

Believing Signs

The miracle of water to wine is the first of many signs of the Messiah, the Christ (John). God's signs and good activity are everywhere.

- What gifts that I have, given by the Spirit, will I put to use for the good of another?
- What signs will I rejoice in?

Everyone needs inner healing

We all desire happiness, freedom, joy, love, life, and peace. We probably have all prayed for more of these things in our life. However, even with our praying for more joy, peace, etc., we can find ourselves stuck in old negative thinking patterns. We can find ourselves weighed down by the burdens and anxieties of the

world. We find ourselves struggling to reach that deeper level of happiness and freedom we know we are made for. This can happen even when we are people who pray, go to Mass, and even go to Confession with regularity. Shouldn't we be happier? Especially when we get to receive the Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity of Jesus in the Eucharist? Even

though God is our Father? Even though Jesus has conquered death? It isn't just people living apart from Christ who struggle to find freedom, joy, and happiness, even we as believers can struggle.

If we continually struggle to find love, joy, peace, and freedom, if we often feel dissatisfied, resentful, chronic fear or worry, unsure of ourselves, if we struggle with the same sins over and over even after confessing our sins, the solution might not be in simply praying more, going to Mass more, or going to Confession more. Those things are all incredibly important and beneficial, but what we need more specifically is spiritual and emotional healing. If that were enough, then why does there exist believers who spend tons of time in daily prayer, attend daily Mass, read spiritual books, listen to Catholic radio, and are engaged in their faith in so many ways, yet are lacking true love, joy, peace, and freedom? Not only lacking these things, but even have a noticeable amount of negativity, bitterness, worry, and heaviness? It is because there is deeper healing that needs to happen in their soul. To use an analogy, exercising, eating healthily, taking vitamins and supplements, and sleeping well are all great ways for a person to be healthy and full of energy. However, if they have heavily developed cancer in one of their major organs, they aren't going to experience full health and might feel quite sick. They need specific targeted treatment for their cancer-radiation, chemotherapy, or surgery. For our souls, spiritual

forms of sustenance like Mass, prayer, and confession are not always targeted or specific enough in treating the cancer or wounds in our souls.

It is my firm belief and conviction that everyone needs inner healing. I believe the only truly spiritually healthy and fully alive disciples are ones that have journeyed through inner healing. The reality is, that many of us have experienced emotional/spiritual wounds that are more serious than we realize. Even if we haven't experienced some major form of abuse or trauma, we still have a need for inner healing. Simply not receiving an abundance of affirmation, love, support, and encouragement, etc. can leave us wounded. Apart from our specific experiences of growing up, the Enemy is always out to attack us. The Enemy doesn't attack us by making random noises in our house at night or knocking something off our dresser. He attacks us with lies about our value and identity. One of my favorite verses is John 10:10, where Jesus said he came that we might have life and have it abundantly. However, immediately before he says that the Enemy, the devil, "comes only to steal and kill and destroy." The devil wants to rob us of the abundant life Jesus has for us. From my experience as a priest, I can say the devil holds many people in bondage through unaddressed spiritual/emotional wounds, lies, limitations, and distortions in our image of God. It isn't a matter of the devil possessing people in some dramatic fashion. It is simply the fact that he robs many people of experiencing this full love, joy, peace, and freedom that they are made to experience.

I am excited to invite you to an opportunity for inner healing. Our parish is going to be hosting a retreat for inner healing/freedom this Lent. Specifically, it will start March 11th in the evening and go until the night of March 13th. It will be at Lourdes' Church. A more specific schedule will be released soon. I think in order for us to be disciples that will set the Church and world on fire we must receive this deeper healing and freedom that Jesus has to offer us. I hope to see you at the retreat!
