

CONTEMPLATE

This Child Is Blessed

Every parent knows a child is a blessing who is filled with innocence and wonder and grace. Grandparents know this, too, perhaps in renewed and deeper ways.



It is their hope that every child will grow strong, be wise, and be favored. Even the pre-teen Jesus astonishes and worries his parents as they fret over their child!

Those of us who are parents know this stress. But all of us, even us aged ones, are still children of God, dearly loved and called to be obedient.

Keep the Christmas Celebrations Going!

Merry Christmas! While the secular culture begins to put away their Christmas trees (probably because they're tired of seeing them since Halloween!), we Catholics—who have been immersed in our Advent preparations—just begin the season of Christmas. Like Easter, Christmas is one of those major solemnities in the life of the Church that we celebrate with an octave, or eight days of solemn celebration (meaning that December

26 through January 1, even though they carry their own feasts, all rank as high on the Church calendar as Christmas Day itself). But even at January 1, the Church's celebration of Christmas doesn't end. Christmas extends, liturgically speaking, to the Baptism of the Lord, which we commemorate this year on January 9. So I encourage you all

to keep Christmas alive at least until then!
Historically speaking, though, the Christmas season was understood to last until 40 days after
Christmas, on the feast of "Candlemas," or the
Presentation of the Lord, which would have been the day when Jesus was first introduced to the
Temple. So if you want to show the world what
Christmas really means, then keep up your decorations (and your celebrations!) until then!

I'd like to share with you all a beautiful and ancient Christmas homily by St. Leo the Great (who died in 461). It's traditionally the second reading in the Office of Readings for Christmas Day (part of the "Liturgy of the Hours," prayers that priests and religious promise to pray worldwide for the Church). It's a beautiful reminder of why Christ came into our world—to save us!—and how we as Christians are called to receive that great gift! Enjoy!

"Dearly beloved, today our Savior is born; let us rejoice. Sadness should have no place on the birthday of life. The fear of death has been swallowed up; life brings us joy with the promise of eternal happiness. No one is shut out from this joy; all share the same reason for rejoicing. Our Lord, victor over sin and death, finding no man free from sin, came to free us all. Let the saint rejoice as he sees the palm of victory at hand. Let the sinner be glad as he receives the offer of forgiveness. Let the pagan take courage as he is summoned to life.

In the fullness of time, chosen in the unfathomable depths of God's wisdom, the Son of God took for himself our common humanity in order to reconcile it with its creator. He came to overthrow the devil, the origin of death, in that very nature by which he had overthrown mankind.

And so at the birth of our Lord the angels sing in joy: Glory to God in the highest, and they proclaim peace to his people on earth as they see the heavenly Jerusalem being built from all the nations of the world. When the angels on high are so exultant at this marvelous work of God's goodness, what joy should it not bring to the lowly hearts of men?

Beloved, let us give thanks to God the Father, through his Son, in the Holy Spirit, because in his great love for us he took pity on us, and when we were dead in our sins he brought us to life with Christ, so that in him we might be a new creation. Let us throw off our old nature and all its ways and, as we have come to birth in Christ, let us renounce the works of the flesh.

Christian, remember your dignity, and now that you share in God's own nature, do not return by sin to your former base condition. Bear in mind who is your head and of whose body you are a member. Do not forget that you have been rescued from the power of darkness and brought into the light of God's kingdom.

Through the sacrament of baptism you have become a temple of the Holy Spirit. Do not drive away so great a guest by evil conduct and become again a slave to the devil, for your liberty was bought by the blood of Christ."

the blessings of the Lord in our lives as we begin this new year. The Lord will always be with us in every opportunity and change that may come our way.




