of the heart. But we cannot rise above ourselves unless a higher power lifts us up ... Divine aid is available to those who seek it from their hearts, humbly and devoutly; and this means to sigh for it in this valley of tears, through fervent prayer (St. Bonaveture)." One of the biggest human struggles is discerning what, exactly, is the highest good. We are ordered to achieve it but if we pursue it with clouded vision, we will never truly find it.

One of the greatest obstacles to God's power and love is a stubborn, closed heart of stone. When we are fiercely determined to set our sights elsewhere for happiness or simply ride the popular currents of the day, we will never satisfy the deep ache and longing within. We know that ache well. It is precisely why we scurry all over the place, attempting to find the next best thing to take away its pain. Nothing in the created world ever can or will. We continue our journey. One day, people may wake up and realize that they are grazing in the wrong pasture and putting themselves in harm's way. When this awakening occurs, it will be a most joyous day as we will see God's wide-open arms waiting to receive us. "Lead me, Lord, in your path, and I will enter in your truth. Let my heart rejoice that it may fear your name (St. Bonaventure)."

Getting to know Jesus Christ in a deeper way: Reading the Catechism in 10 months We grow in our



love for someone as we get to know them better. Would you like to grow in your love for Jesus Christ through coming to know Him better? Reading the Catechism, a few pages each day, will help you to deepen your understanding of His incredible love for you. A modest schedule of 15 paragraphs per night (roughly 3 pages) has been arranged that will take about 10-15 minutes of reflective reading, 5 nights a week over 38 weeks. A schedule is emailed to participants every two weeks. To sign up, email Ann Lankford at alankford@diolc.org with the word Catechism in the subject line. There are usually over 100 people who participate each year and they express that the fruits are well worth the effort. Invite your friends to join.
