

A challenge to see things differently

Prophets possess an intimate knowledge of God and act on their experience of God. Prophetic messages usually challenge the status quo and draw us up and out of ourselves, focusing us on the bigger picture. We often think of ourselves and our own needs first.

When we listen to someone speak, we judge the merit of the message by its degree of usefulness. If the message or vision contains no personal benefit or profit but a call to stretch and grow, we can become indignant.

Prophets are usually the ones whose message challenges us and calls us to see things differently and love more perfectly and deeply. God is love. When listening to St. Paul speak about love we witness the unfolding of this type of unconditional, other centered, self-sacrificial perfect God.

It is an invitation to life, freedom, and happiness that can be offered to us only by God. Jesus, who is God and Love incarnate, calls us to this richer expression of love. Are we ready to listen and be challenged and stretched?

Believing God who protects

Proclaiming God's Word can be costly. For the grueling work of prophet Jeremiah, God declares he will not be alone. In proclaiming Good News in his home town, Jesus is faced with reproach and the threat of being thrown over the cliff. Proclaiming Good News is the task of each of us because of Baptism into Christ. So, how do we do it? As faithful, hopeful, loving Christians,

- What words of faith will I share with others this week?
- What is part of the great hope I have in believing in Christ?
- Because God keeps me safe in a protecting embrace, how can I love? Whom will I love – even those who are not "one of us"?



Embracing the Unfamiliar, and Living with the Uncomfortable and the Inconvenient

This Sunday's Gospel is interesting...Jesus, in His hometown of Nazareth, from the scroll of the prophet Isaiah that God has sent Him to preach good news to the poor, and then says to the marveling crowd, "Today, this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." And while the reception of

Jesus' words seems to be pretty good, there are those in Jesus' hometown that begin to think more in human terms: "Isn't this the son of Joseph?" Surely He can't be what He seems to be saying He is, can He?

The familiarity that the people of His hometown share with Jesus ends up becoming an obstacle to their faith. And it's an obstacle

that I would guess many of us have tripped over a time or two, if we've been paying attention. The "familiar" often comes to be taken for granted. And while we've been given this great invitation to embrace God as familiar (literally, as of the same family), the call is certainly not to become complacent with His gifts or take for granted how close He desires to be to us.

Routine is a good thing, but it can also challenge us to remember why or with what importance we do the things we do. Take for example genuflecting to the tabernacle. When we do it, do we remember Who it is that we are acknowledging when we bend our knee? Or as we enter the Church, do we walk in just like we walk into our favorite restaurant, casing the joint for the people we know, chatting with those who we pass on the way to our seat? None of those are bad things, of course—but the Church is first and foremost the House of God; while He rejoices in our community, He also deserves our

first acknowledgement. Or when we receive communion, are we mindful of who we receive? Do we take a moment after receiving to acknowledge that we carry God within us—and do we kneel after Mass to pray in thanksgiving for that great gift?

One of the challenges with a God who desires to be so present to us is not to get so familiar with Him that we forget the greatness and sheer graciousness of that gift.

So, was that it for the people of Nazareth? Were they forgotten in the plan of God, since Jesus was not able to share His miracles with them that day? Surely not...if they had faith, the call was to pursue Him. To leave the comfort and convenience of Nazareth, to leave behind what was familiar and to enter into discipleship with Jesus. So too with us. At times the Lord calls us to leave behind what we find convenient, what we've made "our own"—even sometimes good things, things in the faith—in order to pursue Him in what is uncomfortable for us. But like the people of Nazareth that day, we learn that to do so is well worth the reward.

For those of you who are celebrating, happy Catholic Schools Week as well! This is a week to celebrate the gift of Catholic education. Thank you to the teachers and staff who make it possible, and to the families who continue to support our mission in our Catholic schools. May the Lord prosper us and bless our Catholic schools with His abundance!
